### From the Inside

What Advice would you give our younger self? Alumni & Students are talking and we're listening.

Young adults have a lot of wisdom to share and given a platform, our PYLUSD Alums share stories that inspire good humor, wisdom and spark creativity. From the Inside, a REACH Foundation Speakers program that began in Fall of 2020, brings together a panel

of recent PYLUSD graduates for a conversation about their high school, college, and career experiences. An informal Zoom setting offers middle and high school students an opportunity to ask frank, open and insightful questions.

### Three PYLUSD Middle Schools Awarded as California Schools to Watch

Congratulations are in order for the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District community as Bernardo Yorba Middle School. Tuffree Middle School, and Yorba Linda Middle School (YLMS) were recently recognized as California Schools to Watch in 2022.

Bernardo Yorba, Tuffree, and Yorba Linda were designated by the California League of Schools for

their strong teamwork and exceptional results during these especially tough times.

This is the first year that Bernardo Yorba and Tuffree have received this award, with Yorba Linda receiving their second re-designation for 2022. YLMS was first recognized by the committee as a school to watch in 2015 and re-designated for the first time in 2018.

YLMS attributes their successes to their school-wide intervention program called Build a Better Bobcat (B3). Through this program, students can improve themselves and their academics by attending peer tutoring sessions, making up missing assignments or tests, and learning character lessons.

"YLMS prides itself on developing the whole student," Principal Greg Kemp said. The strength of their

Principal Beth Fisher from Bernardo Yorba Middle School shared that while their academic achievements were a key factor in receiving this honor, it came down to the strong sense of belonging felt by the entire campus.


"Middle school can present some of the most challenging times. We are proud that our students have a team of teachers, staff, counselors and administrators to navigate

the challenges and do so in a way where every Matador belongs," Fisher said.

"For my Tuffree staff, this recognition is confirmation that our journey was worth the effort it took, acknowledging that there is more work to do," Principal Cindy Freeman said. Despite the obstacles they faced, Mrs. Freeman recognizes the important role that her staff's creativity, collaborative approach, and love for the students played in cultivating an engaging and caring environment for each student.

"I'm ever so grateful to be part of a school community that took a world crisis situation and created something special for students," Cindy Freeman said.





### Math for Life

Math students sometimes do not see the real-world applications of the topics they study. El Camino Real math teacher, Susan Rotkosky, strives to empower students to

demonstrate their knowledge through meaningful and creative assignments. She encourages

a growth mindset, reminding students they have the capacity to learn and apply complex concepts. At the completion of their latest unit, rather than give a test, students were asked to create a design that included a parabola, which is the graph of a quadratic function. After completing their designs, they were asked to identify key features of the parabola including the vertex, axis of symmetry, intercepts, equation, transformations, domain and range.

The Algebra 1B students designed some very creative objects with parabolas including roller coasters, bridges, buildings, animals, and more. Students got a glimpse of the design process and recognize that their math skills are important for future college and career opportunities.
