

First N-MUSD School to Become AVID Affiliate: Rea Elementary School

Beginning in the 2016–2017 school year, Rea Elementary School will be the first school in Newport-Mesa Unified School District to convert to an Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) Elementary and Technology School, preparing students for college and career success in a global society.

AVID brings research-based strategies and curriculum to educational institutions that

develop students' critical thinking, literacy, and math skills across all content areas throughout the entire campus. AVID focuses on four areas to best prepare students for academic success: instruction, culture, leadership, and systems with key components. AVID key components include:



- Organizational Skills both mental and physical: students learn to use organizational tools, as well as learn and practice time-management and goal-setting skills.
- Partnerships among students, classrooms, grade levels, schools, feeder patterns, families, and communities.

Along with implementing the core AVID components into lesson plans, Rea Elementary will continue to focus on enrichment opportunities in Science, Technology, Reading,

Engineering, Art, and Math (STREAM), Visual and Performing Arts (VAPA), and Leadership, aligning all learning opportunities to preparing Rea students for college and career readiness.

To prepare for the AVID implementation and refinement, teachers will participate in various training courses and continue to collaborate weekly throughout the academic year. Specifically they will address content areas in reading, writing,

> and math and the alignment to Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, Organization, and Reading to Learn (WICOR) lessons, with a strong emphasis on formative data collection to ensure students are meeting their individual goals.

The program will include student success and organization goals, which will be established at the beginning of the school year

through collaboration with grade-level teams and meetings with parents. Small groups of students also will work with teachers on their individual goals in reading, writing, vocabulary, and math, which instills a sense of personal responsibility and overall motivation to be successful.

Additionally, grade-level teams work together to communicate and model strategies during parent workshops, so that every child's support system is working together to support student success. Parent informational meetings about Rea Elementary becoming an AVID Affiliate were held in March.

Childhood Sleep Problems

The amount of sleep children need gradually decreases as they mature.

Newborns usually nap about 16 hours through the day and night, while teenagers need about nine hours of sleep per night. For many parents, getting their children to go to bed and stay there can be quite frustrating Here are some simple steps to follow that can help put a stop to bedtime troubles:

- Stick to the same bedtime every night, even on weekends.
- Turn off the television, video games and computer at least one hour before going to bed. Have a consistent routine that includes brushing teeth, going to the bathroom and maybe reading a short story.
- Keep a low noise level in the house while the child is asleep.

Some childhood sleep problems called parasomnias, include night terrors, sleepwalking and sleep talking. Night terrors involve episodes of fear, flailing or screaming that can last a few minutes while the child is asleep and affect only a small number of children aged three to 12. Sleepwalking typically starts between the ages of four and 8. Sleepwalkers may look like they are awake, but actually they are sleeping and may be at risk for injury by falling down stairs or opening windows. When sleep talking, speech is mumbled and unintelligible. Parents should not try to wake children up. Instead guide them back to bed or gently reassure them.

Not getting enough sleep for children may lead to difficulties in school, anxiety disorders and behavioral problems. For more information about childhood sleep problems, talk with your doctor.

California School recently enjoyed some fun, readingcentered activities we call Literacy Week.


Activities included a book swap, college day, and an Imagination Machine assembly. For the assembly, the students were able to write and submit stories for


the group to act out in front of the school population. We are also looking forward to our annual Jog-a-thon, which is fast approaching.

Estancia High began offering Advanced Placement Environmental Science during the school year. One of the goals is to provide opportunities to analyze environmental problems, both natural and human-made, and examine alternative solutions for resolution and prevention.

Students in the class have had excellent learning opportunities outside the classroom. They have conducted monthly water-quality testing in the Fairview Park

wetlands and performed biodiversity measurements of the Little Corona and Back Bay Science Center tide pools. These measurements are important indicators of overall ecological health. Students have also followed raw sewage through our local treatment and recycling facilities and then tasted the water that had previously been sewage.

These experiences have been invaluable for applying classroom learning to the real world.

An Amazing Classroom Concept

Our fifth-grade students recently had the opportunity to experience BreakoutEDU. Its concept is simple: you are "locked" in a classroom with clues to help you break out in a set period of time.

Placed around the classroom were three boxes fastened with a variety of locks. Students had to solve clues in order to put together an electrical circuit. Using all of the

components, the students were able to assemble the circuit displaying a three-digit code. The final box was opened by

using the code where a lengthy html code was also written on a piece of paper. Deciphering the code, the students then typed this link to a Google form on their iPad with the winning message.

With 13 minutes and 51 seconds remaining on the clock, we were left stunned by not only how well my students did, but how amazing this concept was for our classroom. With the ability to embed content standards from all academic areas, as well as incorporate 4Cs, problemsolving strategies, higher-order thinking skills, and fun, BreakoutEDU will reinvent the classroom!

Concussion and Your Student

A concussion is a bump, blow, or jolt to the head that changes the way the brain usually works. What may seem like a mild bump to the head can be serious in nature. The signs and symptoms of a concussion might be displayed right after an injury occurs, or hours to days afterwards. Symptoms include confusion, difficulty recalling events prior to injury, headache, light sensitivity, nausea, vomiting, dizziness, balance issues, or changes in personality.

Seek medical attention right away if a concussion is suspected. A healthcare provider experienced in evaluating a student for such an injury will be able to determine its seriousness, as well as when it is appropriate for your student to return to regular play and learning.

A student with a concussion should not return to physical activity the same day as the injury. Students should only return to physical and cognitive activities after they are cleared by a qualified healthcare provider. School nurses are a good resource should you have any questions or concerns about your student's health needs.

In the student transportation field, the increasing pace of technological change has led us to build much safer school buses. In fact, the U.S. yellow school bus is the envy of the world due to its unmatchable safety record.

But technology doesn't just contribute to the design and construction of incredibly

safe buses; it helps us to provide better service. For example, we can locate any of our buses instantly by using global-positioning satellite devices. We can contact our drivers and they can contact us from virtually anywhere in our service area using high-frequency, two-way radios.

We process, assign, and bill more than 3,000 field trips every year. It wouldn't be possible to effectively perform all of these trips without automation. Similarly, routing almost 5,000 students in an efficient and effective manner could not be accomplished with computerized support.

So, the next time you find yourself longing for a simpler time, please remember that, at least in student transportation, simpler wasn't necessarily better.





One by one my tongue turned green (from licking to sticking) filling the pages in the special books. White pages would soon turn green, which was as good as gold for us. After my task was completed, the family would gather around the table and pour over the redemption catalogue. We would be rewarded for our shopping loyalty with gifts! From toasters to trips or toys, the possibilities were endless. 1200 stamps and the book was filled. Valued at approximately \$3.00 book, each of us had our green stamp wish list. The results were tangible, like my first Eastman Kodak Brownie 1962 Camera!

As the checker at Von's hands me my receipt, she forces a smile, struggles to pronounce my difficult last name and says in a rote manner, "Mrs. Ashendorf, You have saved \$2.67 today." I can't help thinking about green stamps and remembering when...


My Sister-in-Law's Kids



Can Parents Lead Their Kids to Drink?

Q. We are strong religious family and are clear and certain of our values and what we need to teach. We have a 17 year old who is going to a university across the country in the Fall. We are in a parent group, (who's children are also going off to college) in which the most frustrating conversation emerged. The discussion was about whether you should discuss "drinking

alcohol before you turn 21" with your kids! Is this a new trend?? I know there are certain parents that are so "open" that they actually buy alcohol for their kids parties. I can't believe that a seemingly intelligent group of parents, with decent children are even thinking about discussing underage drinking! My son knows that this is absolutely unacceptable, against the law and against our values! What am I missing? — Nancy B. Lincoln NE

A. Here is what you are missing Nancy. Very soon, your child will no longer be under your roof. Your child will have multiple other influences in his life. While your child might hold strong to his familial value system, he deserves to be prepared for all influences of live that are quickly approaching, whether those influences and external and societal pressures, or the questions and struggles that emerge internally.

The risk you run by NOT communicating with him openly, is that you become a closed door, and you send the message that you will not be a part of the process when he needs to sort through feelings, desires and pressures. By being that closed door, Nancy, you miss out on one of the most important functions of parenting your newly "adulted" child. Don't lose the opportunity.

That said, Nancy, I understand your fears. You likely feel that discussing something means condoning it. Just realize you can be a stronger influence to help him avoid underage drinking if you communicate with him about these things than if you don't!

To illustrate, consider this: It is a fact that, in the college years it is wildly acceptable for students to engage in drinking contests, or consume so much alcohol that they get sick or pass out. One study suggested that over 80% of college students at a certain university indicated that they had one of these experiences at least once.

You can offer your child more than the lecture: That is BAD and DONT DO IT. Talk openly about the real risks. There are multiple horror stories available at your fingertips. But don't do so without telling the truth about the potential appeal of it. If you miss the latter, not only do you lose credibility and the ability for him to relate to you, you will send your child off unprepared for the inevitable forces that will face him. Please don't do that Nancy. Talk with your son.


