OVSD Receives Prestigious Designation from the State

Recently, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond designated just six school attendance review boards in California as model programs - and one of them was Ocean View's!

School attendance review boards (SARBs) serve as critical safety nets for students with persistent attendance or behavioral

problems. The goal of a SARB is to keep students in school so they can receive a meaningful educational experience. Ocean View's SARB was recognized for exemplary practices that have contributed to reducing chronic absenteeism rates and improving student attendance. It includes representatives from local youth-serving agencies who connect chronically truant students and their families with school and community resources.

Our District uses a multi-tiered approach that includes early intervention, professional development, strategic staffing, family engagement and school connectedness.

"These six school districts have overcome incredible challenges to student attendance created by the ongoing global pandemic by employing great attendance strategies," Thurmond said. "I commend these schools for utilizing creative strategies that have been highly successful in getting more students back to learning and on the path to success."

Congratulations to Barb Davis, Director of our Student Services Department, and all the people that have worked together to make our school attendance review board the gold standard in the state of California!

Oak View Preschool Celebrates 20 Years!

I recently had the pleasure of attending a 20-Year Anniversary Celebration for Oak View Preschool. It was a joyous occasion with wonderful performances by our preschoolers, poignant remarks from a parent and former students, and an Open House filled with student artwork and special projects on display.

Twenty years ago, Ocean View School District endeavored to provide a high quality preschool program for the children living in the Oak View neighborhood. The District knew that a significant amount of children from this community were entering kindergarten lacking the language and school readiness skills necessary to succeed in school. The District applied for and received grants that were funded by Proposition 10 Children and Families, which later became known as First 5 California, which was led by actor and filmmaker Rob Reiner. These grants immediately funded classes for hundreds of children, and programs for their parents as well.







In 2003, Mr. Rob Reiner visited Oak View Preschool. He proclaimed that he was incredibly proud to tour our facility and that the preschool program that we had created should be implemented in every city in California!

Research shows that children who attend preschool are more prepared for school and experience substantial learning gains in comparison to children who do not attend preschool. Oak View Preschool prepares children for kindergarten. Our high-quality program offers children both protected play time and skills development that provide a wonderful foundation for kindergarten.

Oak View Preschool has been a model preschool over the past 20 years and has received many awards. I am happy to report that our preschool is still the envy of the educational community. Congratulations to our fantastic staff at Oak View and for over 20 years of tremendous service to the children and families in the community.

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The summer season brings the hot sun, trips to the pool and beaches, and fireworks lighting up the night sky. This summer, keep these safety tips top of mind, so your family can enjoy the fun, while staying happy and healthy.

Sun Safety

Jennifer Rodriguez, BS, CIMI, CPST, injury prevention coordinator, Injury Prevention Program, MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach • Apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going outside and continue to reapply every two hours. For infants, avoid using sunscreen and dress them in lightweight sun protective clothing that breathes and covers their arms and legs. For babies six to twelve months, apply sunscreen with SPF 30 or higher with broad spectrum protection.

• Dress kids in wide-brimmed hats.

Water Safety

- Never leave your child in the water without adult supervision, no matter how shallow the water.
- Enroll your child in formal swimming lessons to reduce the risk of drowning.
- Wear properly fitted U.S. Coast Guard-approved personal flotation devices, like life jackets.

Tips to a Safe and Fun Summer!

Pedestrian Safety


- Look left-right-left and behind for traffic before crossing the road.
- Cross in marked crosswalks, at intersections or where drivers expect pedestrians.
- Walk focused and alert.

Bug Safety

- Avoid areas where insects nest or congregate, such as stagnant pools of water.
- The CDC recommendation for children older than 2-months-of-age is to use insect repellents containing 10% to 30% DEET, but do not use DEET on children younger than 2-months-old.
- When outside in the evenings, cover up with long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks.

Firework Safety

- Soak all fireworks before throwing them away.
- Keep sparklers away from your child's face, hair and clothing.

Here Come Penny Wars!



rather than a bystander, and have seen at first hand the success of that training. More and more students are now reporting their concerns to adults, seeking help to mediate rather than retaliate, and are speaking up against derogatory or unkind actions and speech.

We also started our Archery Club, and as a school, have developed a process for other student-created clubs. We are so excited to see all of the clubs that our students will be creating next year!

With support from a grant, Mesa is also almost ready to open our Well Space, a site that we are so excited to be fully utilizing next year. We also had our students work together to start a composting campaign to reduce food waste, and we expect to see these efforts grow even more next year with our Green Initiatives.



We are looking forward to continuing and expanding the work of giving students a voice in their school next year when we move back to our modernized site. It will have a brand-new esports room, and a culinary arts room that includes learning the science of cooking from farm to table, and with our new garden outside of the kitchen.


