Journalism isn't dead – it's just gone online for a new, worldwide audience.

Seventh and eighth grade reporters and editors at Bernardo Yorba Middle School in the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD) produce a daily online newspaper, *The Matador Messenger*.

The Matador Messenger is the first middle school School Newspaper Online (SNO) publication in Orange County, as well as the first in PYLUSD. It is published daily throughout the school year.

class is taught by Mrs. Christine Perez, a language arts instructor. The course was created five years ago to fill a need for a new English elective.

Today, students work diligently to find topics of interest, from campus events to worldwide news. With an average of over 6,000 readers a month, readers come from Australia to Siberia, Chile to London, and everywhere in between.

In an era of "fake news," the student-reporters are taught to research using multiple sources. They reach out and conduct interviews with experts,

entrepreneurs, scientists, doctors, coaches, athletes, musicians, and community members.

They are also taught to write article in a journalistic style, using correct format and structure.

Campus coverage includes profiling every new student on campus, all clubs, awards, performances, and assemblies, as well as a focus feature on a "Student of the Week" for every subject area multiple times throughout the year.

Most importantly, these young journalists are transformed by the process of research, interviewing, writing, editing, and publishing. They are no longer just students in a journalism class – they are published authors with a worldwide audience, empowered by possibilities.

The classroom should always represent an environment that is built for a diversity of both thoughts and expressions. A setting for students to challenge that "echo chamber" of what they might be reading or hearing from a single digital source. As author Carol Dweck would describe, the classroom will be their opportunity to resist a "fixed mindset" and instead build and live in a "growth mindset," a definite "must" to find the success our students will seek on that newly minted path after graduation.

An Excellent Alternative

La Entrada High School (LEHS) is an award winning independent study program in the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District. Students at LEHS complete 20-25 hours of coursework each week independently and attend weekly meetings and classes on campus for a few hours per week.

Advantages of the La Entrada program include the rigorous courses approved by the University of California to meet A–G requirements. Students also benefit from an individualized program tailored to fit their needs. They focus on one class at

a time, completing a class every four weeks. La Entrada weekly due dates facilitate flexibility; students can work whenever and wherever suits them best! Students attend weekly appointments with highly qualified teachers and may come in more often when they need assistance. Students attend small workshop classes to boost skills in communication, collaboration, and technical skills.

Teachers work with students individually and form strong mentoring relationships. The school counselor leads frequent workshops on topics such as time management, coping with stress and anxiety, and strategies for college and career success.

LEHS students are also eligible for enrollment at their high schools of residence. This is encouraged for lab sciences, physical education, foreign language, and performing arts classes. Students may also participate in extracurricular activities at their high schools of residence.

Concurrent enrollment at the local community college is encouraged for LEHS juniors and seniors. These students may earn both high school and college credit for some courses. Motivated students may qualify for early graduation by taking advantage of concurrent enrollment opportunities.

For the Love of Science

Our Melrose staff has been working on improving educational outcomes for all students, including our English learners, through "scaffolded" science instruction. English learners contend with the additional challenge of developing language and literacy skills in a second language while accessing grade-level content instruction and texts.

Hands-on science projects have been key to engaging our students in science. Grade levels have worked with live goldfish, baby chicks, snails, crayfish, butterflies, plants, chemicals, and science and marine field trips.

We kicked off the spring season with a Family Science Night in partnership with Cal State University Fullerton's Department of Elementary and Bilingual Education. Melrose students and families came together to conduct hands-on



science activities. Some of these activities included chemical reactions, disaster survival, plate tectonics, bubbles galore, ocean zones, lava lamps, oil spills, and slime.

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
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
