
While our focus is on student learning and success, we also have placed a strong focus on educating our parent community with a series of Parent Education Workshops.

The United States Fire Association recommends inspecting holiday lights before placing them on a tree. Throw away strands with frayed or pinched wires. # Loss of Family Member




In November, we lost a valued member of our Costa Mesa Fire Family when Captain Mike Kreza was fatally struck by a vehicle while riding his bike near his home.

#### Is Milk Important? You Bet!

Milk and non-dairy beverages contain
calcium and vitamin D. These nutrients are
needed for bone growth and development
in young people. They are also needed
throughout the lifespan of adults.

Why is this important? Vitamin D holds the key to unlocking our bones to let in calcium and make us strong and healthy.

According to an article published in the

newsletter of the National Institutes of Health, experts agree that Americans eat and drink way too much added sugar, especially from sugar-sweetened beverages like soda, energy drinks, and sport drinks.

So consider replacing these beverages with milk! Milk is a great way to support our students' health and growing bones. While at school, we make sure that milk is available for breakfast and lunch as part of a healthy diet.

Additionally, the Los Angeles Times has reported that beginning in early 2019, California law will now require restaurants to include milk or water as the default beverage for children's meals. This will further reduce the intake of added sugar for children.

Milk is important for bone health, and it begins in childhood!



#### **Healthy Schools, Healthy Children**

Health at school matters, and keeping our students healthy and in school is essential. Each year we experience various minor and serious illnesses in our community that can affect our children's health. Whenever groups of people come together, including at our schools, there is a risk of sharing illness. In recent years these have been pertussis, measles, influenza, colds, and other serious illnesses.

How we manage health at school and home is important. School should be a safe, healthy, and enjoyable place for our children to learn. As adults, we can model and teach good hygiene to our children in order to promote good health. For instance, the transmission of illnesses at school may be minimized by frequent hand washing, coughing into our elbows, not sharing eating utensils or personal grooming items, and getting plenty of rest and fluids. Parents should also be keeping their children at home when ill, as well as keep their immunizations current, especially by seeking a yearly flu vaccine.



# Signs of Appendicitis

There are many reasons why you could have abdominal pain, including constipation, food poisoning, urinary tract infection, stomach flu – or appendicitis, caused by an inflammation of the appendix. The signs of appendicitis may be confused with other causes of stomach-area pain, yet the consequences may be life-threatening. So how do you know the difference?

Anyone can get appendicitis, but it usually occurs between the ages of 10 and 30 and predominantly affects men. The most

common sign of appendicitis is pain that develops around the navel and then shifts to the lower right abdomen while increasing in severity. Additional symptoms associated with appendicitis may include:

- Vomiting Nausea
- Low fever Constipation Diarrhea
- Abdominal swelling
- Loss of appetite
- Inability to pass gas

Abdominal pain may worsen after coughing, walking, sneezing, taking a deep breath or experiencing a jarring movement. Not everyone experiences the same symptoms or pain location. For example, young children and pregnant women can have pain elsewhere.

Appendicitis requires immediate medical attention. There is no effective home remedy to treat appendicitis. Treatment may begin with antibiotics and intravenous fluids. Depending on the severity of the condition, surgery, called an appendectomy, may be necessary. A delay in seeking treatment may lead to complications such as:

- Peritonitis (inflammation of the lining of the abdomen)
- Ruptured appendix, resulting in widespread infection
- Death

Recovery is typically quick and complete when people seek treatment right away. For more information about appendicitis, talk with your doctor.

Corona del Mar High/ Middle School has partnered this year with Stanford University's Challenge Success program to address the pressures and stress that are prevalent in the community. Challenge Success works with schools and families to develop

research-based tools and strategies that provide students with academic, social and emotional skills needed to succeed now and in the future.

CdM has created a Challenge Success Team that includes three administrators, two teachers, two students and two parents. This collaborative team is led by a Challenge Success coach and represents all stakeholders

#### **Preparing Future Medical Professionals**

This has been an exciting time for the Estancia Medical Academy! The Estancia Medical Academy was

relocated to Estancia Highs School's new Health Services corridor, and renovations were made to existing classrooms to create a college-style medical classroom and lab. A hospital bed with a simulation manneguin and accessories, including oxygen administration, suction devices, and heart monitor, were purchased for the lab. The classrooms and lab also feature electrocardiogram computers, mayo and tabletop stands,



emergency ambulance gurneys, sports medicine athletic tables, and weightlifting and aerobic equipment.

Approximately 175 students at Estancia High School are participating in the medical career pathway by taking a sequence of courses that build upon previous knowledge and skills. Courses begin with Regional Occupational Program (ROP) Introduction to Health Careers and ROP Medical Terminology and end with the capstone course, ROP Sports Medicine.

Over 90% of the students participating in Estancia's medical career pathway complete the three-year program with a solid academic and practical background to successfully pursue future careers in the medical field.





# **Preschoolers Playing With Your Phone**

It's OK for parents to let their kids play on the phone occasionally. Letting preschoolers use a pre-approved app or look at photos is an easy way to buy some downtime when you need it. It's very common for parents to hand over their phones to their kids. According to Common Sense's 2013 study "Zero to Eight: Children's Media Use in America," 72 percent of kids 8 and under have used a mobile device for some sort of media activity -- and 38 percent of kids under 2 have used a mobile device for media.

But think about how much time your preschooler is playing with apps, and make sure it's balanced with plenty of outdoor or active play, plus lots of quality family interactions.

Tips for letting your preschooler play with your phone:

Watch and listen to how your child is engaging. Make sure you download age-appropriate apps, and check them out first to make sure you think the subject matter is age-appropriate. Can your kid understand the words? Manipulate the game? Really young kids are still developing their fine motor skills, so unless you want a frustrated child on your hands, make sure a game doesn't require lots of coordination.



**Build positive habits.** Remember that kids quickly develop routines. If they associate going to restaurants or driving in a car with playing games on your phone, it will be difficult to transition them out of this behavior.

**Balance coping skills.** Ultimately, we want kids to be able to amuse themselves in a variety of settings and with different tools, even if they only have their imaginations. Make sure your kids are equally comfortable with picture books, music, and crayons as they are with tablets and TVs.

**Keep an eye on the phone.** It can get dropped (on the floor, in a toilet), wedged in a seat, or left in a seat pocket. These things are expensive!

Remember that you're their role model. Kids learn their behavior from you. Consider narrating your use of the phone ("I'm texting your dad to remind him to pick up milk") so they can understand the utility of the tool.

#### **Choose the Right Toys** for the Right Ages

Choking on toys or ingesting something they shouldn't brings a lot of kids to the hospital during the holidays.

When choosing a gift for a child, it's important to know that it's appropriate for the child's age, has a secure battery hatch if batteries are required, and contains no small or moving parts that could be swallowed accidentally.

Even if the toy is safe for an older child, a toddler can swallow a part that's been left lying about. Older siblings should be taught that potentially dangerous items be kept out of reach of their younger siblings.

#### **Decorate Safely**

Brightly colored decorations and live Christmas trees are big parts of holiday celebrations, but even they pose potential dangers to children.

Christmas trees cause many fires each year, so it's important that they are purchased fresh and are watered every day. In addition, parents should use lights designed for the proper outdoor and indoor use. Surge protectors and lighting cords should be unplugged completely at the end of the day, not just switched off.
