California Distinguished Schools Award

Newport Coast and Sonora Elementary Schools recently received the California Distinguished Schools Award, which honors schools that demonstrate significant gains in narrowing the achievement gap.

Newport Coast Elementary School

Newport Coast Elementary School (NCE) received the Distinguished School Award for their outstanding Positive Behavioral Interventions and Support (PBIS) model program, which supports the academic achievement of all students, refines the implementation of character education programs, increases attendance, and maintains a low number of suspensions. NCE also received recognition as an Exemplarity Arts School for their arts education program.

PBIS is a proactive approach that addresses and reduces disruptive behaviors through multi-tiered interventions that teach students desirable behaviors and reward students for making good choices.


NCE also was recognized as an Exemplarity Arts School for its arts education program, which provides consistent arts instruction, incorporates standards-based projects, and demonstrates learning through the arts. All grade levels receive instruction in dance, movement, and music. Throughout the year, school administration and arts teachers evaluate and monitor the impact and effectiveness of the state standards-aligned arts program and instructional practices and the overall impact of student achievement.

Sonora Elementary School

Sonora Elementary School received the Distinguished School Award for their No Excuses University program. Sonora Elementary was accepted into the No Excuses University (NEU) network in 2010. The NEU model is a national program based on six exceptional systems, which include: culture of universal achievement, staff collaboration, alignment of state standards, data management, and meaningful student interventions.

NEU aligns with state academic and performance standards and fosters continuity from one grade level to the next. NEU's universal achievement culture leads teachers to collaborate and holds the entire school community accountable for meeting standards. It also is aligned to Newport-Mesa Unified School District's Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) goals for English language arts and English language development; Science Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM); parent involvement; and school climate and student engagement.

Throughout the history of the California Distinguished Schools Program, 21 schools throughout Newport-Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD) have received the California Distinguished School designation a total of 42 times. The California Distinguished Schools Program was on a three-year hiatus while California transitioned to its new assessment and accountability system. From 2015–2017, California recognized schools that demonstrated exemplary achievements with the California Gold Ribbon Schools Program. During this time 14 NMUSD schools were recognized with Gold Ribbon Awards.

Visual and Performing Arts Programs Flourish in Newport-Mesa

Newport-Mesa Unified School District prioritizes arts education and is a strong proponent of creative expression, offering students the ability to tap into quality arts instruction at all levels of their education.

Our district offers visual and performing art options in all 32 schools. As students progress to high school, they are afforded advanced arts opportunities, including two-dimensional options such as two-dimensional art and digital media, digital photography, print making, video, and film and animation, and three-dimensional options such as ceramics, sculpture, printing and mixed media. They can also enjoy musical theater, drama production, and dance instruction at multiple levels.

We have annual district-wide festivals in strings, band, and choral music. Other district-wide events include a dance invitational, a senior art show, and a visual arts showcase. The visual arts showcase features exemplary

student work in nine categories: three-dimensional craft, such as wheel-thrown ceramics, hand-built ceramics, and mixed media; painting; sculpture; water color; print making; pastels; drawing; photography; and digital design. Due to high industry demand, we are looking into offering animation film. Newport Harbor High School also hosts an annual Evening of the Arts program, which attracts more than 500 guests yearly to meet and view students' professional-quality artwork.

In addition to partnering with the city of Costa Mesa to jointly offer summer arts programs, we also partner with many world-renowned professionals and organizations to connect students with real-world experiences. Our district is appreciative of the countless partnerships that support and celebrate students in all arts disciplines.

The future continues to be bright for arts in Newport-Mesa, and we will continue our legacy of working together to celebrate students in all arts disciplines.



Food Allergy Emergencies

Milk, eggs, peanuts, tree nuts, fish, shellfish, soy and wheat represent the top eight food allergens. A food allergy can cause a life-threatening condition called anaphylaxis, also known as anaphylactic shock. Anaphylaxis requires immediate professional medical attention. A food allergy can be diagnosed through a blood or skin test, an elimination diet, or through challenge testing, all of which should only be done under a physician's supervision.


Approximately 40 percent of children and 30 percent of adults have food allergies. Children typically outgrow allergies to milk, eggs, soy and wheat by the time they are five years old if they avoid the offending food. However, most people do not outgrow allergic reactions to peanuts, tree nuts, fish or shellfish.

If you do have a food allergy, you can decrease your chances of having an allergic reaction by:

- Avoiding foods that you know can cause an allergic reaction.
- Asking about how the dish is prepared and specific ingredients when eating out.
- Always reading the food label when purchasing packaged foods.
- Wearing an identification bracelet and carry an alert card in your wallet that describes your allergy.
- Being prepared for an emergency and, if necessary, carry an epinephrine self-injection pen or allergy kit with you at all times.

If you suspect that you have a food allergy, talk with your doctor about being tested and what you can do to prevent complications. For more information about food allergies, visit the Food Allergy and Anaphylaxis Network website at www.foodallergy.org.



Future Health Professionals

In April, nearly 40 Estancia High School students in the Estancia Medical Academy Pathway participated in the annual Health Occupations Students of America (HOSA) State Leadership Conference in Anaheim.

HOSA seeks to empower future health professionals to become leaders in the global health community. The HOSA program is designed to help students develop leadership and technical skills in the medical field.

Estancia's HOSA students selected health science or health professions events to compete in and spent numerous hours outside of the school day over the course of several months preparing to compete against other HOSA students from across the state of California. 

Immunizations and Student Health

Around this time, most of us are thinking about summer fun. However, planning for the beginning of the next school year is criticaland that includes meeting school health and immunization requirements.

Those of us at school want to make certain children are healthy. As educators, we know good health influences attendance at school. Children spend much of their time at school engaged in collaborative group activity. This

close contact could put children at risk for sharing illnesses and for vaccine-preventable diseases.

Under California law, children are required to have certain immunizations for school. Upon school entry, immunization records are required. Each subsequent year, families are encouraged to send updated copies of immunization records to school before summer break and certainly prior to the first day of school in the fall. The school nurse is a resource to discuss immunizations and to make certain children are immunized appropriately for age and grade. Parents may also check with their healthcare providers.

I give this book a four out of five crescent moons.



CA Distinguished Schools Program

After an extended hiatus, the California Distinguished Schools program is back. This award, considered the top honor for California's public schools, was put on hold for three years as our state overhauled its accountability system to incorporate a broader set of metrics. Following its return in April, 43 campuses across Orange County are now celebrating their status as newly minted California Distinguished Schools.

In all, 287 elementary schools in California earned the distinction in 2018, which means about 15 percent are in Orange County. That's pretty remarkable considering we're home to less than 7 percent of the state's elementary schools, and it is without question a reflection of the commitment to innovation and educational excellence on the part of our teachers, staff, students and parents. Even if you're not familiar with the California Distinguished Schools program, you've probably seen the logo that is often displayed on school campuses as a badge of honor. Yet the value of this program goes far beyond the emblem or even the pride that comes with earning such an accolade. It is also a way to highlight breakthrough educational strategies that can be replicated elsewhere throughout the state. That's because schools that pursue the Distinguished School title must agree in advance to share their signature practices so that other educators — and students — may benefit. And they'll have plenty to choose from in Orange County alone. Let's start with Murdy Elementary School, a California Distinguished School from the Garden Grove Unified School District. Murdy is reshaping its culture by embedding technology across all grades and content areas, ensuring students have the academic, personal

and digital literacy skills they'll need to thrive in the 21st century. Tablets, green screens, 3D printers — these are among the high-tech tools being used to stoke creativity and discovery, encouraging young minds to explore new ways of thinking. About 15 miles away, Newport Coast Elementary in the Newport-Mesa Unified School District was recognized on the strength of its exemplary Positive Behavior Interventions and Support program, or PBIS for short. Offering multi-tiered interventions and incentives for making positive choices, Newport Coast has minimized the number of behavior-related issues, which in turn has made classroom instruction more effective and improved outcomes for all students. These results are backed up by district assessments, report card grades and teacher observations. At Crescent Elementary in the Orange Unified School District, officials have focused on teaching the whole child while embracing the school's diversity as a strength. The school provides a strong, integrated curriculum that empowers students to take responsibility for their learning. Moreover, Crescent says its efforts to foster collaboration among stakeholders have made an impact on academic achievement, attendance, character and communitybuilding. This list goes on of Orange County schools and their signature practices, which include leveraging technology, collaboration and engaging instruction to meet the academic and social-emotional needs of students, ensuring they're ready for college, careers and life. The California Distinguished Schools program may have taken a brief leave of absence, but Orange County schools never rested. Instead, they have steadily advanced on the path of continuous improvement, and the long-term benefits will far outweigh any accolade or logo.





Reading

Reading is an elementary key to success in the educational system. Take, for example, a teacher assigning a reading exercise that will take an hour of reading. That assignment was based on a certain amount of time that it would take to do the reading, say, 500 to 800 words per minute. If one reads at a rate of 250 words per minute, then that reading time has just become a minimum of twice as long for that individual. I was one of those individuals and therefore identified as a slow learner.

I was not a slow learner. I process information differently, and the method of teaching reading did not allow for that difference. When I was taught to read, they started by telling me to use my finger to point at each word as I said it out loud. When I mastered that, they told me to stop using my finger. Later, I was told to stop saying the words out loud. Finally, I was told to stop moving my lips, and that ended the lessons on how to read.

The problem was, I was still saying each word mentally, and that slow my ability to read fast. My mind would jump ahead of my reading and try to finish the sentences before I read them completely, and I would have to start all over and reread a number of times, slowing the process of reading even more. Therefore, I learned the tricks of not reading to pass assignments that most students use to get their work done on time. Plus, I developed a method of listening and memorizing material in class to compensate for the poor reading skills. I can honestly say that I did not read a book until I was around 20 years old.

So, how did I learn to become a reader? The solution for me was to break the habit of saying each word mentally as I read. The problem was not that I could not read. I could read, but just slower than my mind was willing to wait. The key was to go back to the finger and move it faster, allowing my eyes to move across the words without giving them time to pronounce the words. When one enters a room, he or she does not pronounce everything they see mentally in the brain. The brain registers every item without having to pronounce it mentally. The same principle can be done with reading.

A simple method to increase one's reading speed is to first find out what your reading speed is. Read for one minute and then count the words, and that will give you an idea of your speed. Then for practice, use your finger or a guide to move across the page fast enough so that you do not pronounce the words mentally. Do this for five minutes each day, and within 30 days, your reading rate should double. This will be frustrating at first because you're retraining your mind to work more efficiently without the conflict of trying to pronounce each word as you read it.

This will develop your reading skills and is not shortcut as scanning or skimming skills they are different from reading skills. Reading skills allow you to comprehend at a faster rate of speed when reading and makes reading more enjoyable. However, this is not a solution for all reading problems. It is a method that one can try—it did work for me. I am never without a book now.
