#### It's Not Too Late for a Flu Shot

The flu season typically lasts from October to May, with most cases occurring between December through March. Ideally, it is most effective to receive the flu vaccine prior to the flu season. However, getting it later in the season does offer protection. In other words, it is not too late to get your flu shot!

Who should get a flu shot? The Centers for Disease Control recommends that everyone over the age of six months should be vaccinated. It is especially important for those people who are immuno-compromised, or under the age of four years, or over 50.

There are other high-risk groups that should be vaccinated too, so please check with your health care provider.

How can my family get a flu shot? There are many resources for flu vaccine in our community, including your doctor or health care provider. There are also Web sites like www.flu.gov. to help you find one. The Orange County Health Care Agency is another good resource, at www.ochealthinfo.com.

What if I get the flu? If you are feeling flu-like symptoms such as fever, aches, chills, cough and a runny nose, please remember to stay home from school or work except when seeking medical care. The flu can be easily spread in populated settings just by airborne droplets. And the CDC recommends that you stay home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone.

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#### **Gang Prevention Collaboration**

It has been noted that one of the best ways to prevent youth from joining gangs is to strengthen families and schools. This includes improving community supervision and parent and teacher training on youth management and interpersonal skills development. This idea, endorsed by the office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), is the foundation for the recently successful gang prevention conferences hosted by the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE), Safe Schools and Support Services Office (Safe Schools).

In 2010, OCDE was awarded funding from the Orange County Health Care Agency to provide school-based mental health services, including county-wide gang prevention, early intervention, mediation, crisis response, and training.

#### **The Overarching Goals Included:**

- Collaborate with school districts, community organizations, law enforce ment, and faith-based organizations to provide a comprehensive under standing of why youth join gangs, how to support their exit from gang involvement, and what resources are available
- Train service providers and mental health professionals on best practice techniques for working with gang-involved youth
- Provide a multi-disciplinary forum to share evidence-based strategies proven effective with high-risk youth

One strategy used to meet these goals was hosting a series of Gang Prevention

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### **Are You Prepared for a Disaster?**

The Newport Beach Fire Department invites all residents to join our Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program. CERT is a nationally recognized, Department of Homeland Security training program, which teaches residents how to be prepared for unexpected disasters.

This spring, the Newport Beach Fire Department will hold two CERT programs: a Tuesday and Thursday evening class, which begins on Tuesday, February 28, and an all-day Saturday class, which begins on Saturday, March 3. The CERT program is a complete, 28-hour certification which teaches residents about disaster preparedness, disaster psychology, light search and rescue, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, disaster medical operations, and fire suppression. Upon course completion, all CERT volunteers are certified disaster service workers, ready to help themselves, their neighbors, and their community in times of need. The program is free of charge to Newport Beach residents and is \$40 for non-residents.





Throughout the media, we hear that the United States has an obesity problem. We are exercising less, eating fewer fruits and vegetables, and drinking more sodas than we did in the past. But this is no longer true for Yolanda Torres and her family. For five weeks, Mrs. Torres attended the Network for a Healthy California's Nutrition Institute at College Park Elementary School. Here, she learned how to improve her health and the health of her family.

"Our family has made quite a few changes, and we are so happy we did," she said with a smile. "First, we got rid of the sodas and

replaced them with water. Second, we eat together and pile our plates with more fruits and vegetables than ever before. And third, we exercise together, too. We walk, run, or ride our bikes for 40 minutes to an hour."

Are these changes making a difference? "My husband and I have lost weight by making these changes," Mrs. Torres said. "I used to take medication for pain in my legs, but with all of the physical activity, water and fresh fruits and vegetables, I no longer have the pain and...no more medicine."

Mrs. Torres added, "My husband and I are getting to know our children better because we now spend a lot of time together. Small changes are making a big difference!"

This is an exciting time for celebration, as hundreds of our former ELs will now be reclassified to R-FEP!

We continue to focus laser-like on student achievement for each of our English learners!

#### **Preparing Students for Independent Success**

Monte Vista High School students will complete their first semester in the coming weeks. Independent study students are on the same calendar as the comprehensive sites. The biggest difference is that, when you are enrolled in independent study, you attend school for a minimum of two hours weekly, complete the majority of academic work at home, and are enrolled in one course at a time. The average course takes three full weeks to complete, or about 60 hours. Student course work with Monte Vista runs parallel to the district requirements for graduation. Course work,

technology proficiency, California High School Exit Exams, and community service requirements for Back Bay and Monte Vista are identical to the district's requirements for Estancia, Costa Mesa, Corona del Mar, and Newport Harbor High Schools. Students in tenth and eleventh grades are also subject to the same state-level testing as all California state students.

Frequently students who are working full-time, attending a community college, preparing for a competitive sport, or suffering from an illness which prevents them from attending school on a daily basis will choose independent study. 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
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

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

Subsequent conferences included over 800 participants.
