On March 8, 2011, The Board of Education approved the annual release of temporary certificated teachers and adopted a positive certification for the 2010/11 Second Period Interim Budget.

The annual release of temporary teachers is in accordance with Education Code section 44954. This action is necessary to carry out the potential loss of revenue including but not limited to certain categorical funding, and/or funding for special programs, the possibility of probationary and permanent employees returning from leaves of absences,

### **Convenience of Online Banking (Part I)**





With your busy schedule and the price of gas, why visit a branch to perform your banking needs when you can do nearly all of your financial transactions securely online? ### The Power of Parents and Physical Activity

We know one of the most powerful tools in the fight against childhood obesity is physical activity. Yet, researchers tell us as our children grow, there is a decline in the amount of physical activity they get. How much physical activity do children and teens need? The 2008 Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans recommends that children and teens to get at least 60 minutes a day of physical activity, with a majority of that spent doing moderate-to-vigorous physical activity (MVPA). MVPA means raising your heart rate and "breaking a sweat" during physical activity.

Kids who get 30 minutes a day of MVPA have improved physical health, physical fitness, and mental health. At school we see links between physical activity, fitness, and improved academic performance. In other words, better grades and test scores at all ages!

Parents can have a powerful influence their children's time and activities, by being an active role model for physical fitness. Children imitate what they see their parents do. Families can schedule an active play date at least once a week and should strive to make physical activity a part of every day if possible. Parents and caretakers can also substitute active play time for television, computer, and video game screen time at home. Children can invite their neighborhood friends to join in your family play time.

Physical Education (PE) is the class time schools allocate for students to learn and practice the movement knowledge, motor and social skills they need to start and sustain an active, healthy lifestyle. State and federal academic requirements for physical education are 200 minutes every 10 days in K-6 schools and 400 minutes every 10 days in grades 7-12. Schools are doing their best to make sure students are getting adequate PE time, however some may find it difficult to fit the time into the regular school day. If adequate PE time is a concern, ask your child's teacher or school principal what you can do to help.

Parents can volunteer to help provide more MVPA at recess, lunch time, and after school. Parents can also assist teachers by supporting scheduled physical activity breaks in the classroom. Parents can promote walking, skating, and biking to and from school. As educators, we can encourage parents to learn about their school district's Wellness Policy and participate in the Kids Run OC or Governor's Challenge. Many organizations, including the Orange County Department of Education, offer free physical fitness resource materials, activity plans, and tools for parents.

None of us can do it alone. Working together, parents, schools, and communities can provide an environment that promotes physical activity and increases the amount of MVPA our children get. Let's encourage collaborations between cities and community organizations, like YMCA's and Boys & Girls Clubs, to work together and find ways to expand the use of existing facilities such as pools, parks, fitness centers, gyms, fields, playgrounds, and skate parks. Together we can find innovative ways to increase physical activity resulting in better health and fitness for everyone.




### **Grants Bring Classroom Materials**

Science teachers Roy Center, Ed Bell and Lee Kelly guided over 130 students in completing their


projects. Top

### **Classroom Visitations**

Our staff recently finished a series of classroom visitations and observations here in our own Newport Heights classrooms. In continuing to develop our professional learning communities, eight different teachers taught lessons that incorporated technology and innovative teaching methods. All teachers on the campus had the chance to observe two of their peers teach a lesson and participate in a debriefing discussion about the lesson and technologies used.

Two lessons were taught in our 6th grade one-to-one laptop Principal program, a cooperative learning PowerPoint, and creating an advertisement flyer using Microsoft Word. Five lessons were focused on the use of a SMARTBoard and included a math wall and Cognitive Guided Instruction (CGI), a word family word sort, an art lesson on still life, social studies, and a lesson on fractions. The last lesson focused on exploring the Extended Response portion of Accelerated Math.

During the debriefing sessions, teachers discussed how the lessons could be adapted to their classroom or even a different grade level. All in all this was a tremendous opportunity for teachers to showcase, observe, and collaborate on the teaching and learning happening here at the Heights.

and other considerations that relate directly to the justifications for employment of temporary certificated employees. While the annual release is legally necessary, N-MUSD is optimistic that the released

temporary teachers will be able to return to their current positions for the 2011/12 school year.

N-MUSD is not projecting significant budget reductions or the need for staff layoffs for the 2011/12 school year. The Board approved the District's Second Period Interim Report and adopted a positive

certification. Based on all available information known by the District at this time, the District meets the State's standards and criteria for fiscal stability and is projecting a positive unrestricted fund balance and a positive year-end cash position for the General Fund.

The projections for 2012/13 however, include a few different scenarios that could bring significant cuts to education.

Governor Brown's current budget proposal includes a tax extension measure on the June 2011 ballot. If the tax extension portion of Governor Brown's budget proposal doesn't pass, we anticipate massive cuts to education. In that instance, N-MUSD would have a \$15 million dollar structural imbalance between revenues and expenditures in 2012-13, and consequently would have to prepare in 2011-12 for \$15 million dollars in cuts.

The potential of another \$15 million in cuts would add to the District's already \$24.8 million dollars in budget cuts that have been made over the last three years due to funding shortfalls at the state level and a decrease in local revenues.

The Newport-Mesa Unified School District Board of Education previously responded to these concerns and took action on February 15, 2011, to adopt Resolution No. 27-02-11, in support of placing a revenue extension measure on the June 2011 ballot. The Resolution reflects the following points:

- Governor Brown's 2011-12 budget proposal is a balanced approach between revenues and new cuts to solving the deficit and provides for an extension of temporary revenues to support programs our students need and deserve
- Over the last several years, K-12 education funding has taken a disproportionate amount of budget cuts
- State and local funding for schools has been cut by more than \$18 billion, or about \$1,900 per student in the last three years
- Newport-Mesa Unified School District has cut \$24.8 million dollars from its budget over the past three years as a result of ongoing statewide cuts to education funding
- The loss of \$7 billion in one-time federal funding further reduces school budgets
- To begin to reverse this downward spiral, Californians must retain the revenues that enable us to invest in our schools and students
- The governor's budget proposal to limit further cuts to schools in 2011-12 is dependent on voter approval of an extension of existing temporary tax increases
- A ballot measure to extend temporary revenues will help prevent further cuts to schools, and without this extension the LAO reports that funding for schools would fall by at least \$2 billion, or more than \$335 per student
- Newport-Mesa Unified School District expects our local legislators to work with the governor to protect schools from further cuts and to ensure the continued investment our students deserve
- Newport-Mesa Unified School District opposes a cuts-only budget and supports a budget that is balanced with a combination of cuts and revenue
- Newport-Mesa Unified School District supports placing a measure on the June 2011 ballot calling for a five-year revenue extension to protect our schools and students by making education a priority in our state.

N-MUSD will continue to follow and assess funding and legislative activities at the state level. The District encourages the local community to review the Governor's budget proposal and revenue tax extension proposal that will hopefully be put before the voters on a June/July 2011 ballot.

### **Preteen-Teen Risk Behaviors**

Experimenting is part of growing up. The major concerns for parents nowadays are drinking, drugs, dare games, sexual activity and reckless behavior.

A risk activity less commonly known, and a dangerous trend, is the choking game. The Centers for Disease Control report that in a 10-year period, 83 young people from 31 states have died from dangerous strangulation games. Youth are choking, strangling or hanging themselves (or having a friend do it) with nooselike dog leashes, scarves or by squatting and holding their breath.

Why? These activities supposedly offer a fast and free high. Depriving the brain of oxygen can induce tingling or a mild euphoria because of its effect on the nervous system.

Other names for this activity are the blackout game, pass out, airplaning, California choke, and suffocation roulette. Boys are more likely to participate, and 13 years is the average age. Of the children who have died, 96 percent were alone.

After three minutes of hanging or strangling, the balance, memory and nervous systems begin to shut down. This potentially causes accidental death, loss of consciousness, concussions, seizures, coma or injuries from falling.

Warning signs of this activity are bruises around the neck, headaches, bloodshot eyes, disorientation after being alone, or choking paraphernalia in the room.

Always explain the risks of this activity to your child, and consult a doctor if you suspect anything. Being informed and talking to your child about all types of risky behaviors is an important part of parenting. Making smart decisions, and thinking about the consequences before acting, is an essential and possibly lifesaving skill that our children need to learn.



#### **Preschools Pilot Pre-K Math Program**

College Park and Davis Preschools were recently selected by the MIND Research Institute to pilot the ST (Spatial Temporal) Math for Pre-K. This program applies the same visual-based approach to teaching problem-solving skills as the elementary program, but is specially designed to be developmentally-appropriate for younger children. The program is comprised of technology (age-appropriate and interactive software games) and hand-on activities that promote children verbalizing their understanding of math concepts. The software games, featuring a penguin named "JiJi," are based on current neuroscience research designed to engage children's spatial temporal reasoning abilities. A student at



College Park Preschool shares, "I like to play JiJi. I make patterns with shapes and I match." Preschool Site Facilitator, Angela Goddard, says, "I like that the program software reinforces the hands-on experiences. The children interact with JiJi on the computer in a different way than we can do with traditional math activities and manipulatives."


