recognized in Washington, D.C. in June by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform.



Schools to Watch recognizes middle grade schools for their capacity to promote academic achievement in a safe and caring learning environment where each and every student is positioned to succeed in high school and beyond. Fisler School serves Kinder to 8th grade students in the Fullerton School District with School to Watch recognizing the middle school grades. California's Schools to Watch-Taking Center Stage program uses a competitive, rigorous review process to identify high performing, high impact middle schools so that all middle schools may have models of real-world success.

The Schools to Watch program is sponsored by the California Department of Education, California League of Educators, and the California Middle Grades Alliance, in association with the National Forum to Accelerate Middle-Grades Reform. To earn this designation, schools must complete an extensive application and host a site visit by middle grades experts.

Maple School Teacher Awarded Region 11 California League of Educators **Elementary Teacher of the Year**

Amy Chung, teacher at Maple School, was awarded the Region 11 California League of Educators Elementary Teacher of the Year. Ms. Chung was nominated for her devotion and dedication to her students and her ability to make a difference.

This award is granted to a teacher who exemplifies educational excellence and has made significant efforts to implement

elements of educational reform. The California League of Educators Educator of the Year award is given annually to California elementary, middle, and high school educators who exemplify educational excellence. As the nominee selected to represent Region 11, which includes Los Angeles and Orange Counties, Ms. Chung was honored at the California League of Educators Conference held in Monterey, California earlier this month. At this conference, Ms. Chung was honored as the California League of Educators Elementary Teacher of the Year.

To nab the top spot for Region 11, Ms. Chung shared the most important lesson for her as an educator for over

14 years. Ms. Chung spoke about the most important lesson from her students is, "the power of being seen and represented is immeasurably impactful." Ms. Chung spoke about her experiences as a child and the jabs she received about her eyes, name, and foods she ate. She took these experiences and integrated them into her lessons as an educator, striving to make sure that all students are seen. At a Title 1 school, Ms. Chung expressed her appreciation for Maple School Principal, Anthony Abney, for highlighting the positive contributions to the success of this country.

In addition to recognizing other cultures, Ms. Chung has shared her Asian American culture with students. This included sharing of a showcase of books highlighting Asian culture as well as working with the parents at Maple School to bring in lion dancers and a dragon to celebrate Lunar New Year allowing students to experience the vibrance of the culture. The excitement and energy shared by the students through this experience brought a fullness in her heart that can't be expressed in words. Ms. Chung states that, "cultural shifts can happen, and they can happen within one generation." Ms. Chung believes that being represented and seen develops a pride in students within gives them the capacity to celebrate and empathize with others.

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





Los Fabulosos

Los Fabulosos by the Grammy awardwinning Lucky Diaz and the Family Jam Band is one of the wackiest collections of original children's music I can remember hearing. The first song, "Ridiculous," is just that — it's like the Beatles at their silliest, except with a Latin beat. As background music for the video that Lucky Diaz patched

together using public-domain video footage that are probably older than your grandparents, it's wonderful, highlighting rapid-motion silent films of elaborate stunts, towering unicycles, a woman and a dog jumping rope, and a very old cartoon. "Elephant" and "Elevator" are energetic. Children can skip wildly to the elephants' rhythm, remembering to periodically hydrate, just as elephants do. "Elevator" plays on children's glee about being a "glutton for buttons"—just remind them to not play with the elevator in the real world. Other people need to use it, you know.




"Me Gusta" is a bilingual twoparter, with the Spanish and English flowing into each other and out again and then merging into a cha-cha. The song celebrates body awareness and the great things bodies do: "Me gustan mis ojos, they help me see the world. Me gustan los manos, holding

hands make me smile. Me gusta ti—you make me happy!" This song may choke you up—it sounds like the best ending credits ever.

Life Beyond Sight

What does it mean "to see"? When you say, "Do you see?" you're not referring to eyesight but to understanding, and that's what the songs on Life Beyond Sight are about. The CD is the product of a self-advocacy workshop that produced songs written and sung by students from the Maryland School of the Blind.



The opener, "Not with My Eyes," is a blunt challenge to people who make themselves feel good through the pretext of helping someone whom they see as "disabled": "You'd like to help a blind girl, pretend that you're my friend. I see your truth, but not with my eyes."

That may sound harsh, but it's what self-advocacy sounds like for someone who won't accept labels or insincerity.

The collection gives expression to discomfort, fears, absolute joy and sharing gifts. The students sing of those gifts in "Dance to Freedom;" they see with other senses and through their thoughts. "Lifeboat to Sanity" describes the insecurity of two individuals on either side of the sighted shore and how music carries them across the bridge they can build. The instrumental track of "Not with My Eyes" stands alone as melancholy-infused jazz, and "Bach Invention in C Major" is a virtuoso performance performed by 14-year-old student Alex Kern.

"You are limited by the things you see—you don't have the gift that was given to me." No matter how you see, this collection brings light and understanding. It can be ordered here or downloaded here.

Songs Across the Pond

Could you use something light and friendly? Children's musician Brady Rymer and his English counterpart, David Gibb—from across the pond, you see have teamed up for some lively ditties. It started when Mr. Gibb wrote a letter to Mr. Rymer telling him how much he enjoyed his music—soon, they went from pen pals to Zoom buddies, remotely writing songs about friendship, food, vocabulary and each other's country's music.

Title tune "Across the Pond" is the first song they wrote together, leapfrogging as one wrote a verse or a chorus and the other wrote the next one. Your Zoom classroom or your own family might try this for fun!

"Two Towns" describes the differences between and similarities of a typical U.S. city. You'll get the idea of

"Roundabouts" if you've been in a traffic circle in the States—Long Beach and Orange both have one. "You Say This, I Say That" tells us whether we're pushing a stroller or a pram and whether we need to use the loo or the bathroom!

And if "You Say This, I Say That" brings the Beatles to mind, you're right on track. "Living in a Beatles Song" is a patchwork of phrases from Fab Four tunes, and the singers also sing songs by England's Cat Stevens and the U.S.'s Sam Cooke.

The catchy "Summertime Soul" celebrates Mr. Gibb's favorite season and Mr. Rymer's favorite chord progression. You'll want to sing along, and you can—printable lyrics to all the songs can be found on this link.
