**The Federal Census Bureau**

In just a few months, you'll be asked to participate in one of democracy's most considerable responsibilities — and it shouldn't take more than a few minutes of your time.

As mandated by the U.S. Constitution, the federal Census Bureau conducts a nationwide population count once every 10 years. This is one of the few national

activities the American public does together. It's also easy, confidential and critically important to our students and their communities.

Along with establishing the number of congressional seats and electoral votes for each state, census data serves as the basis for deciding how approximately \$900 billion in federal funds are spent annually, impacting education, housing, public safety and other vital services.

These anonymous statistics also enable local governments to make highly consequential decisions about public safety, including staffing police and fire stations, and they help school districts plan for enrollment shifts.

Meanwhile, businesses rely on census data to open stores, offices and factories that generate new jobs. Real estate developers use these figures to construct new houses and revitalize aging neighborhoods. Residents use the census to support community initiatives.

Despite all that's at stake, our state is expected to lose about \$1,950 per person in annual federal funding as a result of undercounting. But a number of organizations are working to offset those losses by generating awareness in advance of the 2020 count. OCDE is among them, offering workshops for educators along with a social media campaign to help drive home some important points.

For example, we want to spread the word that the 2020 census will be easier than ever. Orange County families will be asked to respond starting in March, and the process should take about 10 minutes. In-person visits will only be made to households that don't respond online, by phone or by mail.

Another point worth noting is that any information collected by census-takers is confidential and can only be used for anonymous statistical purposes. In fact, every census employee takes an oath to protect your personal information for life.

Completing the census is easy, it's confidential and it's mandatory. But it's more than that. It's a way for all of us to participate in our democracy, ensuring that Congressional representation and taxpayer-funded resources are distributed equitably over the next decade.

Orange County students and families count. Now let's make sure they're counted.

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## Recurring Ear Infections and What to do

An ear infection occurs as a result of inflammation of the middle ear, caused by a virus or bacteria. During an ear infection fluid builds up behind the eardrum. Most children have experienced at least one painful ear infection by age five.

Common symptoms of ear infections include pain, fever, fussiness or irritability, rubbing or tugging at an ear, and difficulty sleeping.

Most ear infections resolve on their own with simple treatments like rest or over-the-counter pain relievers. More severe ear infections may need antibiotics.

Many times, children struggle with repeated infections or persistent fluid which can result in hearing loss. In these cases, surgical care can help to prevent infections or lessen the frequency or severity of ear infections. One of the most common procedures performed by ear, nose and throat (ENT) specialists is a myringotomy and tube placement. According to the American Academy of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery, ear tube surgery is the most common childhood surgery performed with anesthesia.

A myringotomy is a surgical procedure that relieves pressure caused by the excessive build-up of fluid in the ears by making a small incision in the eardrum. After excess fluid is suctioned out, the ear tube is then inserted into the eardrum to allow air to reach the middle ear. The tubes will fall out on their own, usually a year after they are placed. While they are in place, they work to prevent further ear infections and help children avoid long-term complications.

If your child has severe, recurring ear infections, it's important to talk to a pediatric ENT specialist, like the team at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach who can help determine what treatment option is best for your child.

## Kindness Week

The last week of January is a week that is dedicated to kindness. The Great Kindness Challenge is a proactive and positive bullying prevention initiative aimed at creating a positive school culture. It is one week of the year devoted to encouraging families and students to perform as many acts of kindness as possible at school, at home, and in the community. To start the week, students were introduced to the Great Kindness Challenge checklist and each day, students were encouraged to complete as many acts of kindness as they could and check them off the list. In addition to the focus on acts of kindness, Esplanade also participated in the Kind Coins campaign. ### **A Lot to Be Proud Of**

Henry Ford once said, “Coming together is a beginning; keeping together is progress; working together is success.” There is a lot to be proud of at Lampson. Over the past four years, our TEAM has shown tremendous passion and perseverance in our collective quest to provide our students with a quality education and an increase in student achievement. It has been incredible to witness the collaboration and rich dialogue happening among our teachers during our on-going professional learnings and professional learning communities (PLCs). Last school year, our TEAM took a step in the right direction by delving deeper into our math instruction. We embraced this challenge by committing to the development of a classroom culture that saw mistakes as learning opportunities; encouraged collaboration, problem-solving, risk-taking, and reflection; and provided opportunities to struggle productively. This school year, we added another layer to our math

instruction. The implementation of math small-groups has been in full effect since November 2019. During this 30-minute block, our teachers meet with two groups of students to provide targeted intervention generated from iReady data and enVision topic standards. Our students are given opportunities for mathematical discourse using related manipulatives and academic language. When not pulled for math small-group instruction, our students work on independent and intentional activities, which include a problem of the day/week, iReady, math fact fluency, and math hands-on activities. A lot of the planning happens during our grade level PLCs. It was important for us to strengthen our already-established PLCs by reviewing our norms and establishing expectations that include revisiting their trimester SMART goals, discussing the progress of student learning, and adjusting instruction through a system of collective inquiry. Encountering challenges and collectively overcoming them is part of the journey. However, one thing is for sure. Each lesson counts as we continue to work together to foster successful mathematicians.
