Unwavering Commitment to Safety

School safety has and always will be at the forefront of our priorities. our district continues to increase focus in this area. I would like to share with you an overview of some of the things we do in support of safety throughout Newport-Mesa.

Safety Plans & Supplies:

- Each of our 32 schools has safety plans, staff trainings, and drills, which are regularly practiced.
- Each school has emergency supplies and equipment, which are inventoried and re-supplied each year.

Law Enforcement Partnership:

• We partner with local law enforcement to provide School Resource Officers, which are local law enforcement officers who serve our schools and district facilities

Mental Health and Wellness:

- Our social, emotional, and behavioral health support services assess threats and reports of bullying. We hired two additional school social workers and four additional school psychologists to share in the delivery of psychological support services.
- Suicide prevention, identification, and response training for students, staff and parents.
- Community Alliance collaboration with local organizations in an effort to provide necessary services and programs for our students and families in the areas of after school programs, health, mental health, housing, and general assistance programs.

Positive School Culture:

- Implement Positive Behavior Intervention Systems (PBIS) and restorative practices.
- Implement the Challenge Success partnership at high schools. Challenge Success is an organization that provides strategies to staff, students, and parents to create a positive academic learning environment.

Physical Environment:

- Conduct physical site safety reviews at each of
- our schools to determine additional potential enhancements to improve access and safety on campus. Some of those physical security measures, such as front office reconfiguration and fencing installation have been completed; others will be rolled out in the future

Emergency Communication System:

• Implement an emergency communication system, which allows emergency communication to be disseminated to students, staff and parents via email, text, and phone.

Electronic Visitor Management System:

• Implement an electronic visitor management system, which requires visitors to present identification to allow us to better track and screen visitors on campus.





Be Prepared

Wildfires in Southern California can create hazardous environments for residents living near brush areas. Here are some tips to remember during a wildfire evacuation:



- If you are told to evacuate, do so immediately. If you wait until the last minute, the roads may have heavy traffic. Blowing embers and debris from the fire may make it hard to see.
- Stay informed by listening to the TV/radio for current weather and emergency instructions. Sign up for Nixle in the City of Newport Beach.
- Keep your car fueled and keep an emergency supply bag in your car.
- Make sure everyone in your family knows your meeting place ahead of time. Cell phone reception can be interrupted by fire affecting cell towers.



Poison Alert: Laundry Detergent Pods

Poison control centers have received over 50,000 calls related to liquid laundry detergent pods in the last five years. Although this number includes any exposure to the substance, the statistic is a bit alarming.

Especially with a recent trend of teenagers recording themselves biting into the pods and uploading the videos onto video sharing websites and social media platforms or apps as part of a "challenge." The videos show adolescents gagging,

coughing and sometimes even foaming at the mouth after biting into the pods.

Whether intentional or accidental, health implications from ingesting laundry detergent pods can be deadly serious. Potential effects from misuse of the pods include seizures, pulmonary edema, respiratory arrest, coma, and even death – younger children (five and under) are especially vulnerable.

What to Do in Case of Poisoning from a Laundry Detergent Pod If a child or anyone else bites into a laundry detergent pod, immediately:

- Remove the pod immediately
- Wash the child's or person's face and hands thoroughly
- Gently wipe out a younger child's mouth or have adolescents/adults rinse out his or her mouth with water and spit out without swallowing
- If pod contents squirt into a child's eye, rinse with gently running water for 15 minutes
- Call your local poison control center at 1-800-222-1222 for guidance

Laundry detergent pods should never be misused – especially as a joke – but knowing what to do in case of poisoning from ingestion or exposure can help avoid serious injuries or even death.

Immersing Ourselves in the Natural Wonders

Outside the urban glare of Los Angeles, we found a night sky packed with stars and a still silence interrupted only by the wind's whisper and the chatter of crickets and frogs. It was different, yet familiar.

My father packed little more than a kerosene lamp, a small tent and some fishing gear for those family camping trips of my youth. But it was never about what we brought or left behind. It was about immersing ourselves in the natural wonders of Southern California's mountains, forests

and beaches — and discovering that we were connected to something bigger.

Whether we were on a KOA Campground or Refugio Beach, every direction offered frontiers to explore, mysteries to be solved and scientific observations to be made, without textbooks, lab coats or microscopes. Allowed to chase our curiosities, my brothers and sisters and I were laying deep foundations for learning. But if you asked us, we were just having fun.

Today, technology has emerged as a primary frontier of childhood exploration. But while there are obvious benefits to raising tech-savvy children, I echo the sentiments of countless researchers who suggest we're missing out on opportunities to nurture brain development and strengthen mental health when we close ourselves off from nature.

Author Richard Louv, who has written extensively on this subject, points to an emerging body of evidence connecting nature to greater physical and emotional health. By contrast, disengagement from the natural environment results in what Louv terms "nature-deficit disorder," which, he says, correlates with attention difficulties, greater rates of physical and emotional illness, and reduced use of our senses.

Louv isn't alone. A number of writers, psychologists and academics have produced volumes quantifying the benefits of direct exposure to nature. At the same time, studies continue to show we're spending less time outdoors and more time with electronic screens, which do little to stoke happiness or well-being.

Access is part of our challenge. Census data shows that more than 80 percent of Americans live in urban areas, some of which lack parks or open space. And while more children are participating in organized sports, fewer kids are experiencing the outdoors through unstructured play, according to Louv, who blames a perceived lack of time, as well as concerns about safety.

In 2004, Rhonda L. Clements, professor of education at Manhattanville College in New York State, conducted a survey of 830 mothers nationwide. While 71 percent of them reported playing outdoors as children, only 26 percent said their kids did the same on a daily basis. Interestingly enough, the results showed little differences between rural and urban settings.

With supercharged academic standards and a greater focus on the STEM subjects of science, technology, engineering and math, some educators may choose to ignore these trends. But we do so at a tremendous cost given such extensive evidence that nature — in addition to being intertwined with a number of scientific fields — not only sharpens minds but amplifies learning in other subjects.

Indeed, a recent study of children ages 9 and 10 revealed that hands-on lessons in nature produce students who are more engaged in their other academic studies. Moreover, a duo from UC Berkeley points to more than 100 studies that demonstrate how exposure to nature can have positive impacts on thought processes, as well as our physical and mental health.

This is why environmental education programs like OCDE's Inside the Outdoors are so vital.

Since 1974, Inside the Outdoors has been nurturing student knowledge and stewardship of the natural environment with highly qualified staff and 15 field trip locations throughout Orange County and Los Angeles counties. Lessons are aligned with the state's instructional standards, and for classes that can't venture out, the program dispatches Traveling Scientists to schools, often accompanied by wildlife.

Inside the Outdoors logs more than 150,000 hours of environmental STEM learning each year and has served some 3.5 million students to date. Suffice to say, many of these students might not otherwise have these experiences.

In April, about 100 teachers, school administrators and experts gathered in Orange County to discuss how outdoor and environmental learning experiences can be used to help develop a well-rounded curriculum. Jointly organized by OCDE, Inside the Outdoors and the state Department of Education, the symposium also offered educators a preview of how environmental literacy is being incorporated into the state's Next Generation Science Standards.

Richard Louv was also in attendance as the event's keynote speaker. The renowned author told the audience that "Every teacher who connects students to nature is doing sacred work."

It is that and more. Teaching students about nature and immersing them in the natural environment is both transformative and enduring, producing benefits to our bodies and minds that we are only beginning to understand. Even as we prepare young women and men for an increasingly digitized world, we must continue to create opportunities to recharge their minds and spirits in the great outdoors.

As a child, my family didn't take lavish vacations. But I am fortunate that we could occasionally escape the urbanized confines of Los Angeles to experience a larger world that asked as many questions as it answered, and today these trips are among my most cherished childhood memories.

Years later, I see how they prepared me for life as an educator, as well as for trips with my own sons, who similarly had moments to gaze up at the countless stars and wonder.

Privacy Settings on Computer and Smartphone

On your computer, you can protect against privacy invasion in your web browser. On your smartphone, you use the phone's settings.

Computer Privacy

Take a look at the privacy settings offered in your browser (usually found in the Tools menu) to see whether you can fine-tune them to keep the good and block the bad. When you go online, websites install cookies on your computer that track your movements. Some cookies can be beneficial, such as those that remember your login names or items in your online shopping cart. But some cookies are designed to remember everything you do online, build a profile of your personal information and habits, and sell that information to advertisers and other companies. 
Smartphone Privacy

Settings on smartphones vary, but you can tighten up privacy with these precautions:

- **Turn off location services.** That prevents apps from tracking your location.
- **Don't let apps share data.** Some apps want to use information stored on your phone (your contact list, for example). Say no.

- Enable privacy settings on apps you download. Make sure your teens are using strict privacy settings on services such as Instagram and Facebook.
- Be careful with social logins. When you log onto a site with your Facebook or Google username and password, you may be allowing that app to access certain information from your profile. Read the fine print to know what you're sharing.


