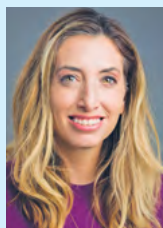

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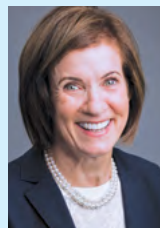

## Successful Finish to a More Normal School Year

Newport-Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD) successfully ended the 2021-22 school year maintaining its goal of keeping schools open for in-person instruction every school day, all year long, despite the challenges.

For the first time since March 2020 (and the first time ever for some), our students in pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade finally felt what it was like to have a more typical school year, connected with each other and fostering healthier and happier school environments. Students had the ability to collaborate on classroom assignments, and attend in-person music, theater, art, and athletic events, school assemblies, and field trips.

Not only have our students shown resilience and dedication as they navigated many unexpected challenges in recent years, but they also showed good character and kindness in the process. As is the case each school year, our students continued to excel in all areas of our educational offerings, from academics and arts to athletics and other extracurriculars.

Our high school athletic teams competed in major championships bringing home eight CIF championships, adding to our district's total of more than 150 CIF championships:

Another notable achievement, which is a testament to our educators and our students, is the U.S. Department of Education recognizing Davis Magnet School as a national Blue Ribbon School. This is a high honor that was only attributed to 28 schools in California. And Davis Principal Christy Flores also was awarded the Outstanding Leadership Award from the U.S. Department of Education.



Our class of 2022 is well prepared for their future. Many of our recent graduates achieved perfect scores on the SAT and/or SAT exams and are off to Ivy league schools, local community colleges, international colleges, and trade schools, as well as all branches of our military, and some directly to the workforce.

Regardless of the awards and accolades, we hope that all our nearly 19,000 students, their families, and our 3,000 employees feel comfort, pride and success in being part of the Newport-Mesa school community. We are a fortunate school district with many programs, resources, and supports that enable us to educate and prepare every child, every day for future success.

Enjoy the summer as we plan and prepare for another exceptional school year in 2022-23.

### Ready for Summer?

For most of us, summer brings a welcome change of pace from our routines and hectic schedules. Summer also allows many enrichment activities for children. Whether children are engaged in indoor or outdoor fun, there are ways to be safe and healthy and to enjoy summer.

Water activities have many social, emotional and physical health benefits. However, it is important to be water safe to prevent drowning, injuries and illness.

Sun and clear skies are frequently enjoyed during summer. Whether at home or during travel, hot weather poses health risks. Monitor yourself and your children for overheating and sunburn. Watch and encourage fluid intake, and use sunscreen. Hats, sunglasses and shade can help prevent exposure to the harmful rays of the sun. Those who enjoy hiking and camping will need to guard against mosquitoes and other bugs. Use proper clothing; repellents that are safe, especially for children; and screens, and check for ticks. Food safety is also important along with frequent handwashing before meals and after using the bathroom. Foods need to be cooked and stored at proper temperatures. Travel with food to the beach or other places should be done with caution to temperature variation and types of foods that may spoil easily.

There is certainly a lot to think about as summer approaches, the days get longer, and we pack in our favorite activities. 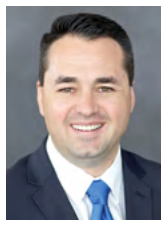

### City Debuts First 'Human Lift' for Disabled Boaters

I was very pleased earlier this month to help launch a project that will create a more inclusive and welcoming Newport Harbor for residents and visitors with disabilities: The City's first human lift.

The lift is the first of its kind in Newport Harbor and one of only a small number on the West Coast. It can be used for transferring someone from the dock at Marina Park to a small sailboat, a small powerboat, or kayak.



The project helps advance our goal of making harbor activities such as boating, sailing and kayaking more accessible to everyone.

### **MyPlate: Following the Food Guidelines**

Did you know that Nutrition Services is dedicated to serving the best foods available to all NMUSD students? Did you also know that each meal pattern is designed to follow MyPlate? We provide fresh fruits and vegetables, delicious entrees made with protein and grains, and dairy products.

During the schoolyear, various students learn about MyPlate and how to incorporate the five food groups into their diet. Why these food groups? They provide the nutrients that humans need to live. What's so special about each food group?

- Fruits are usually sweet and grow on trees. They provide fiber, and vitamins such as folic acid and vitamin C. Fruits also provide an array of minerals such as magnesium, zinc, and manganese.
- Vegetables can be savory and delicious. They grow below and above the ground. Vegetables contain nutrients such as fiber, and beta carotene, which the body uses to make vitamin A. They contain minerals such as calcium, phosphorus, and potassium.
- Grains are hearty and filling. They grow in large fields. They are rich in fiber, B vitamins and nutrients such as zinc, magnesium, and selenium.
- Proteins are found in animals and plants. Both sources contain the building blocks of protein along with other nutrients.
- Dairy foods come from animals such as cows and give us calcium. Other milk substitute products can be used when someone has milk allergies. Be sure to read the label because all milk substitute products may not contain calcium.

As summer approaches, let's launch into a world filled with these foods. Let MyPlate carry our food choices through the summer and when we return to school in the fall, Nutrition Services is committed to upholding a meal plan that will continue to help keep our students healthy.

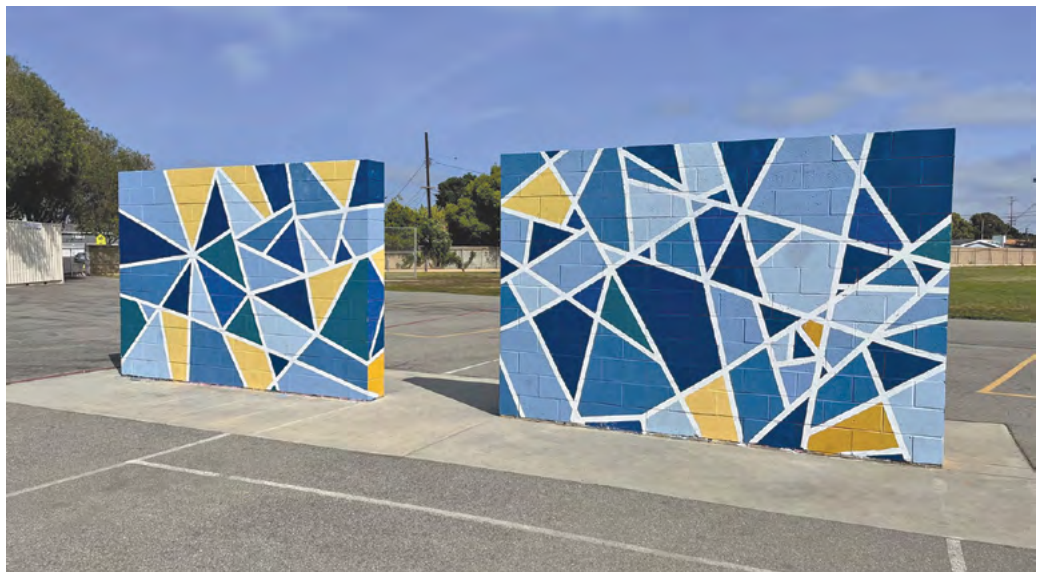

### Wrapping Up

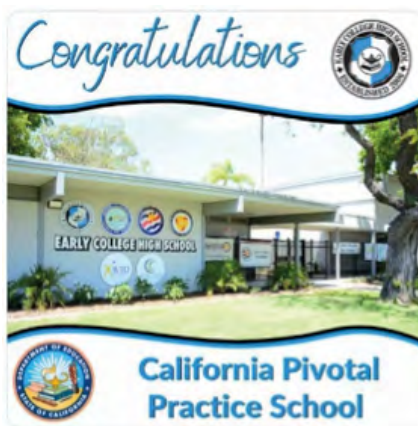
ECHS had a very eventful April and May upon returning from our spring break on April 4th.

We held our first full-scale “Let’s Be Kind Day” event on April 26th. Students wore their black

T-shirts and took part in various lunchtime activities hosted by the LBK organizers. Later that week, we were notified that our school was awarded the California Department of Education’s 2022 California Pivotal Practice (CAPP) Award in recognition of supporting student engagement, technology, nutrition services, and social-emotional well-being during the 2020-2021 school amid the pandemic.

This was the highest state honor a school could receive this year, and it marks the fifth time in school history that we were recognized for a top annual state honor (2009, 2015, 2019, 2021, and 2022).

The first in-person Talent Show and Prom were held on back-to-back days on May 13th and 14th, respectively. As for the Prom, it was ECHS’ largest student turnout, as



we combined together with the Back Bay/ Monte Vista and Cloud Campus students for a harbor cruise. College courses also ended on May 25th and 26th, with high school final exams beginning on May 27th.

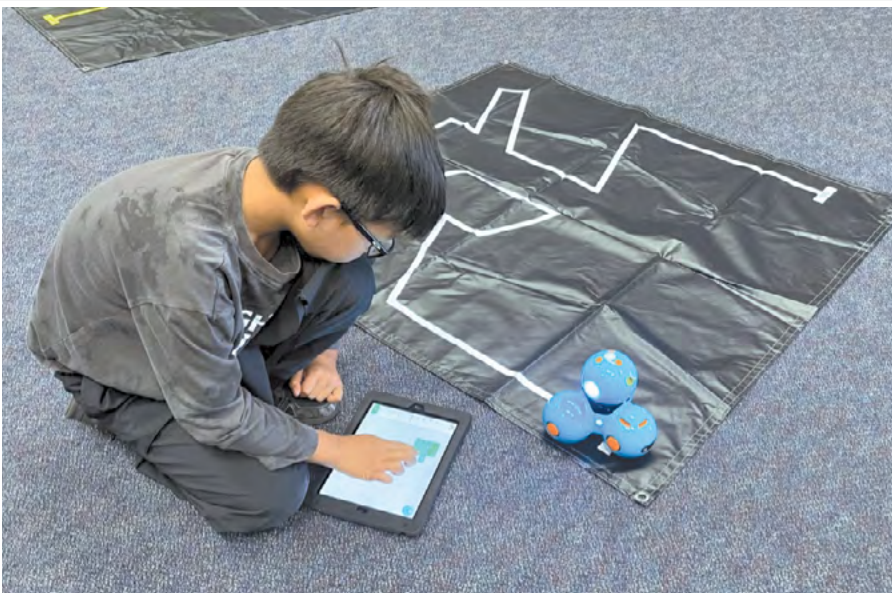

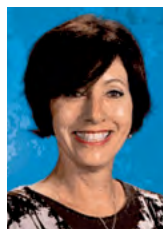

### Activities Away from Technology

**Q.** My 10-year-old son only wants to stay indoors, play video games and eat chips and the like. He doesn't like sports. I'm trying to get him outdoors and moving but he complains about the heat. Any ideas on how to get him away from becoming a couch potato and away from the TV?

**A.** There are plenty of programs that your son might like such as swimming, drawing, painting, camping, making pottery, volunteering at a pet shelter, cooking, graphic design for kids, etc. The whole idea is to get him into a scheduled activity three to five days a week. Some of the facilities where the activities take place have lunch served to the kids. It's usually a pretty healthy one at that. They should give you a weekly copy of them. If not, ask for one. Some programs allow kids to bring their lunch. This means that he will be eating less of the bad things and more of the good. He might even decide that eating fruit is a good break from chips. If your son can find something he likes and can participate in it with a friend, he'll be more willing to stick with it, especially if there's no pressure to be a super star. This will also give him less time to play video games or to watch TV.

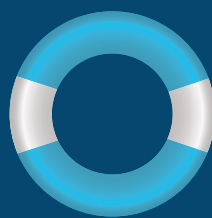

After moving to a farm in Westminster, Felicitas and Gonzalo Mendez sought to enroll their three children at 17th Street School, one of two elementary campuses in the city.

The year was 1943, and the Mendez children and their parents were all American citizens. Still, they were turned away from 17th Street, then known as “the White school,” and directed instead to Hoover

Elementary, designated for students of Mexican heritage.

That set the stage for the groundbreaking case of *Mendez v. Westminster*, which struck down the legal justification for forced school segregation in California and laid the foundation for the U.S. Supreme Court’s landmark *Brown v. Board* decision.

While U.S. District Court Judge Paul J. McCormick originally ordered local school districts to end discriminatory practices against students of Mexican descent in February 1946, his ruling was appealed to the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals. It was upheld there a year later — on April 14, 1947, exactly one day before Jackie Robinson broke baseball’s color barrier.

This past April marked the 75th anniversary of the conclusion of the Mendez case, which had profound ramifications that reached far beyond our county’s borders. Yet the case wasn’t widely known in the decades that followed — even in Orange County. That began to change when Sylvia Mendez, one of the children at the heart of the lawsuit initiated by five families, began raising awareness at her mother’s request more than two decades ago.

Since then, the Mendez case has been the subject of news articles, books and documentaries, and it was even commemorated with a U.S. postage stamp. In 2000, the Santa Ana Unified School District opened Gonzalo Felicitas Mendez Fundamental Intermediate School. The Los Angeles Unified School District also named a high school after Gonzalo and Felicitas Mendez, who became the subject of a Google Doodle.

The family’s story came full circle in 2019, when the Mendez family was celebrated by the Westminster School District, which changed its marquee to read “In Honor of La Familia Mendez.”

“This is such an honor for my father, Gonzalo, and mother, Felicitas Mendez,” Sylvia Mendez said. “My father grew up here in Westminster, and we fought the case and won it. And after it was won, nobody said, ‘Gracias, Gonzalo.’ But look at the wonderful ‘gracias’ we are getting today from this wonderful school district.”

Westminster High School also dedicated its new learning pavilion in Sylvia Mendez’s honor in 2021. Meanwhile, OCDE, which produced a scripted podcast on the case in 2017, has teamed up with the City of Westminster for the creation of an interactive park and trail to recognize *Mendez v. Westminster* and its legacy. Both public spaces are set to open this year.

The Mendez case may still be less known than other high-profile legal battles, including *Brown v. Board*. But it’s a critically important turning point for our nation, with reverberations that extended into all areas of society where separate-but-equal policies stifled equity for all citizens.

Keep in mind that this case was pursued by five regular families who emptied their bank accounts and spent years of their lives working to guarantee access for generations of students they would never meet. For that, we owe them an extraordinary debt of gratitude, and we owe it to them to remember.

As we mark 75 years since *Mendez v. Westminster*, this anniversary is not simply about acknowledging an historic injustice. It should be celebrated as an affirmation of our shared values, a reference point to measure how far we’ve come, and a reminder that ordinary people can do extraordinary things when they band together behind a just case and put children first
