

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

Change Your Clock and Batteries

It is a proven fact that smoke alarms save hundreds of lives each year. By sounding an alarm and giving people time to escape, smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying in a house fire in half. A majority of residential structure fires occur between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. and early detection of these fires is usually the key to survival. Smoke Alarms and residential sprinklers are critical elements to saving lives and property.

Additionally, per California Senate Bill 183, beginning July 1, 2011, all existing single family homes must have carbon monoxide alarms. All other types of residences (apartments, condominiums, etc.) will need carbon monoxide (CO) alarms beginning January 1, 2013. The law does not designate local fire departments as enforcing agencies. The new requirements apply if ANY of the following are present within a home: Attached garage; Natural gas or propane furnace and/or natural gas range and/or oven, or Gas or wood-burning fireplace.

For existing homes, the CO alarms may be battery powered. At a minimum, CO alarms are required outside of each sleeping area or bedroom and on each level of the home

Therefore, maintaining smoke and CO alarms is just as important as having them. An alarm device that doesn't work is like not having one at all. Alarms should be cleaned at least once a year, batteries should never be "borrowed" to use someplace else, and batteries should be tested once a month.

The Newport Beach Fire Department urges all Americans to adopt a lifesaving habit of changing smoke and CO alarm batteries when clocks are changed back from daylight-savings time each Fall. Daylight Savings Time ends on Sunday, November 6 when we turn our clocks back one hour. Change your battery on that Sunday and then, remember to do it again in the spring when you set your clock forward.

Once the batteries have been changed, be sure to test the alarms. This simple act will help protect you and your family in the event of a fire.

The Gift Of History Event-November 8

The Gift of History event began four years ago in the city of Anaheim. All third graders in the city were invited to the event, which celebrated Anaheim's history and literacy development. Each student in attendance received a backpack with school supplies and a children's history book. The success of this program inspired the Children's Education Foundation of Orange County to expand the program county wide.

This year, the program will be held on Tuesday, November 8, at Angel Stadium, from 10:30 – 11:20 a.m.

This memorable learning experience will kick off subsequent lessons addressing third-grade content standards in social studies and language arts.

Thirty five thousand third grade students from across Orange County are invited to participate in breaking the Guinness world record for the largest history lesson ever delivered. On this day, students will actively participate in an interactive history lesson about Orange County and its cities. Each student in attendance will receive a backpack, a copy of *Nothing Rhymes with Orange* by Stan Oftelie, school supplies, and a unique experience at Angel Stadium.

The program is intended to serve multiple purposes:

- Support implementation of Common Core State Standards
- Integrate literacy and history-social science
- Instill appreciation for and a sense of connection to Orange County and student's home cities
- Develop an understanding of how history affects each of us and our potential to affect the future
- Learn about the people who have made a difference in Orange County
- Recognize that history is alive and all around us and the "big idea" that things change over time

As a key sponsor, Disney's production company will coordinate this outstanding academic and entertaining event. Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) is developing a classroom guide to support instruction and use of the book Nothing Rhymes with Orange. OCDE is providing academic oversight to the event to ensure it is a meaningful, standards-based, academic learning experience for all participating students.

The Children's Education Foundation of Orange County has committed to supporting transportation to The Gift of History event. They will work with district transportation directors to coordinate and oversee transportation logistics. 
Safeguard Yourself from Identity Theft (Part II)

When someone's identity is stolen, the impact is not only financial and credit-wise but also emotional. It becomes very personal and for some people it feels like someone literally has broken into their home. It's best to arm yourself against being a victim than having to go through the hassle of clearing your name. Prevention and awareness are your first lines of defense against this crime that has grown globally. Below are tips to protect yourself from Identity Theft:

- Create Strong Passwords Avoid using passwords that are easy to configure. Using your birth date, social security number, a series of consecutive numbers or alphabet, your first name or last name is not recommended. Instead, create passwords that contain letters, numbers and symbols. Do not share your pass words with anyone.
- Monitor Your Credit Report You should monitor your credit report at least once a year. Order a free copy of your credit report from the three credit reporting agencies every year. Make sure it's accurate and includes only those activities you've authorized. Visit www.annualcreditreport.com to download your free annual reports.
- Watch What You Share Your personal information such as your birth date, social security number and name can be used to open new accounts under your name. Be careful who you share it with. Shred personal documents or credit card bills before throwing them out. Also, be very careful when sharing personal information online.
- Review Your Bills or Bank Statement Monthly Make it a habit to review your credit card bills or your bank statement. Review them each month to identify if there are any unusual charges or transactions.

Academic Options

Back Bay Continuation High School and Monte Vista Independent High School are fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and offer A-G coursework for students desiring admission to a California state university. Students must meet the same graduation requirements as all other students in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District.

Back Bay High School students attend school daily and complete five classes every 60 days. By the end of the year, students who have successfully completed all course work will earn 75

credits. All work is completed in class and consists of textbook work, projects, online instruction, group work, and supplemental assignments. Seniors may request to test out of failed classes and may request to graduate early. The majority of students enrolled in Back Bay are juniors and seniors.

Prior to applying to Monte Vista High School, students must have successfully completed 120 credits, passed the California Exit tests in English language arts and math, and be able to demonstrate evidence of academic ability. Monte Vista students attend school once weekly for a minimum of two hours and complete one class at a time. Most classes take three weeks to complete. Students who work, have medical issues, or are involved in high-level competitive sports appreciate the flexibility of continuing high school independently. Some students like to complete one subject at a time and appreciate the flexibility of being able to work on their own.


MESA Takes Off at Costa Mesa High School. Of the many innovations in place at Costa Mesa







Water Play & Safety: Drowning Prevention By Linda Natzmer, School Nurse

Swimming and playing in water can give your child much pleasure and healthy exercise. However, each year many young children drown in swimming pools and other bodies of water. It only takes a few moments for a child to get into trouble with the unintended consequence of drowning. Take time to make sure your home is safe and you have measures in place to prevent a drowning accident. Include these items in your home safety review: Bathtubs, buckets and pails, ice chests with melted ice,

Steps to prevent children from drowning include:

- Provide constant and direct supervision when children are near water.
- Never leave small children alone or in the care of another child while in or near pools, bathtubs, or around open standing water.

toilets, pools, hot tubs/spas, and fish ponds/fountains.

- Don't let young children and children who cannot swim use inflatable toys unless an adult is supervising.
- · Teach your child to swim.
- Always use a life jacket when boating, fishing, or playing in rivers or streams.
- Always close the toilet lid and keep the bathroom door closed.
- Empty buckets, pails, and bathtubs completely after each use do not leave these items filled and unattended.
- Use a rigid, lockable cover on hot tubs and spas or fence in all sides as you would a swimming pool.
- Learn CPR and know how to get emergency help.

protect personal identity information, creating strong passwords, and being cautious when downloading programs and files are crucial to the safety and security of the digital devices kids use, as well as the information those devices store. Otherwise, kids can expose themselves and their families to digital threats like computer viruses, data and identity theft, and hacking.

What should parents know about online privacy?

Our kids live in a culture of sharing that has forever changed the concept of privacy. In a world where everyone is connected and anything created can get copied, pasted, and sent to thousands of people in a heartbeat, privacy starts to mean something different than simply guarding personal or private information. Each time your child fills out a profile without privacy controls, comments on something, posts a video, or texts a picture of themselves to friends, they potentially reveal themselves to the world. New technologies make controlling privacy even more challenging. With GPS-enabled cell phones and location-sharing programs, kids can post their whereabouts. This information can go out to friends, strangers, and companies who will show them ads targeted to their location.

Why does online privacy matter?

Digital life is very public and often permanent. If kids don't protect their privacy, what they do online will create digital footprints that wander and persist. Something that happens on the spur of the moment – a funny picture, a certain post – can resurface years later. And if kids aren't careful, their reputations can get away from them and third parties – like marketers or potential employers – can access what kids thought was private information. In today's world, college admissions, scholarships, and future employment opportunities could be denied because of something found on a social networking site such as Facebook.

What can parents and kids do to protect their privacy?

Explain that nothing is really private. No matter what kids think. Even privacy settings aren't infallible. It's up to kids to protect themselves by thinking twice before they post something that could damage their reputation or that someone else could use to embarrass or hurt them.

Teach kids to keep personal information to themselves. Help kids define what information is important for them to keep private when they're online. We recommend that kids not share their addresses, phone numbers, or birth dates.

Remind kids to protect their friends' privacy. Passing along a rumor or identifying someone in a picture (called "tagging") affects their privacy. If your kids are tagged in friends' photos, they can ask to have the photos or the tags removed. But there's not too much they can do beyond that.

Make sure your kids use privacy settings on their social network pages. Encourage kids to really think about the nature of their relationships (close friends, family, acquaintances, strangers) and adjust their privacy settings accordingly.

Don't let teens use location sharing. Programs like Facebook's Places, Loopt, and Foursquare let kids tell people exactly where they are. This makes them vulnerable to unwelcome personal contact, and it gives marketers personal information.

No filling out questionnaires, free giveaway offers, or contest applications. Companies use them to scrape kids' information and use it to market directly to them

Make sure kids look for the "opt out" buttons. When kids use a site or download an app, they often must accept the company's privacy policy – which might not be very private. Many sites have opt out options that stop third parties from collecting information.

When in doubt, check it out. Before letting your kid sign up for anything, make sure you know the facts. Do your homework, because in this connected culture, where information is constantly being bought and sold, you can never be too careful.

estas conexiones pueden implicar un enorme costo si los niños y adolescentes no tienen cuidado. Aprender a proteger la información de la identidad personal, crear contraseñas seguras y ser prudente al descargar programas y archivos es muy importante para la seguridad y protección de los dispositivos digitales que usan los niños y adolescentes y también de la información almacenada en ellos. De lo contrario, los niños y adolescentes pueden exponerse y exponer a sus familias a amenazas digitales como virus informáticos, robo de datos e identidad y piratería informática.

¿Qué es lo que deben saber los padres acerca de la privacidad en Internet?

Nuestros niños viven en una cultura en la que todo se comparte y esto ha cambiado el concepto de la privacidad de manera permanente. En un mundo en el que todos están conectados y todo lo que se ha creado puede cortarse, copiarse y mandarse a miles de personas en un segundo, la privacidad empieza a tener un significado diferente a lo que anteriormente se consideraba mantener la información personal y privada. Cada que su niño llena un perfil electrónico de información sin controles de privacidad, comenta acerca de alguna cosa, coloca un video o manda un mensaje de texto con su foto, potencialmente, todo esto se podría difundir a todo mundo. Las nuevas tecnologías hacen aun más difícil poder controlar la privacidad. Los teléfonos celulares con rastreador GPS y los programas para compartir ubicación dan la habilidad de comunicar dónde se encuentra el niño. Esta información se puede compartir con amistades, desconocidos y compañías que les mandarán anuncios a su ubicación específica.


¿Por qué es importante mantener su privacidad digital?

La vida digital es muy pública y a menudo permanente. Si los niños no protegen su privacidad, lo que hacen en el ciberespacio podría crear huellas digitales que podrían circular y hacerse permanentes. Algo que a uno le parece humorístico en el momento, como una foto o un mensaje, podría resurgir años más tarde. Si los niños no tienen cuidado, su reputación podría caer en las manos de terceras partes como compañías de publicidad o futuros empleadores, los cuales pueden tener acceso a información que los niños pensaban era privada. En el mundo actual se podría negar la admisión a una universidad o colegio, becas y oportunidades de empleo futuras debido a algo que se pudiera encontrar en una red social de comunicación como Facebook.

Consejos para los padres y niños para proteger su privacidad

Explíqueles que nada es realmente "privado" en el ciberespacio. No importa lo que los niños piensen. Ni aun los controles de privacidad son infalibles. Los niños son los únicos que pueden protegerse a sí mismos pensando bien, antes de publicar algo, si lo que quieren colocar/revelar podría dañar su reputación o si otra persona podría usarlo para avergonzarlos o hacerles daño.

Enséñeles que no deben compartir su información personal. Ayude a los niños a determinar cuál es la información importante que deben mantener privada cuando están usando las comunicaciones electrónicas. Les recomendamos que los niños no den a conocer su dirección, números telefónicos o fechas de nacimiento.



Recuérdeles a sus niños que protejan la privacidad de sus amigos. Repetir un rumor o identificar a alguien por su nombre en una foto (conocido como " tagging") afecta su privacidad. Si se identifica el nombre de sus niños por medio de tagging en las fotos de sus amigos, pueden pedirles que quiten las fotos o su nombre. Pero en realidad, esto es todo lo que pueden hacer.

Asegúrese de que sus niños usen la configuración de privacidad en sus propias páginas Web en las redes sociales. Recomiende a los niños que analicen bien la naturaleza de sus amistades (buenos amigos, miembros de la familia o parientes conocidos, personas conocidas o desconocidos) y se basen en esto para determinar las configuraciones de privacidad.

No permita que los adolescentes usen el servicio de ubicación. Los programas como Facebook's Places, Loopt, y Foursquare permiten a los niños publicar su ubicación exacta. Esto los hace vulnerables al contacto con personas no deseadas y les proporciona información personal a las compañías de publicidad.

Recomiéndeles que no llenen cuestionaros, ofrecimientos de cosas gratis o solicitudes para concursos. Hay compañías que usan estas estrategias para sacarles información a los niños y luego la utilizan para tratar de comerciar con ellos directamente.

Asegúrese de que los niños sepan dónde se encuentran los botones "opt out" (no desea esa opción). Cuando los niños usan una página Web o descargan/bajan un servicio "app", a menudo deben aceptar la política de privacidad de la compañía, la cual podría no ser de alta privacidad. Muchas páginas Web dan la opción para que no se permita que terceras partes puedan recolectar información.

Cuando tenga dudas, edúquese. Antes de permitir que su niño se inscriba/use algún servicio, asegúrese de conocer todos lo que esto involucra. Manténgase informado ya que en esta cultura de "conexiones" donde hay compra y venta constante de información, nunca se puede ser demasiado cuidadoso.
