#### **Creating a K-12 Math Experience for Students**

One of our primary district priorities is to provide a challenging curriculum aligned to the California State Standards. This school year, we adopted new math instructional materials for kindergarten through 5th grade. We also are in the process of piloting math materials for 6th through 8th grade, and next year we anticipate piloting 9th through 12th grade math materials. Upon completion of the adoption

processes, our district will have the materials for a cohesive math experience across all grade levels, designed to better prepare students for future success in college and career.

Recognizing the significant instructional shifts the state standards and frameworks for math demand from math teachers our district has been providing support for them. Our district has provided increased support through additional training and supporting nine K-5 teachers to serve as Math Leads. These leads work monthly with the Orange County Department of Education (OCDE) math coordinators to deepen their understanding of math content while preparing a grade-level specific professional development opportunity for NMUSD teachers for each

upcoming math unit. Math teachers then host a monthly two hour Moonlight Series to support teachers in preparation for upcoming

As part of a successful math implementation, our elementary schools have begun incorporating parent education sessions. Each school site has flexibility as to how they engage.

educate, and provide parents with resources to support their child's learning. Some schools have hosted "bring your parent to math class day" or "muffins and math day," for parents to see firsthand what math looks like in the classroom. Schools are also hosting formal parent meetings and presentations to provide a greater understanding of the state standards and how students are learning math concepts.

Teacher training and support paired with parent education and involvement makes for a more successful transition for our students.



#### **Essentials of Car Seat Safety**

Car seat safety may seem overwhelming with so many makes, models and options available but, the type of safety seat your child needs is primarily determined by your child's age and size.

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) and

California Law, infants need to ride in rear-facing car seats until they are

two years old unless they weigh 40 pounds or more or are 40" tall or more. Children should ride in forward-facing car seats for as long as possible. For convertible seats that have been turned from rear to forward-facing, harness shoulder straps should be moved to slots that are at or below the child's shoulders. Children should only switch to a booster seat that relies on the car's seatbelts when they exceed the height and weight limit for the car seat. California Law states that children under the age of eight



must be secured in a car seat or booster seat in the back seat. Booster seats should not be used with only a lap belt. Children should stay in booster seats until they reach 4'9" (generally between eight and 12 years old) and adult seat belts fit correctly. The AAP recommends that all children younger than 13 should continue to ride in the back seat.

If you're not confident of how to properly secure your child in a safety seat, contact your local CHP Area Office, and ask to speak with a child passenger safety technician or visit www.chp.ca.gov.

#### **Practicing Essential Math Skills**

On February 14, more than 130 Killybrooke parents participated in Family Math Morning, an event designed to help parents learn more about how their child is learning math at school, and how they can further support their mastery of grade-level math standards.

Students and parents engaged in activities from our recently adopted K–5 math curriculum

called "Bridges in Mathematics." This is a comprehensive curriculum that is rigorous, coherent, and engaging for students. Using the Bridges materials in a systematic way, Killybrooke teachers employ a combination of direct instruction, structured investigation, and open exploration, all to ensure our students master grade-level standards.

At Family Math Morning, students accompanied their parents into the classrooms before the school day began to show them the classroom "Number Corner," a skill-building component of Bridges that revolves around the classroom calendar and provides daily practice opportunities with

a variety of critical mathematical concepts. Students and parents also had the chance to engage with "Work Places," another component of Bridges that prompts students to practice essential math skills through activities that are interactive, hands-on, and game-like.

Killybrooke teachers facilitated the parent-child activities in the classrooms, answered questions, and provided parents with ideas to help their children at home. When the school bell rang to signal the beginning of the instructional day for students, the parents moved into the multipurpose room to listen to a presentation led by Dr. Hoggard, Mrs. Leysen, Mrs. Antonopoulos, and NMUSD Math Lead Teacher Shelly Ryan. #### **Vision Is Important**

Good vision is important to a child's success in school. Children perform visual tasks daily. These include reading, writing, board work and using computers. Vision changes can occur without parents or the child knowing. Signs of vision problems include avoiding reading or other near work, frequent eye rubbing, squinting or blinking, headaches, head tilting, an eye turning

inward or outward, and sitting close to screens.

Children should have yearly vision exams with a medical

provider, followed by a comprehensive optometric eye exam for specific vision concerns. The earlier a vision problem is identified and treated, the more likely the treatment will be successful. For example, regular vision screening early in childhood reduces the risk of persistent amblyopia by more than 50 percent. Amblyopia, known as lazy eye, results in decreased vision in an eye that otherwise appears normal. If not caught and treated early, the treatment is less effective and vision may not be restored.

School nurses are trained in vision screening and available to address concerns. Please contact your school nurse for assistance with vision or health issues.

#### **Encouraging Students**

Encouraging Students to Select More Fruits and Vegetables with Meals

The evidence supporting the benefits of increased fruit and vegetable consumption is strong. However, it is not strong enough to convince a child to trade in their candy bar for an apple. With kids, taste typically trumps healthfulness. So how does the team at nutrition service encourage students to select more fruits and vegetables with their meals?

#### We Captivate Interest with Posters:

Just as an ad for melty, hot pizza stimulates an appetite for it, our professional photographs of juicy oranges, ripe strawberries, and crisp lettuce can make produce more appealing. Our posters, strategically placed in the cafeteria, change with seasonal fruits and veggies offered to help kids get excited about their meal options.

#### 2. We Mix it Up

Kids can get bored of the same old apples slices and

carrots sticks or whatever daily option is served. Offering a variety of different fruits and vegetables keeps healthy eating interesting and gives kids more options to choose from. At least two different options of seasonal, locally sourced fruits and veggies are provided at each meal.

#### 3. We Pair for Participation

A tasty dip or sauce can lessen the bitter aftertaste that certain veggies may have to a child's unaccustomed taste buds. Allowing kids to pair broccoli (or other seasonal veggies) with our low-fat ranch can make vegetable eating more enjoyable. Moreover, we creatively incorporate vegetables into our entrées items. Examples include Asian Chicken Salad and Pasta with Tomato Marinara.

While the candy bar may still be in the picture, a stomach full on fiber rich produce may likely lessen the appeal to it. With these three strategies, the nutrition services department makes fruits and vegetables a more attractive option, encouraging students to test the waters with more produce.

Ladysmith's latest children's collection, a 2017 Grammy nominee, carves a restful, thoughtful space into a world that has been too full of noise and confusion for both children and adults. Both lyrics and vocals are sung in a spirit of humanity and harmony and in tribute to late South African president Nelson Mandela.

"We know firsthand how hard it is to raise children in a world of conflict, in a world where children need positive role models and positive words," group member Albert Mazibuko said. "We hope our songs can be an important part of the lessons of peace and love that all parents want to impart to their children."

"Everything's So Stupid" lays out the honest frustration in parent-child communication—from both sides. "Different Colors Mean Nothing to Me" tells of how different races and languages are not things to be overcome but part of the world's beauty. And there's a Zulu version of "Old MacDonald."

The overall message of Ladysmith is that talking to one another can pave the way for communication and, hopefully, peace. Let these songs move you along—they'll put diamonds on the souls.



#### **Our Kids Deserve Safe and Secure Campuses**

More than anything, we owe it to our students to provide them with safe and secure campuses where learning thrives. Moreover, we owe it to parents to return their children each day just as healthy and happy as when they arrived.

Yet we have seen so many instances nationally where acts of violence break the sanctity of school communities, including horrific tragedies like the recent mass

shooting that took the lives of 17 people at a high school in Florida.

To say school shootings occur too often in the United States is an understatement. Once is too often.

I wish it weren't necessary to write this column. However, I want to offer my most heartfelt condolences to anyone impacted by senseless violence, and I want to reaffirm the ongoing commitment of the Orange County Department of Education and leaders throughout our region to proactively protect our schools — and specifically our students and staff.

Let's start with some background. Each year, campuses in California are required by law to update their Comprehensive Safe School Plans, which, among other things, outline each site's planned responses to various crises. These are routinely reinforced through site-level drills including evacuations and shelter-in-place exercises.

The strategies that schools employ to promote safety will vary by campus and are ultimately up to each district's school board and superintendent, in partnership with teachers, staff, students and communities. But OCDE has long supported this work with trainings and workshops throughout the year, covering a raft of topics including school safety plans, earthquake preparedness, behavioral threat assessments, resilience strategies and active-shooter behavioral indicators.

Our department also works closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department and other local law enforcement agencies to discuss everything from cyberbullying to securing school facilities. Additionally, OCDE and the Sheriff's Department team up every summer to host the <u>Safe Schools Conference</u> with the California Department of Education. This three-day event brings together more than 500 educators and law enforcement representatives from throughout the state to discuss issues and trends related to campus violence, bullying, social media, human trafficking, gangs and substance abuse.

In the case of critical incidents impacting schools, OCDE's Crisis Response Network deploys psychologists, nurses, social workers and other personnel to support students and staff during and after emergencies. This team also provides training to schools, youth service providers, parents and students.


I would add that OCDE continues to promote positive school climates and anti-bullying through such initiatives as the Multi-Tiered System of Support framework, Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports — often referred to as PBIS — and our One Billion Acts of Kindness campaign, which was launched in 2016 to promote character and amplify civility in our communities.

Our perception of the world changed forever on April 20, 1999, when a pair of high school students killed 12 of their classmates and a teacher on the campus of Columbine High School. From that day forward, educators have worked closely with law enforcement to continually assess schools and implement protocols to make them safer.

Suffice to say, this a race that has no finish line — not now, not ever.

If game-changing technologies emerge that can enhance our work, we will pursue them. If there are better practices elsewhere in the world, we will adopt them. Simply put, we will vigorously research any measure that protects our students and staff from internal or external threats.

The stakes are too high to rest for a second on this issue, and we owe our kids nothing less.


