Empowering Lifelong Learning

It is nearly April, and graduation is just around the corner. As we enter the last quarter of this school year, let us take a moment to reflect on how far we have come. The pandemic was hard on everyone these past few years, especially our city's children. But now, brighter skies are ahead—and the COVID-19 emergency declaration is officially over.

It is so important that we take the

opportunity we have right now to double down on investing in our future. Our children, our schools, and our youth deserve the best that we can give them, and it all starts with education.

As a father of two young girls, I understand the importance of setting our children up for success. That is why, when I announced my Opportunity Beach Agenda, I prioritized a plan of action that creates pathways for young folks to succeed by pursuing higher education, learning a skilled trade, or even joining the City workforce through the launch of a new Public Service Fellowship Program. We are also working to implement the Long Beach Housing Promise, which will ensure that housing is not a barrier to education for families in our community.

Every child in every neighborhood deserves the opportunity to succeed, and I am committed to ensuring they have the resources to do so. Together, we can empower our students to pursue a lifetime of learning.

This year, I will be organizing our city's first annual Youth Advocacy Day, where young leaders can get together and learn how to participate in the civic process. We are also hard at work establishing a \$1 million floor for the Long Beach Youth Fund's annual disbursements, which will provide crucial resources to continue our programming for young people well into the future.

And, starting in May, students will be able to participate in the City's budgeting process by voting on how public dollars are spent on youth programs. 

Importance of Community in Crisis Response

Why is community important? Community unites people in shared needs, interests, experiences, and goals. Community is important for social connections, support, safety, and health. As we've experienced before, community is vital during times of crisis. Currently, Long Beach, like many other communities, is facing a homelessness

crisis. And this complex crisis needs a strong collaborative community response.

The City has long been dedicated to homelessness and has partnered with community organizations and non-profits to provide outreach, medical and mental health support, emergency shelter beds, and various other basic need services to individuals experiencing homelessness. The City also has prioritized diversion and homelessness prevention, rental assistance, and permanent housing programs. As homelessness has greatly increased in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, the City has declared a local state of emergency to be able to quickly and efficiently expand homelessness and housing services. While the City continues to work diligently, it has asked the community to help. So, my Office and I are doing what we can to help during this crisis.

In the beginning of this year I joined fellow community leaders and members for Long Beach's annual point-in-time homeless count. It was heartening to see over 250 people volunteer to help determine how many individuals are experiencing homelessness so that we may define existing resources and identify gaps. With our outreach teams assigned, instructions in hand, and the sun still below the horizon, we canvassed the City with the task to survey and provide information on service resources available to individuals experiencing homelessness.

I along with members from my Office are also committed to the City's coordinated emergency response to homelessness. We are participating in the City's Community Partnership Committee which is identifying and coordinating efforts with various non-profits and faith based organizations for resources such as food, blankets and hygiene kits. My Office is also undertaking an audit to assist the Health Department, per their input, in reviewing the performance of service providers that provide direct services to homeless individuals.

As Hellen Keller said, "Alone, we can do so little, together we can do so much." Working together we can build a stronger, supportive community to address this crisis. Find out more on what the City is doing and ways you can join these efforts at www.longbeach.gov/homelessness.

Fight Crime with Education

There is one strategy to reduce crime that is simple, time-tested, and summarized in one word: Education.

The U.S. Department of Justice states, "The link between academic failure and delinquency, violence, and crime is welded to reading failure."

It is said that we first learn to read, then we read to learn. The Center for Public Education says it better, "Reading is the

Open Sesame for acquiring knowledge: learn to read, and you can read to learn just about anything."

We need to focus on basic literacy. And we need to focus on the first few years of schooling because those who struggle with reading are four times more likely to drop out of school.

According to the National Assessment of Adult Literacy, 2/3 of students who cannot read proficiently by the end of fourth grade will end up in jail or on welfare. What does this cost us? Annie E. Casey Foundation reported in 2010, "every student who does not complete high school costs our society an estimated \$260,000 in lost earnings, taxes, and productivity."

Many who lack education commit crime, often violent crime, and end up incarcerated. Nationally, it is estimated up to 75% of prison inmates are illiterate. Why are we surprised by the cycle of incarceration for those who cannot read?

There are many things we can do to reduce crime in the future, but first we need to replace the slogan, "No Child Left Behind" with an actual strategy to ensure no child is left behind academically.

We also need to do a better job of educating those who intersect with the criminal justice system. Long Beach judges do an excellent job of requiring that students get back into school. This should become the norm.

But we also need to do a better job of educating students before they end up in trouble with the law.

If you know a parent with pre-K kids, please do what you can to help them. Give the gift of books, read to them, do whatever you can to help them explore the world of letters and numbers before the first day of kindergarten. After that they'll get help from librarians, classroom teachers, even the local bookstore owners, and other heroes who will keep them engaged.

As a prosecutor I am certain that the more we all do now to promote reading and early education, the more we cut crime in the future.

Officials Warn Of Nationwide Homeowner Scam

The newest real estate fraud to emerge is called the Homeowner Benefit Program. Originating from a Florida-based real estate company, homeowners are offered cash payments of up to \$5000 to sign their agreement.

Signing grants the exclusive right to sell and guarantees a 3% commission if the

homeowner sells within the next 40 years. Upon execution of the contract, a memorandum lien is filed with the county Recorder's office

Further, if the homeowner dies or gifts the property to another, subsequent owners are also obligated. Should the new owner wish to cancel the agreement, or decline to work with the named company, they must pay an early termination fee of 3% of their home's value; the amount that the firm would have earned from the sale of the property.

While a cash payment now may seem attractive, the median home sales price across the nation is \$428,700. In today's market that average fee is \$12,861. Add 40 years of price appreciation, and factor in the high priced states, and that penalty could be staggering. It's essentially a very small loan with a horrendous interest rate and a big "catch."

While this tactic is legal, officials suspect that many do not fully understand to what they have agreed. Entering into any contract concerning your property should be approached with caution, and perhaps legal counsel. At the very least read the fine print and ask questions, and/or seek review by a trusted and objective professional in the field of real estate.



Nutrition Update — Fast Food Facts

How Much Protein Do We Need?

A hot topic in any current food or diet article is protein consumption, due in part to trending keto diets as well as interest in more plant-based eating. Interestingly, when I speak with my clients, most have no idea how much or what kind of protein they should consume for optimal health. Let's start with the basics. This table from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) gives daily consumption guidelines for various age groups.

https://www.myplate.gov/eat-healthy/protein-foods Many of my clients are surprised as amounts are smaller than they expected. I encourage a variety of protein sources and explain that in addition to lean animal proteins, we can get protein from dairy products and plant foods, specifically beans, legumes, nuts and seeds. Protein deficiency in the US is rare, however, with trends mentioned above, families need to be aware of what is being served to ensure proper amounts are being eaten daily.

Protein is an essential part of the diet for it is needed for virtually every bodily function- skin, muscle, bone, and hair as well as for carrying oxygen in your blood. Our bodies don't store protein in the same way that we store fat and carbohydrate so eating a variety of quality sources each day is imperative. For example, as mentioned

in the table, a teenage boy should have about 7 ounces of protein/day. How does that translate into actual food? For breakfast: 1 tablespoons peanut butter on wheat toast, lunch: a 3-ounce turkey burger and dinner: 2 ounces of chicken with vegetables and pasta. EASY! Other 1-ounce equivalents include 1 egg, ¼ cup nuts, ¼ cup baked beans or 6 tablespoons of your favorite hummus. Try this easy edamame recipe for ¼ cup of soybeans equals 1-ounce of protein.

Most Delicious Edamame



Serves 4 Ingredients

1 pound in-shell edamame, frozen or fresh

1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

2 tablespoons minced garlic

1 tablespoon minced ginger

¼ cup soy sauce

½ teaspoon black pepper

Directions

In a medium pot bring 4 cups of water to a boil.

Add edamame and cook for 3-4 minutes.

Remove from heat and drain edamame.

In a large frying pan or wok, add olive oil, garlic and ginger and sauté 1-2 minutes.

Add edamame and sauté for 2 minutes.

Add soy sauce and pepper, continue to sauté for 5minutes.

Remove from heat and serve immediately.

Activities Away from Technology

Q. My 10-year-old son only wants to stay indoors, play video games and eat chips and the like. He doesn't like sports. I'm trying to get him outdoors and moving but he complains about the heat. Any ideas on how to get him away from becoming a chubby couch potato and away from the TV?

A. There are plenty of programs that your son might like such as swimming, drawing,

painting, camping, making pottery, volunteering at a pet shelter, cooking, graphic design for kids, etc. The whole idea is to get him out of the house, off the couch and into a scheduled activity three to five days a week. Some of them start in the morning and some in the afternoon. Some of the facilities where the activities take place have lunch served to the kids. It's usually a pretty healthy one at that. They should give you a weekly copy of them. If not, ask for one. Some programs allow kids to bring their lunch. This means that he will be eating less of the bad things and more of the good. He might even decide that eating fruit is a good break from chips. If your son can find something he likes and can participate in it with a friend, he'll be more willing to stick with it, especially if there's no pressure to be a super star. This will also give him less time to play video games or to watch TV.

A Helicopter Parent

Q. I have been a helicopter parent for so long that my children, ages seven and nine, are extremely apprehensive of taking any risks in various activities or doing anything where they may get even slightly hurt or disappointed. What have I done and how do I correct it?

A. There have been overbearing and overprotective parents for years; don't beat yourself up too badly. It's easy for parents to go overboard when it comes to their kids. However, this can continue into college years and beyond, but it doesn't have to. Your parenting style and the way you view your children will need to change. You'll need to allow them to get used to the idea that they can actually try things on their own. Go ahead and sign them up for things that they are truly interested in and will most likely do well at. A few successes will build their self-confidence and they will perhaps want to do more things that are new and different. It's the mistakes and bumps in life that we all learn from that make us stronger individuals, better able to handle future situations. We have to be allowed to fail.

I'm turning the timer for 15 minutes. When you hear it ring, come and I will listen!"

Read to your children every night. Eat dinner together as a family. Play games together. Go on outings together. Don't talk on your cell phone in the car, talk to them. This precious time of being the architect of a child's life is very short. There are no re-runs in the parenting game; connect with your children so they feel valued and appreciated.

Combating Springtime Allergies and Asthma


The wet winter Southern California has seen means that grass, trees, and flowers will start blooming perhaps sooner than expected – however so will allergy season. In addition, windy conditions in the springtime can cause pollen and other allergens to stir throughout the air and irritate the lungs of children across the region.

Spring allergies and asthma can be challenging for kids, but there are several ways you can safeguard them.

- Keep windows and doors closed. Close your home's windows and doors during high pollen days to prevent allergens from entering your home. You can also use an air purifier with a HEPA filter to keep the indoor air clean as well.
- Encourage regular hand washing. Show your child how washing their hands regularly helps remove allergens they have encountered.

- Keep your home clean. Vacuum, dust, and clean your home regularly to remove any allergens that may have accumulated.
- Changing children's clothing after playing outside and bathing at night can also ensure your child doesn't sleep with pollen on them. Pets may carry pollen on them too, so keep pets that play outside out of your child's bedroom.
- If your child has received prescription medications for their allergies, make sure they are taking them regularly to help combat the severity of their allergies.

If your child's symptoms persist or worsen, seek medical advice from your child's pediatrician. Remember, prevention is key when it comes to allergies and asthma. By taking the necessary precautions and following the tips mentioned above, you can help keep your kids less effected by allergies during the spring season.

A More Hopeful Time in Our Schools

The Long Beach Unified School District recently marked three years since that fateful day in March 2020 when we reluctantly closed our school campuses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. At the time, we hoped our schools would return to in-person learning in six weeks. In reality, we had embarked on a much longer journey that would challenge our schools and communities like never before. About five months later, in August

2020, I became LBUSD's superintendent after nearly 28 years working as a teacher, principal and central office administrator in our beloved school system.

LBUSD would go on to become the first large school district in California to reopen campuses for in-person learning. As part of LBUSD's pandemic recovery effort, we developed the District's first Learning Acceleration and Support Plan, blending together various resources - including significant pandemic recovery funding from the state and federal governments – to provide the best possible learning opportunities. In support of this work, our Board of Education adopted an Excellence and Equity Policy, we implemented a Black Student Achievement Initiative, and we restructured Board of Education meetings to allow a greater focus on student outcomes. We also created the Superintendent's Student Advisory Committee, resulting in student voices being elevated into many settings traditionally occupied by adults. And we launched a community-wide strategic planning effort called Vision 2035.

In late February of this year, California Gov. Gavin Newsom rescinded the COVID state of emergency that he had declared back in March 2020. Similarly, the Long Beach City Council recently ended its declared emergency, and Los Angeles County announced that it would rescind a similar emergency declaration on March 31 of this year.

It's been a long three years, with no family left untouched by the pandemic. We're all still learning to live with COVID-19 in our communities. But our schools are now well-poised to provide our students with the academic and social-emotional support they need to succeed. I am forever grateful to all who have weathered the worst of the pandemic storm with us, including our resilient students and their families, our dedicated employees and our community partners.

Thanks to everyone's support, we're back to celebrating our amazing students. Among them is Frania Lopez from Jordan High School, who recently became the first student to be sworn into a newly created student board member position on our Board of Education. At her first meeting, she delivered a moving speech about some of the challenges that she overcame prior to transferring to LBUSD from another school system five years ago.



"Ever since I came here, I felt much more loved and supported than I've ever felt in my whole life before," Frania said. "I'm really happy to say that I felt at home here, and I'm really glad to be here among everyone."

Such moments are poignant reminders of why we as educators choose this profession, and that listening to student voices is so important as we all move forward. Congratulations to Frania, and to all our students, families and staff who've overcome significant challenges to reach a new, more hopeful time. I look forward to more celebrations with you all.


A Tribute to Michael "Jerry" DaDurka

Michael Gerald "Jerry" DaDurka was born in Binghamton, NY on December 11, 1941. His family moved to CA shortly and he grew up in Southern CA. Upon High School graduation in 1966 he joined the Marine Corps. During boot camp at Pendleton he was honored as the best recruit among all five platoons!

Following his years in the Corps, he attended Northern Arizona University where he was a member of the TKE fraternity and graduated with a degree in Education. He earned a Masters' Degree from UCLA.

His teaching career was with the Long Beach Unified School District. He began as a math teacher at Stanford Middle School and after 10 years and serving as Department Chairman, moved to David Starr Jordan High School as a Government teacher. He served as Chairman of the Social Science Department until his retirement.

As a government teacher he worked tirelessly, beginning each day at 6 am. He set up a Speakers' Forum which enabled his students and those of other government teachers to interact with local, state, and federal government officials. He developed a strong Community Service Program and was awarded the Medal of Merit in 1991 by Jordan High administration and the Toyota Motor Corp. In 1994, he developes a Community Service Program for the LBUSD.



During this time, he led a group of Seniors each year on an education-oriented trip to Washington DC, sponsored by the Close-up Foundation. The students met legislators, participated in discussions, and observed American government in action.

In 1998, Jerry was a recipient of the Daily Points of Light Award from the Points of Light Foundation instituted by President George H. W. Bush. He was honored for the many hours of exceptional service and dedication to his students, his school, and the community.

Upon retirement in 2003 he moved to San Clemente. CA with his wife, Carole. He became a member of the San Clemente Presbyterian Church and was involved in the Home Owners' Association of their community, serving several times on the Board of Directors. In 2005 he traveled to Lithuania to discover more about his family heritage and meet relatives. He hired young student, Linas, to be his translator. He became a mentor for Linas and supported him financially through college in the Netherlands.

During the last three years Jerry was challenged with illnesses, but kept his dignity and persevered with his faith. He succumbed on January 13 while enroute to Saddleback Hospital. He is dearly loved by his wife, family members, and friends and will be remembered for his loyalty, strength of character, and his desire always to serve.




