Our Newest Personalized Learning Pathway in PYLUSD

With the start of the 2018-19 school year, the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD) introduced La Entrada High School's (LEHS) new Hybrid Pathway. Designed to support high school students who seek an alternative to traditional

classroom instruction, the Hybrid Pathway offers the important resource of daily interaction with educators, while still allowing students the flexibility of personalized online learning.

As a part of this pathway, students attend school for 10 to 15 hours per week on La Entrada's small, yet energetic campus in Yorba Linda. Beyond the classroom, Hybrid Pathway students are responsible for continued academic achievement with online curriculum. Students in the program have the opportunity to meet regularly with highly qualified teachers and an academic counselor during this time.

Pathway participants take no more than two or three courses at a time. Both college preparatory and credit recovery classes are offered as a part of the wide-ranging program. Similar to a traditional high school, Hybrid Pathway students are given many opportunities to academically collaborate alongside their peers in study groups.

For over 30 years, LEHS has afforded PYLUSD students the opportunity to customize their high school experience through an alternative educational environment including an independent study model. Complete with WASC accreditation and an extensive list of a-g CSU/UC approved classes, LEHS empowers its students through textbook, online, and now hybrid-style coursework that results in high academic achievement.

For many years, PYLUSD has focused on expanding the availability of district-wide alternative educational opportunities in benefit of students' unique needs. The addition of the Hybrid Pathway at La Entrada High School not only supports this focus, but it also exhibits the District's commitment to preparing each and every student for success now and in the future.

PYLUSD Awarded for Increased AP Access and Participation for All

The Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District has been placed on the College Board's 9th Annual AP District Honor Roll.

9th Annual AP® District Honor Roll

For the third time, the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD) has been named to the College Board's Annual AP District Honor Roll. This distinction, which the District was previously awarded in 2011 and 2018, comes as a result of increased participation and access to Advanced Placement (AP) course work while additionally increasing or maintaining the percentage of students scoring a 3 or higher on AP Exams.

According to the College Board, just 373 school districts in the United States and Canada were named to the 9th Annual AP District Honor Roll, with less than seven percent of recognized school districts located in the state of California. As a result, PYLUSD stands as one of only five school districts in Orange County and one of only

25 school districts in California to receive this matching distinction.

In 2018, the District administered 4,088 AP exams – 198 more than 2016 – while maintaining an overall 83% pass rate. This increase exceeds the 4% growth threshold required in large school districts like Placentia-Yorba Linda.

Set forth by the College Board, inclusion on the 9th Annual AP District Honor Roll is based on the examination of three years of AP data from 2016 to 2018 using the following criteria:

- Increased participation/access to AP by at least 4% in large districts, at least 6% in medium districts, and at least 11% in small districts:
- Increased or maintained percentage of American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino, and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander students taking exams and increased or maintained the percentage of American Indian/Alaska Native, Black/African American, Hispanic/ Latino, and Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander students scoring 3+ on at least one AP Exam; and,
- Improved performance levels when comparing the percentage of students in 2018 scoring a 3 or higher than those in 2016, unless the district has already attained a performance level at which more than 70% of its AP students are scoring a 3 or higher.

The District is honored to have received the College Board's AP District Honor Roll recognition for a third time as it reaffirms its unwavering commitment to academic achievement – the core of the PYLUSD mission and vision.

Excelling in Concurrent College Classes

The number of students at LEHS who are successfully completing college courses while still enrolled in high school is on the rise!

La Entrada High School is the PYLUSD's award-winning independent study program for ninth- to twelfth-grade students. Like each of the traditional PYLUSD high schools, LEHS will be hosting a Fullerton College course called "Music Appreciation" on campus this spring. Our students enjoy the convenience of having this music course on their home campus, as well as the fact that this section is populated exclusively by PYLUSD students.

In addition, many students choose to enroll in and attend college courses on the campuses of Fullerton College, Santiago Canyon College, Irvine Valley College, or other local community colleges as Special Admit Students. For each three-unit college course (one semester), our students can earn 10 high school credits. They may also earn up to 40 elective credits through dual enrollment.

All students over 16 years of age are encouraged to take advantage of dual enrollment in college courses, as it provides early exposure to college and valuable experience in a college setting. The flexibility of our independent study schedule allows our students the ability to take college classes at a variety of times, such as weekday, evening, or weekend, whichever suits the student best.

Sarah Miller, our counselor, has a great deal of expertise with the registration processes at these colleges, and assists our students with their enrollment, registration, and course selection. As Special Admit Students, our students are not required to pay tuition or registration fees. Families are only responsible to pay for the students' books, the college health fee, and any related lab costs.

Engaging Students in 21st-Century Skills

The classroom teachers at Melrose work together with a computer specialist to incorporate a number of STEM activities into their lessons. Our role is to develop skilled learners for the many jobs which yet exist.

Hi-tech robots are a great tool that can engage our students and also develop life-long learning skills. One robot we use is a tennis ball-sized device connected via Bluetooth to a mobile device such as an iPad. It can roll at a speed of up to 7km/hr in any direction and spin, flip, and change color.

The students can also use an app to direct its movement by designing and using code. With this, they develop important 21st-century skills such



as communication, collaboration, and problem-solving.

Mrs. Toscano is leading the way in the fifth grade by incorporating coding lessons into her instructional day, and with the support and guidance of our computer specialist, Mrs. Pierro. As teachers, we need to provide our students with opportunities to "learn how to learn" and help them to discover and solve problems.

Makerspace/STEM Club


Our mission at Rose Drive is to meet the needs of all our students both intellectually and socially while instilling a thirst for life long learning.

From Idea to Knowledge to Creative Expression

Teacher Jodi Bonk challenged her sixth- and seventhgrade language arts students to create art and literature while researching topics of interest.

It all started with the word "music." Students worked independently or in groups to decide what intrigued them—what they wanted to know more about. This became the essential question, which drove their research. Throughout the process, students were given opportunities to change the direction of their research based on new ideas and interests.

To add to the cognitive demand, students were expected to incorporate another idea, such as power, conflict, change, patterns, or relationships, into the essential question. These questions were ultimately answered through careful analysis and strategic organization to create an expert level of understanding, which they demonstrated in their collaborative Google documents.

To demonstrate their learning, students created art using technology. (This idea came from them!). Students had the freedom to explore and try new techniques, applications, and mediums. Our hub of creativity was grounded by a project management process to ensure that the students accomplished what they set out to do. Our classroom soon became a museum, where students showed off their work and spent time learning and enjoying the creativity of their peers.

Because we are a class that values feedback, students finished by offering thoughtful suggestions for improvement and congratulating those whose projects deserved compliments.

This whole experience was driven by the students in the ultimate pursuit of creating self-starters and self-managers.
