Estancia Medical Academy

Newport-Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD) Patient Care Pathway at Estancia High School, known as the Estancia Medical Academy (EMA), has found great success in preparing high school students for careers in the medical field by combining academic instruction with career technical education.

EMA utilizes leading-edge equipment and instruction from the finest industry professionals to prepare students for diverse health career opportunities available in the medical industry. The program began in 2011, since its inception NMUSD in partnership with Coastline Regional Occupational

Mr. Hayato Yuuki, the EMA coordinator, and primary instructor brings 15 years of experience working in the medical field. In addition to teaching, Mr. Yuuki currently works as an emergency medical technician - paramedic (EMT-P) at UC Irvine Medical Center, as part of the trauma team. EMA provides students access to current industry experiences.

Program, has helped students kick start their careers and

create a robust pipeline into the regional workforce.

"Not only is Mr. Yuuki teaching us from the book, but he is giving us real-life situations that he has been a part of. His experience in the medical field makes it that much better," said Myles Witte, Estancia High School junior and EMA student. "Pursuing a career in medicine is something I can do to help people out, and it is such an honorable thing to be a part of."

Students learn the ethical and legal responsibilities of the health care worker, safety, HIPAA, infection control, transporting duties, human anatomy and physiology, the function of body systems, advanced terminology, and vital signs including blood pressure, temperature, and heart rate.

The career technical education students are immersed in an interactive environment. Half of the classroom space is dedicated to lecture and the other half is equipped with the latest medical technology mirroring a hospital emergency room. Students gain hands-on knowledge in the

simulation lab with equipment such as a Nursing Kelly, an advanced manikin that mimics actual medical symptoms, an electrocardiography monitor, medical gurneys and more. They also have the opportunity to complete a ride-along with a local fire department or job shadow a trauma team in a hospital emergency room, giving them real-life medical career knowledge.

"Being able to take EMA classes in high school prepared me for my emergency medical technician course and gave me a solid foundation for what I do," said Jenny Gonzales, EMA graduate and emergency medical technician at Care Ambulance Service. "I always knew I wanted to be in public service and doing a ridealong with Mr. Yuuki solidified my decision to become an EMT."

EMA courses include introduction to medical careers. medical terminology, emergency medical responders and the capstone class, sports medicine. Interested students may enroll in the program their sophomore year and complete the program in their senior year.

EMA students have the opportunity to join the Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) as well, an organization specifically designed for future health professionals to develop leadership and technical skills through a program of motivation, awareness, and recognition, which are an integral part of the Health Science Education instructional program.

Every year HOSA students choose a medical category to compete in at the state level. Competitions include several rounds and consist of an online exam and practical skills test. If students successfully complete and pass all aspects of testing, they're eligible for a variety of award recognitions. Since HOSA launched at Estancia in 2014 they have placed in the categories of clinical nursing. forensic science and medicine, dental terminology and more. This year's competition will be in Sacramento on March 28 - 30, 2019.



Human Trafficking

In a perfect world, all students would walk into our classrooms free of distress and distraction, ready to absorb the knowledge and skills they'll need to succeed in college and career, and beyond.

But today's educators must be responsive to extraordinary circumstances that can inhibit teaching and learning, such as poverty, violence and homelessness.

Despite these major issues, we must also be aware of the malignancy caused by human trafficking here in Orange County. According to a 2016 report, women and children account for 90 percent of the victims.

That brings us to some of the bigger myths about human trafficking: We tend to think it happens mainly to adults, and in communities other than our own.

The real picture is vastly more complicated and difficult to combat, because human traffickers use deception, manipulation, intimidation and threats to prey on and exploit those who are vulnerable. Victims are often coerced into prostitution, illicit drugs and other forms of trafficking. According to the organization Polaris, this has grown to become a multi-billion dollar criminal industry, one that quietly strips nearly 25 million people of their freedom.

I'll be the first to acknowledge this is a subject that is difficult to discuss, but it is a scourge in our city, county, state and country, and it affects the lives of children and young adults. Believe it or not, the victimization begins early in life and it is imperative that we strengthen our schools and public institutions to recognize how to combat this problem.

To that end, the Orange County Department of Education teamed up with our partners at Vanguard University to participate in the "Ensure Justice 2019" conference. This two-day event was designed to equip teachers, parents, law enforcement personnel, students and community members with strategies to identify and protect those who are most at risk.

Prevention starts with shedding light on perpetrators and recognizing tell-tale signs in our communities. This may include evidence of malnourishment or abuse, withdrawal, drug abuse, and chronic absenteeism.

In Orange County, I believe we are well-positioned to prevent trafficking and the exploitation of children. In addition to working closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department and other local law enforcement agencies, our educators are committed to addressing the social-emotional needs of all students through initiatives such as the Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) framework. In fact, OCDE is leading the statewide implementation of MTSS, which provides core supports for all students, additional assistance for some and targeted interventions for those with the greatest needs.

Restoration / Development

With the support of city staff and our new City Council colleagues, a restoration of the character and safety of Westside neighborhoods is well underway.

On Friday April 26, we officially open our new library in Lions Park. This \$36 million project will include a 20,000-square-foot library with a Children's and Teen Center and a one-acre programmed park. Additionally,

we are collecting input on a new Airplane Park playground, please help us design this new playground. https://www.costamesaca.gov/lionsparkplayground

Other Westside restoration efforts include the new bridge shelter at Lighthouse Church, opening April 5. This approximately \$300,000 investment will alleviate local impacts from individuals experiencing homelessness and provide relief as we build a permanent shelter by the airport. We also hired a professional operator, began improving security and lighting, installed a new fence, and will increase our police presence to ensure we are good neighbors.

Finally, more than \$2.5 million has been budgeted to pave alleys, add bike facilities, improve curbs and gutters, build medians, improve parkways and playgrounds. Join us April 26 as we unveil the new Westside Lions Park Projects.

Being Prepared

Fire, law enforcement, and emergency services are evolving every day to help provide the highest level of public safety for the community on a 24/7/365 basis. One of the most important aspects to our collective efforts relate to the community being properly prepared to handle any disaster. This April & May, we are asking everyone to take action in Being Prepared by creating

your own basic emergency kit and having a clear plan in place to handle any significant emergency or disaster, whether at home, school, and at the workplace. Create a realistic plan, share the plan, and practice the plan monthly.

A basic emergency supply kit should always start with the following recommended items:

- Water one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days (drinking & sanitation)
- Food at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio (extra batteries)
- Flashlight (extra batteries) First aid kit
- Mobile phone (with chargers and back-up)


Carbon Monoxide Safety

More than 150 people in the US die each year from accidental non-fire related carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless and odorless gas. Carbon monoxide poisoning can occur when a fuel-burning appliance or machine, such as a furnace, heater or generator, is not working or vented properly. Breathing in CO at high levels can be fatal. Here are a few things you can do to protect your home from CO poisoning:

- Install and maintain CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of CO.
- Install CO alarms in a central location outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- Use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas away from all doors, windows, and vents.
- Make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow and other debris.

Don't be the victim of a preventable accident. Check your home for possible CO leaks and educate your family for signs and symptoms of CO exposure.

Pregnancy Over 35

First birth rates for women aged 35-39 rose six-fold from 1973-2006, and more than doubled for women aged 40-44 from 1980-2012. With so many women giving birth later in life, it's important to know the possible risks.

Conception: Each woman is born with a set number of eggs and, as you age, both the number and the quality of them declines, and the eggs you have left may not be as easily fertilized.

Gestational Diabetes: Gestational diabetes occurs when glucose levels rise significantly during pregnancy, putting you at risk of having a very large baby with other health problems.

High Blood Pressure: High blood pressure can decrease the flow of blood to the placenta, which can lead to slow growth, low birth weight or preterm birth.


Preeclampsia Preeclampsia occurs when a pregnant woman develops high blood pressure and has signs that some of her organs are not functioning properly.

Multiples: As you age, your chance of having twins or multiples increases. About 5% of births among women over 35 are twins, while almost 20% of women over 45 had multiples.

C-section: Approximately 42% of pregnant women aged 35-39 had C-sections, compared to just 28% of women between 20 and 24.

Premature: A baby is considered preterm when born before 37 weeks and they tend to have more health problems.

Women over 35 may or may not experience the above risks, but because of these risks, you should consider choosing a hospital that has a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU). Connect with an obstetrician early in the process, and follow their guidance for the best possible outcome.





and remnants of life with their deceased Muslim mother. The account is at times sad, hopeful, thrilling, and enlightening. This magnificent storytelling was awarded a 2019 Newbery Honor for American children's literature.

Hello Lighthouse by Sophie Blackall teams descriptive text with gorgeous illustrations to create a powerful portrait of an early 20th century lighthouse in this year's winner of the Caldecott Medal for the most distinguished American picture book. I enjoyed the juxtaposition of information on operating the lighthouse along with the human aspect of living in that remote location. Although a fictional account, the author includes a page of facts and anecdotes from her research at the end of the book.

Most adults are aware of the importance of mental health. We understand the mind-body connection and the link to clear thinking, taking positive action, healthy relationships. and productivity.


There has been rising concern for youth and their mental health. A recent study (JAMA Pediatrics, February 2019) showed that 16.5 percent and as many as one-in-six U.S. children between the ages of 6 to 17 years

have at least one mental health disorder. Also reported was the high variability for youth accessing care. National data reveal that children rarely receive mental health screening even when there is a medical home, and more rarely get diagnosed, let alone receive treatment for a mental disorder.

In Orange County, the Orange County Children's Partnership publishes an annual report on the Conditions of Children. In February, I was invited to attend a convening of community members to discuss one aspect of the report, mental health. Although improvements in child health have been made in Orange County, mental health is still a concern. Data in the report helps schools and service providers throughout Orange County to prioritize their services and programs. In Newport-Mesa, we are concerned about the whole child, including physical, mental, social, and academic health. The District, like others in the County, is moving toward the implementation of multi-tiered systems of support for all students, including positive school cultures.

Nurses and health staff are part of the education team. We collaborate with school colleagues to support our students. The health office is sensitive to children seeking care during the school day, and we will contact parents should there be concerns related to physical and mental health. Also, know that we welcome communication from parents. Please let us know about your child's health.


Skipping breakfast can make students feel tired and restless. Studies show that children
