

Commitment to Youth Substance Use Prevention and Mental Health



Emory Chen Director Youth Services

As a recipient of the Drug-Free Communities grant and in alignment with our identified 2022-25 health priority of substance use, Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) and the Beach Cities Partnership for Youth Coalition are working to raise awareness of youth substance use with information and resources that will educate our students, families and school community.

In September, the California Department of Public Health issued an alert regarding

rainbow Fentanyl, and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health has warned of local overdose deaths caused by counterfeit narcotic pills. As a result, the Coalition is focusing on increasing community awareness, distributing the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Fentanyl factsheet to families of Redondo Beach Unified School District students and created a designated webpage (https://www.bchd.org/fentanyl). We encourage parents and guardians to use these resources to engage in open conversations with adolescents about this concerning trend.



On Tuesday. December 13 from 6-7 p.m., BCHD is hosting a community education forum. State of Our Health:

Youth and Cannabis. This virtual information session will focus on youth cannabis use, including discussion and a Q&A with a panel of experts. The event will be recorded and available to share with the community for those unable to attend.

The allcove Beach Cities center officially opened its doors November 1 and is now offering integrated and multidisciplinary services for young people ages 12 to 25. The youth wellness center is located at 514 N. Prospect Ave., 4th floor and operating with the limited hours of Tuesday through Friday from 1 to 7 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Full operation is expected by end of January 2023 and a public open house is scheduled for January 28. South Bay Adult School (SBAS) has a wide variety of programs to offer adult students.


Programs include six levels of English as a Second Language (ESL), Citizenship, Adult Basic Education (Language Arts Academy and Math Academy), High School Diploma, High School

Vaping in School Age Children

There has been a growing trend of vaping, or smoking e-cigarettes, among teenagers the past few years and more recently there has been a spike in school-age children starting to vape.

Vaping is only marginally regulated in the U.S., causing teenagers and children to regularly use vape products and oils incorrectly. The bright packaging and sweet flavors can tempt kids and teens, many of whom end up staying hooked due to the addictive nicotine inside the vape liquid. This combination can result in serious, lifethreatening respiratory events.

Nicotine is not the only harmful chemical that vape liquid may contain. Other harmful chemicals include:


- Ultrafine particles that can enter the lungs
- Flavorants such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to serious lung disease
- Volatile organic compounds
- Heavy metals, such as nickel, tin, and lead

While vaping is still relatively new, the long-term sideeffects of these chemicals are still being researched and discussed throughout the healthcare community. These harmful chemicals can cause side effects like coughing, dry mouth or throat, nausea, and headaches, as well as affect the development of the brain and cause nicotine addiction.

It is important to talk to your child about the dangers it may cause in both short- and long-term use. By educating yourself first, it becomes easier to educate your children. Maintaining a dialogue about vaping, where both you and your child can ask questions, will help you be effective in preventing your kids from vaping now and in the future.




