New Elementary Instructional Materials Adopted

Through a collaborative instructional materials adoption process during the 2016-2017 school year, kindergarten through sixth-grade teachers, along with site and district leadership, have identified two new sets of instructional materials for students to begin using in 2017–2018.

Kindergarten through fifth grade classrooms will begin using Bridges in

Mathematics by Math Learning Center as core math instructional materials. Kindergarten through sixth grade will begin using Reading Wonders by McGraw Hill as core English Language Arts (ELA)/English Language Development (ELD) instructional materials.

The comprehensive, eight-month, teacher-driven process that was followed to identify the best math and ELA/ELD core instructional materials for Newport-Mesa students involved research, standards alignment analysis, use, evaluation, and student and community feedback of select sets of instructional materials. Ultimately, through a consensus process, the adoption committee identified Bridges and Wonders as the best sets of material to support instruction and student learning in Newport-Mesa Unified School District (NMUSD).

During the summer, more than 75 percent of elementary teachers participated in various training opportunities to familiarize themselves with the new instructional material and approaches to best implement



the material. Instructional materials are just one piece of a comprehensive curriculum program, and our new materials will serve as a support for effective instruction in kindergarten through sixth-grade classrooms. While the training sessions provided teachers with invaluable information and support, the instructional focus remains on efforts to support high levels of achievement for all kindergarten through sixth-grade students.

The instructional materials adoption process will begin in the 2017–2018 school year for new mathematics instructional materials for grades six through 12. A recommendation is expected for Board approval in spring 2018. The process will be similar to the elementary math and ELA/ELD adoptions.

Creating and Maintaining Modern Facilities

At Newport-Mesa we have a strong commitment to ensure that our students are well educated in modern facilities that meet the changing needs of our students. We have multiple facility projects that are currently in planning, design or construction phase. Samples of some of the projects that you can look forward are noted below.



Corona del Mar (CdM) High School:

- Learning Resource Center (LRC) Construction on the conversion of the school library into a modern LRC began this past summer. The LRC includes computers and more open space to foster student collaboration.
- **Sports Field** This project is currently in the planning phase and includes options for a one or two field alternative. Please view the CdM Field Project Fact Sheet to learn more.

Estancia High School:

- Aquatic Facilities Installation of a 50 meter pool is expected to begin in fall 2017 and be completed by summer 2018.
- Classrooms Storefront Construction to replace classroom entry gates with storefront glass systems was completed this past summer.

Newport Harbor High School

 Davidson Field – Reconstruction of Davidson field was completed in June 2017. Upgrades included new artificial field, track, and concessions building, as well as upgrades to the existing bleachers and press box.

Ensign Intermediate School

• **Gymnasium Repairs** – As a result of a fire from fall 2016, planning for the repairs to the gymnasium are currently in progress. Repairs and upgrades are expected to include a rebuilt girls locker room, reconfigured lockers and path of travel, upgraded restrooms, installation of a projector, screen and repainting the interior gym.

District wide Air Conditioning Projects -

The district continues its phase-in plan to install air conditioning in classrooms, starting with those most inland. It is anticipated that heating, ventilation and air conditioning will be installed at Davis, College Park, Wilson, Kaiser, Woodland and Pomona elementary schools in summer of 2018.



Acing the Back-to-School Wellness Exam

With school starting again, there is likely a lot going on in your family. One thing you don't want to forget: your child's annual wellness exam.

Regular check-ups can help your child stay healthy year-round. One important component is making sure your children are up-to-date on their vaccines. Immunizations are safe and effective, and offer protection from 16 potentially serious conditions. When parents immunize their children, they also help protect other people who cannot be

immunized due to a weak immune system, such as infants, older adults and those on chemotherapy.

The annual back-to-school wellness exam is also the perfect opportunity to ask the doctor questions you may have about your child's health, including:

- Are there any vaccines my child may need for this visit or in the future?
- What are the available, recommended immunizations?
- Are there any physical or emotional signs I should monitor in my child?
- Is my child's BMI and weight appropriate for his/her age? During a comprehensive exam, your physician will do more than simply update your child's vaccines; he will also perform a head-to-toe physical examination of the child that includes:
 - Listening to the heart and lungs;
 - Examining the back for any curvature of the spine or other abnormalities;
 - Checking blood pressure and vision; and
 - Evaluating your child's overall growth and development.

Depending on the results of the physical exam, your doctor may order tests to assess your child's risk for anemia, high cholesterol, tuberculosis or other conditions.







Volins to Violets

As the violin music softly filled the silence from the outdoor speakers in the background, the newly planted violets swayed in the breeze, standing tall as if reaching for the sun. Landscaper Lisa Romano and her crew were busy with their weekly maintenance of the well-manicured garden.

Lisa is a certified arborist, and her company, Balanced Earth, is based on environmentally conscious landscaping. I was visiting the residence where Lisa was working on this particular day, and I was quite taken as I watched the work being done in such a caring and methodical way. The fountains were polished as the water cascaded over the stone. Specific flowers had been planted for morning, afternoon and full sun. The different areas with grass had been planted depending on the

sun, shade and intended use. Balanced Earth is not a "blow and go" company!

I couldn't help but wonder how Lisa became an arborist and was delighted to share a few minutes with her in the presence of this lovely garden. I was surprised to learn that Lisa had been a violinmaker. It was fascinating to learn that the creation of a violin begins with woods that make the purest sound for the instrument. The back is maple, in most cases. The front of the violin is made of spruce—poplar or willow is sometimes used. The fingerboard and tailpiece are made of ebony, while the molds, or ribs, that give the violin shape are made of maple. The violin hasn't changed much in the last 400 years except for the strings. Originally, the strings were made of gut. Later, metal was used for the G

string, and as time went on, the A and D strings were wrapped in wire to improve the tone, with only the E string made of steel.

When I asked Lisa how she transitioned from violinmaker to arborist, she replied, "How to even begin with the question of the change from violins to violets! I realized that to make a living with making violins was going to be impossible. If I was lucky, I would get a job in someone's violin shop and do repairs for an extended amount of time and try to make instruments on the side, then try to sell them, which would be really difficult. You have to be top notch as a maker and find someone influential to buy one. and then the word spreads around. I did not have the time or ability to accomplish this. I made about a dozen instruments and am glad I experienced this in my life. It is an incredible art and an amazing journey to make a violin.

"After realizing all of this, I moved

out of Utah to Laguna Beach. I always loved gardening. I love natural beauty and working with my hands.
