I am pleased to announce that Newport-Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD) received three 2016 Golden Bell Awards from the California School Board Association (CSBA) for its Psychological Support Services Program, Bus in the Classroom Program and Data Dashboards.



The CSBA Golden Bell Awards. now in its 37th year, promotes excellence in education and school board governance by recognizing outstanding programs and governance practices of school boards in school districts and county offices of education throughout

Here is a brief overview of our three award winning programs:

Psychological Support Services

NMUSD's Psychological Support Services programs provides support for educationally related mental health services and also supports the social and emotional well-being of students by providing support to students struggling with homelessness, drugs, bullying and other related circumstances.

The program recognizes that schoolbased mental health services are far more than just counseling. Comprehensive mental health services range from prevention and skills development to intervention and evaluation, referral and collaboration, and consultation and counseling.



NMUSD Psychological Support Services Team

The Psychological Support Services program includes partnerships with parents, school-based professionals, and more than 30 community agencies to provide a comprehensive continuum of care for all students.

Data Dashboards

NMUSD's Data Dashboards provide consolidated and meaningful from a variety of sources, such as the Local Control Accountability Plan, student grades, testing information, discipline, attendance, benchmarks for math, English, and reading benchmarks.

Each dashboard is custom designed by

NMUSD staff and includes dynamic information with high levels of interactivity, allowing data to be seen at a high

level or drilled down to specific schools, classrooms and students.

District staff and school administrators use the data dashboards in "Data Chats", which includes collaborative teams reviewing data to find trends to set goals, discover areas of need, manage attendance and discipline, identify professional

development needs, create interventions for students who need support and more.

Bus in the Classroom

One of the primary goals of special education is to create learning environments that lead students to be as independent as possible. The Bus in the Classroom Program goes beyond the classroom and into the bus, teaching transportation skills to students with special needs, by fostering independence, a safer school career and a more productive post K-12 life for students with special needs.

The program takes teams of transportation professionals to school sites to teach one-hour sessions for four weeks. The sessions teach students basic skills, such as waiting for the bus, boarding the bus, riding the bus and exiting the bus. A fifth session involves community-based instruction where the bus delivers the students to their bus stops to practice these essential skills, oftentimes with the assistance of parents.





Sports Nutrition for Children

A healthy diet, with the right combination and amount of food, is essential for an athletic child's higher level of activity and energy needs. Here are some tips to help children perform at the best levels:

- It takes time to digest food stop eating two hours before game-day activity starts to save energy levels for the event.
- High-fiber foods are nutritious but may cause stomach upset - don't eat them before activity.
- High-fat foods take longer to digest avoid them up to three hours before a game or event.
- Eat plenty of carbohydrates (in fruits, vegetables and whole grains) along with a moderate amount of proteins (in meat, eggs and dairy).
- Fluids are critical in preventing dehydration during activity. Experts recommend drinking water or other fluids in 15-20 minute intervals during and after the activity to replenish fluid levels lost through sweat.

- The body depletes its readily available energy supply after one hour of exercise. Sports drinks help replenish electrolytes and are a good option for kids who are active for 60 - 90 minutes.
- Athletic kids need calcium and iron in their diets to build strong bones and sustain energy. Dairy products, green leafy vegetables, meat, dried beans and fortified cereals are good sources.

Many children participate in sports that place a heavy emphasize on appearance and weight. This can cause pressure and potentially an unhealthy obsession with weight gain or reduction that could last a lifetime. Dieting is usually not a good idea for athletic kids because they need the additional calories to sustain high energy levels for activity. Dieting also can prevent a growing child from reaching his or her intended height. Parents should discuss diet options with a doctor or nutritionist if a coach recommends that a child lose weight.

Dealing with Obstacles to Attendance

Back Bay students are fast approaching the end of the first trimester. For those students who have been on track with good attendance, it means that they'll have earned 25 credits. By the end of the third trimester, hardworking students will have earned 75 credits as opposed to 60 in the regular comprehensive program. This helps students repeat and earn credit for previously failed classes.

Students are required to earn 230 credits to graduate from our district. Students who failed requirements must

retake those classes to graduate. Many students failed classes because of poor attendance. The reasons are numerous and often beyond the students' control. They include "skipping" to hang out with friends, drug or alcohol use, family situations, financial crisis, personal mental and physical health reasons, incarceration of the student or a parent, and the death of a close family member.

Life can be challenging for adults, and some of these situations have been handled by 16-year-olds. That's why Back Bay Continuation High School exists and why Monte Vista independent study provides opportunities for students to stay in school and graduate!

The Ensign Intermediate School staff spent the entire day on November 2 working on writing across the curriculum. National writing expert Carol Jago worked with staff on advanced writing strategies to incorporate into every classroom, from science to history to physical education.

The science team discussed effective writing techniques in lab write-ups, while the history department designed lessons requiring students to use multiple original source documents to argue a specific historical perspective. Teachers are aligning writing practices to ensure students receive consistent, researchdriven practices in every class.

Although a laser focus on writing is not the flashiest focus, it will empower our students to make a claim, support that claim with evidence from valid sources. analyze the information, and organize the information into a coherent argument—a very useful skill in life.

Smarter Lunchrooms By Pam Williams, MPH, RD; NMUSD Nutritionist

Smarter Lunchrooms is a movement that encourages students to make healthy choices in our school cafeterias. Although schools provide fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and other healthy choices, the students may or may not choose them.

The Smarter Lunchroom Movement includes an assessment of school cafeterias

to determine possible changes to help nudge our students towards healthy foods. These changes are easy to implement and are inexpensive.

But are these changes effective? According to the Cornell Center for Behavioral Economics in Child Nutrition Programs, they do impact our students' food choices. For example, the study reports that students often overlook fruit, but will take more if it is placed in a visible location and presented attractively. Cafeteria managers can place a colorful bowl or basket in a high-traffic area such as the cash register.

This increased visibility will help to remind our students to eat more fruit. Here at NMUSD, we are now placing attractive baskets with produce in these high-traffic areas to motivate our students to add an apple or other piece of fruit to their meals.

The Smarter Lunchroom Movement is indeed an added value in getting our students to eat healthy!

For many, 2016 has been an immensely challenging year, culminating with one of the most toxic and divisive elections in the history of our country.

The latest election cycle has, it seems, reopened old wounds, and electoral maps suggest we live in a nation increasingly divided by politics, ideology and values. Yet there is one trait that unites all Americans.

and it is a trait we need to embrace now more than ever. It is kindness.

In May, the Orange County Department of Education launched the One Billion Acts of Kindness initiative as a way to promote civility, character and positive school climates in Orange County and beyond. We also envisioned this campaign as a way to spotlight the compassion that occurs each and every day, often quietly or unnoticed.

So far, we haven't been disappointed. Well over half a million good deeds have been logged on www.kindness1billion.org and on social media with the hashtag #kindness1billion. And scores of new ones roll in each week.

We've heard heartwarming stories from everyday people who are providing food and clothing for the homeless. baking cookies for veterans and finding lost dogs. We've heard from children who have welcomed newcomers to school, and we've heard from more than a few kids who have spotted someone sitting alone at lunch and invited them to dine together.

One girl said she simply complimented a classmate she didn't know on her new haircut — and now the two are friends

As you can see, kindness doesn't have to be a sweeping movement that immediately impacts thousands. But each compassionate act has the potential to start a chain reaction that can change the world. At the very least, kindness reveals an inner humanity in all of us that transcends politics, race and other barriers used to divide us.

Since the One Billion Acts of Kindness campaign began, a number of local school districts and community organizations have reached out to let us know they're on board, and many are organizing their own activities and logging their counts on www.kindness1billion.org. Included among them are the Girl Scouts of Orange County and the Boy Scouts of America Orange County Council, which asked its members and volunteers to commit at least one act of kindness per day in November.

We hope this momentum will continue into 2017, with benefits that cascade across the state and throughout the country. And OCDE will continue to champion this cause, because kindness is a sustainable resource that drives society. It's also a virtue that powerfully manifests character, and character defines who we are.

Our electoral maps may show stark patches of red and blue, but we are certainly more than a nation of two political parties. We are, and will continue to be, a country of compassion, love and inclusion, reinforced every day, one kind act at a time.
