



Different Paths to Graduation

Back Bay is the NMSD's continuation high school, and Monte Vista is the independent high school. Both schools are fully accredited by WASC and offer A-G coursework for students wanting to attend California state college or university. Students graduating from both schools must complete the same graduation requirements. Students must apply to attend the Alternative Education Center. They may be referred through the director of student services, by an assistant principal or counselor at their home school, by parent request or through self-referral. After applying, the student must

be accepted by the principal. All RSP students must have a change-in-placement IEP meeting with their home before transferring.

Back Bay High School students attend school daily and complete five classes every 60 days. Students who successfully completed all course work will earn 75 credits per year. All work is completed in class and consists of textbook work, projects, online instruction, group work and supplemental assignments. Seniors may request to test out of failed classes or to graduate early. The majority of students enrolled in Back Bay are juniors and seniors.

Before applying to Monte Vista High School, students must have successfully completed 120 credits, passed the California Exit tests in ELA and math, and be able to demonstrate evidence of academic ability. Independent MV students attend school once weekly for a minimum of two hours and complete each class in three weeks. Students who work, have medical issues or are involved in highlevel competitive sports appreciate the flexibility of MV's program.

If you are interested in either program, talk to your high school counselor or assistant principal.

Killybrooke is a "no excuses university." That's because we promote a comprehensive model of college-readiness to all of our students the moment they enter elementary school.



Here's how to create a blues artist moniker: Pick an ailment, a fruit, and the last name of a president and presto! you've got a groove going. It worked for Blind Lemon Jefferson.

Whether it works for musical artist Randy Kaplan is for you to discover in this extraordinary project. Blues music fuses seamlessly with education, history, biography and very clever lyrics in tunes originated by seminal blues musicians legendary or nearly forgotten—Muddy Waters, Bessie Smith, Hambone Willie Newbern and over a dozen others, all adapted as tributes, with no loss of essence or infusion of cuteness. Songs about running away from

home, a two-timing babysitter, and a neighborhood bully who doesn't quite get it are rendered in yodelin' blues, scattin' blues, slappin' blues—you always drop the g when you're talkin' blues—and a little ragtime. In between songs, enigmatic bluesman Lightnin' Bodkins—he got his name from his speed in making mittens and the extra bodkins he keeps the hair out of his eyes with—rasps out facts about the artists and the social conditions that had them singing the blues. He also persists in suggesting names for a reluctant Randy Kaplan, apparently the only person alive who knows of Mr. Bodkins. Hmmmm....

Mr. Diddie Wah Diddie is one of the most remarkable children's music collections I've encountered. If you have to have the back-to-school blues, these are the best kind.

Welcome to the School Health Office

Now that fall is here, we are adjusting to school routines and the many associated activities. If you have not had a chance to stop by the school health office, I encourage you to do so. In the health office you will met the nurse and health assistant. These are the caring school personnel who respond to the daily health needs of students. They provide support for ill and injured students and are part of the team which implements coordinated health programs at school. Some of these services include health screening for concerns such as vision, hearing, and dental health. School nurses are also included in the assessment of student academic needs, and they play a key role in the delivery of healthcare procedures.

It is especially important to be acquainted with the school nurse and the health assistant if your child has health concerns. During enrollment and registration, parents/guardians have an opportunity to share health information. Communication is essential in meeting the health needs of children. If your child has particular health needs, please be certain to inform the nurse. The nurse wants to know about allergies, especially food allergies, asthma, diabetes, communicable disease, medication, hearing and vision concerns, and any health condition that may impact learning, safety, and an enjoyable productive day at school. Please stop by or communicate with the health office. Be sure your child's health information is current.
