Holidays Fire Safety



The Newport Beach Fire Department wishes you and your family a very Happy Holiday season. Each year, fires during the holiday season injure 2000 individuals and cause over \$500 million dollars in damage. Most of these accidents are preventable by

taking a few simple life-saving steps. Here is a list of a few you can take to ensure a safer holiday season for you and

Have working smoke alarms on every level of your home. Change the batteries regularly and know when and how to call for help.

Be cautious with portable and space heaters. Place space heaters at least three feet (one meter) away from anything combustible, including wallpaper, bedding, clothing, pets and people. Never leave space heaters operating when you are not in the room or when you go to bed. Don't leave children or pets unattended with space heaters and do not hang or drape clothes to dry around a space heater.

• Have your chimney inspected by a professional. Creosote builds up in chimneys and can catch fire. Burn only wood in your fireplace or wood stove. Never burn wrapping paper or pine boughs. They can create sparks that go up the chimney and can ignite roofs or vegetation.

- Be sure the fireplace is covered with a sturdy metal screen or heat tempered glass doors. This reduces the chance of a fire starting from escaping sparks.
- If you hang stockings on your fireplace, do not use the fireplace for fires.
- Designate a non-drinking driver when you go out. Provide non-alcoholic beverages for guests who will be driving.
- Purchase only lights that are labeled as tested by a laboratory. For outside decorations, use only those lights labeled for outdoor use. Never put electrical lights on a metal Christmas tree. Decorate only with flame-retardant or noncombustible materials.
- Unplug decorative holiday lights before going out or to bed.
- Don't overload electrical outlets.
- Keep candles away from decorations or other combustible materials. Never leave children unattended with lit candles, or leave the house while candles are lit. Never put lit candles on a tree.
- Buy a fresh tree and water it daily. If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it is flame retardant. Do not place it near a heat source or exit.
- Take the tree out as soon as the holidays are over. The longer it stays, the drier it gets.



Unique Options

How quickly the year passes! Our first trimester ends December 2. At that point, students who have successfully completed all five of their assigned classes will earn 25 credits. Students who attend Back Bay High School can earn 75 credits per year. Our trimester is 60 days long, 30 days shorter than a regular semester. At a comprehensive site, students complete 30 credits per semester or 60 credits per year. By completing three successful trimesters at Back Bay, students can reach their goals of earning back credits previously failed. This allows students to earn 230 credits and graduate on time.

Monte Vista Independent Study High School has already graduated several students who were able to complete their last few classes in the fall. Monte Vista allows for continuous enrollment year round and encourages students to start their college classes prior to their high school graduation. Independent study is designed for students who can't attend school five days a week because of work responsibilities, a career, their participation in athletic competitions, extensive travel outside the state of California, or illness. It is a wonderful option for students and families who have different agendas than the typical five-day school week available at the comprehensive site.

Both of these schools have unique options for high school students who want to complete their high school diplomas but are having trouble staying on track. Newport Mesa is fortunate to have these highly respected high schools available to meet the needs of our community.

Athletics: 2010-11 Year in Review By Don Grable, Athletic Director

This past year, we had approximately 1,000 student athletes participating in 25 different sports programs represented by 64 different teams.

All CIF varsity teams eligible were recognized by CIF for having GPAs over 3.0, with 20 finishing in the top 20 in division schools.

Over 20 teams advanced to the playoffs, and 19 ranked in the county top 10 for much of the seasons. In the CIF Commissioners Cup yearly competi-

tion, boys' athletics tied for fourth-place finish, earning points for CIF Championships in water polo and volleyball, semifinal appearances in football and soccer, and third-place finish in swimming. Girls' athletics finished just out of the top 10, earning eight points with semifinals appearances in tennis, volleyball and water polo and third-place finish in cross-country.

Our athletic program was ranked number one and then number three in OC schools by the Orange County Register.

Overall, we had 11 league championships, two CIF titles, one SC Regional Championship, and one *national championship* as our boys' volleyball team finished the season as undefeated Pacific Coast League champions for the seventh straight vear.

Most importantly, our school and coaching staff worked hard daily with our student athletes to help them become better thinkers, communicators, competitors and teammates. We're proud of our accomplishments, and we know that the true success of working together will be how our students apply their daily learning in the future. We hope that as a result of participation in CDM High athletics, our students are better prepared to be great teammates for life in all that they do.

Preparing for the Future

The current state of education has forced many schools to focus its curriculum and instruction to the high-stakes testing season. The result has been an abandonment of what has always been essential to a learning community: authentic literacy.

By authentic literacy we mean purposeful reading, writing and talking. This year we had a schoolwide implementation of the Accelerated Reader program. It is designed to assesses reading levels to target a zone of development that in time

will increase reading ability and foster more independent reading.

In the classrooms, our teachers have embraced literacy by creating lessons that contain multiple texts matched to provocative and engaging questions. This year our focus at CMHS/MS is simple: teach our students how to read deeply and purposefully so that they can answer such questions, and then discuss and write about the texts to see what they have learned.

Finally, our students have undergone a reading assessment to help identify those who are still struggling with a grade-level text. These students are receiving targeted intervention during tutorial periods to provide them with the extra time and support they need to help strengthen their reading skills.

The demands of college, career and citizenship are increasingly the same, and can be met by almost any student who learns a literacy-rich curriculum. At CMHS/MS we are preparing our students for the future.

Magnet School Applies Science Learning

With our special focus on science, math and technology, Davis Magnet School applies student learning in many practical and useful ways. The scientific three R's of reduce, reuse and recycle are put into practice every day. From reducing electrical-energy consumption to reusable containers for student lunches to recycling in a wide variety of ways, our students are tuned in to doing their very best every day.

Davis Magnet School is participating in the Green Schools energy monitoring and conservation program promoted by the Principal Alliance to Save Energy and Southern California Edison. A team of students has been trained to use the energy monitoring devices.

We practice waste reduction at lunchtime. Our PTA encourages families to pack lunches in reusable containers. Students have been trained to sort out the recyclable materials from their school or home lunches. Separate containers are provided for six types of materials: plastic cookie or cracker packaging, foil chip bags, pouch-style drink containers, CRV beverage containers, clear zip-type baggies and clean cardboard lunch trays from the cafeteria.

We have a green-waste recycling program. Students are trained to discard their fruit and vegetable waste in separate containers at the lunch area. Green Team members are trained to transfer this material to five compost machines operated by the upper grades and to vermicomposters, or worm bins, operated by the primary grades.



Focus on Reading and Writing

In order to better prepare students for the college or career of their choice, the faculty at Estancia High School is focused on helping our students develop the skills colleges and employers are in search of. Colleges and universities desire students who are avid readers, strong writers, and critical thinkers. Employers are in search of employees who can think critically, do more than what is asked of them, and work collaboratively with teams located both in their physical offices and across the world.

The expectation is that Estancia students will receive reading instruction in every class and will read in every class every day. Students are engaged in purposeful reading by interacting closely with the information contained in the text. Students are asked to annotate the text by underlining or highlighting key words and phrases, identifying new vocabulary terms, and writing questions or comments which come to mind as they read. Students are then asked to think critically about the passages they read and discuss their thoughts with their peers. Another expectation is that students will receive writing instruction in every class and will write at least one three-paragraph essay in every class every month.

As a part of our collective commitment to improve our students' reading levels, instructional time allocated for Silent Sustained Reading (SSR) is being closely guarded. Teachers and the school librarian are helping students select reading materials which are commensurate with their reading abilities, administrators are reading with students during SSR, and many teachers are having students keep daily reading logs.





January programs are cool! One World Rhythm will be returning to the Central Library on Tuesday, January 10 at 4 p.m. This interactive


program is probably the noisiest you will ever get at the library. Come join in the percussion-playing fun!

Night Splints Can Help Foot Problems

It is common for people to consult the internet to search solutions for medical problems before contacting their doctor. This practice can be beneficial for the patient in providing valuable information about their condition so they can make informed decisions about treatment options when they visit with their doctor. On the other hand, many so-called medical education websites are actually a disguise for a commercial entity which is trying to sell remedies for medical problems which may or may not have any proven value.

When a runner researches the internet for remedies for heel pain, they often see advertisements for shoes, arch supports and "night splints." Night splints actually have proven value to help treat the underlying cause of many forms of heel pain in active athletes. The purpose of these devices is to provide a gentle stretch of the Achilles tendon of the patient during sleep. Improved flexibility of the Achilles tendon is thought to reduce the symptoms of plantar fasciitis which is the most common cause of heel pain in runners.

Night splints can also be an effective treatment for Achilles tendinitis. While stretching of the Achilles is always recommended for treatment of this condition, many runners will find that they always get tighter in their calf while sleeping. Night splints can prevent the natural tightening of the calf muscle and Achilles tendon while sleeping and this can greatly enhance the normal stretching program which runners should do during the day in treating painful heel conditions. These splints can be purchased not only from internet web sites but also from physicians, podiatrists, and physical therapists.
