School District Launches Preparatory Kindergarten Program

The Kindergarten Readiness Act, a historic reform to kindergarten education, gives the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District an opportunity to ensure that more children each year are better prepared to succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

The PYLUSD believes that school readiness is more than just reading, writing, and arithmetic. This legislation enables the PYLUSD to create a transitional kindergarten program (Preppy "K") to support the development and achievement of the youngest learners.

Research has shown that students who enter kindergarten at age four have a higher likelihood of retention and learning delays in comparison to



their older peers. While younger students may do well academically in kindergarten, they are often at a disadvantage in middle and high school in areas such as social maturity and athletics.

The PYLUSD is proud to address these concerns through the creation of a standards-based Preppy "K" program that is designed to meet both the academic and social-emotional needs of younger students.

- Students born in late summer or fall are given the opportunity to participate in a develop mentally appropriate two-year kindergarten program.
- All Preppy "K" classes will be taught by fully credentialed kindergarten teachers.
- Enrollment will be based on space availability at Preppy "K" sites.

The Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District is working hard to open doors to help more students achieve their fullest potential and I am very proud that the district has received national distinction as an "Advanced Placement Achievement School District."

This honor was presented to only 388 school districts nationwide by the College Board, which is comprised of 5,900 of the world's leading educational institutions and annually prepares students for college by offering programs

such as the Scholastic Achievement Test (SAT) and Advanced Placement (AP) testing. The award recognizes districts for increasing the number of high school students taking advanced placement courses while continuing to increase the number of students passing.

From 2008 to 2010, the number of PYLUSD students taking advanced placement course exams increased from 1273 to 1557. In addition to more students taking the exam, what is even more remarkable is that the passing rate gained more ground.

The PYLUSD's already-high passing rate increased from 85 percent to 87 percent. In comparison, the national pass rate is 57.5 percent. Students who pass the AP exam are eligible to receive college credit for that course, and results in a financial savings to parents.

Advanced placement courses in our high schools now range from chemistry to English literature to statistics to scores of foreign languages, including German, Japanese, French and Spanish.

The 2011 Academic Decathlon

Placentia-Yorba Linda USD Has the Most Schools in Top Places in the 2011 Academic Decathlon

The 2011 winning Orange County Academic Decathlon (OCAD) teams were announced in February at an awards ceremony.

Valencia High School's team was the third highest scoring in the county; El Dorado was the ninth-highest scoring; and Esperanza took the tenth spot as the highest scoring team.

Esperanza High School also took first place in Division 2. Due to the number of high schools competing, 37 in total, competition is divided into Division 1, Division 2 and Division 3.

Valencia High School, which competed in Division 1 and was the third highestscoring team in Orange County, earned an invitation to compete in the California State Academic Decathlon competition which will take place in March in Sacramento.

The Orange County Academic Decathlon is a ten-event scholastic competition. Teams from Orange County public and private high schools are tested in math, economics, language and literature, science, music, art, social science, speech, interview, and essay. Each nine member team includes three "A" students, three "B" students, and three "C" students. The theme for the 2010-2011 competition season was The Great Depression, as outlined by the United States Academic Decathlon Association.

The Academic Decathlon program, now the premiere scholastic competition in the country, began in Orange County 43 years ago.



Linda Vista Celebrates 35th Birthday During Earth Week



Do You Know Your Fluency Score?

A fluency score is the amount of words read per minute. Students at Melrose Elementary School not only know their own fluency scores, but also their fluency goals.

This goal is individual, and is set according to the student's end-of-the-year grade-level target. As a school-wide incentive, all students were given fluency goal cards. They then recorded their scores and met during lunch with the principal, literacy coach and Title I reading specialist to share their scores and goals.

Students received star stickers, pencils and "High Fives" for their ongoing efforts. It is amazing to see how they are progressing, and how excited they get about learning to read with fluency and prosody.

Fluent reading is reading in which words are recognized automatically. With automatic word recognition reading becomes faster, smoother and more expressive. As students become more fluent oral readers, their silent reading skills also improve. Being able to read with fluency improves comprehension and sustains interest.

Our teachers are also providing classroom incentives by awarding students with ribbons and certificates when they meet individual reading-fluency goals. Practicing fluency at Melrose is a team effort performed through guided oral reading opportunities such as echo-reading, fluency folders, partner reading and whole-group reading.

Additionally, our ?Ticket to Read? computer program and fantastic book fairs also provide practice and support for motivated readers!

The Kid's Guide to Service Projects

The title of this wonderfully helpful resource is directed at children, but Barbara A. Lewis's Kid's Guide to Service Projects, Free Spirit Publishing, 1995, is a volunteer guide for any age. The more than 500 suggested projects, ranging in difficulty from caring for a neighbor's pet to getting state laws and city ordinances passed, will appeal to anyone who want to make a difference and earn breathing space on the planet. The projects, all worthy, are described simply and clearly enough to encourage any aspiring humanitarian.

The projects focus on human and animal welfare, community development and safety, the environment, literacy and politics, further divided into 10 categories. In the introduction, Lewis gives short shrift to anyone's claims of not having enough time or that the goals are too involved for any one person to attempt. Instead, she maps out projects for every passion, and invites the reader to send her anything that she hasn't thought of. She then provides a template of 10 steps to make any effort a successful one; gives handy how-tos for pesky paperwork tasks such as creating fliers, writing petitions and press releases, and lobbying for a cause; and suggest seven ways to raise funds.

Anyone who wants to be proactive in solving problems for the community, either local or at large, will find frequent use for *The Kid's Guide to Service* Projects. It will be particularly helpful in the service requirement for graduation from high school; and families, youth and religious organizations, and classroom teachers will all find something to forward worthy efforts. Most of all, lone individuals who feel the need to take action on a problem but may be overwhelmed by the details will be happy to find that Lewis has done the initial organization for them. And that in itself is a great service.

Gearing Up for Summer

For some parents, the arrival of summer means less stress because the school schedule is not a part of the daily routine. For other parents, having the children home all day every day is stressful. Whichever arena you are in, the reality of life is that summer vacation is almost here for the traditional schools.

Children may get more wound up, more disagreeable, more difficult to manage as the start of summer gets closer. Change is stressful, even if it is for the better. The break in routine is stressful for children and adults. It is advisable to keep your discipline strong so that you glide into summer with boundaries in place. Consistent boundaries will also help your child to contain

his or her behavior and to feel safe. My discipline system is mentioned on parentingsos.com and my new book, Don't Feed the Dragon, is a discipline manual divided into three sections: (1) what parents need to understand about children in order to successfully guide them; (2) my discipline system, and (3) answers to 130 of the top concerns

of parents, listed in alphabetical order. The book is age-appropriate from tots through the teens and is available on parentingsos.com.

Having your discipline system in place, it is wise to sit down as a family and make a list of things that can be done during free time. The list may be posted in a place where children can use it as a reference. To quell the endless, "I'm bored" message that children who are not used to having non-structured time often begin chanting when school ends, offer two choices: "You may refer to the chart that we created or I will choose a chore off the chores chart that will help you dispel boredom." This plan might allow you to have your whole house cleaned in the first week of summer!

Training for the Future

Summer is a wonderful time to train your darling children to do chores. Finally, they have time—the constant excuse during school months! Children will leave home some day—I promise!—and when they do, they need to know how to take care of a house and themselves. Chores teach a child that a house does not clean itself and how to do fundamental tasks, such as clean a toilet. If you have a housekeeper, create a space each week that the children are responsible for in terms of upkeep and give the tidiness angel one less area to clean.

It is important that children are not in so many activities that their lives become stressful. Children need time to be children! If you want your child to be successful in school, have at least a half hour a day that is devoted to school skills. If each child took a 30-minute "chill break" and read for that amount of time, their future teachers would be ecstatic! Every child needs quiet time each day that does not involve any media or mechanical gadgets, including during the summer.

Enjoy Your Children

Most important of all, enjoy your children! There will never be another summer like the one ahead of you. Your children will not be this age ever again. Create some sort of structure and have some time that is not structured. Don't send your children to other people to play all the time—what each child wants more than anything else is time with you. It is easy to forget that when you are trying to keep the energy-packed chicks busy.




1. Increase the number of AP courses offered at high schools; and 2. Challenge students to meet their highest potential regardless of school or classroom.
