



Mental Health in Children

Mental health issues like anxiety, depression, and self-harm among children have risen in recent years, and can have long-lasting effects on a child's physical, emotional, and social development.

Factors that can affect a child's mental health include genetics, environment, and life experiences. Common mental health disorders in children include anxiety disorders, depression, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), and behavior disorders. These conditions can impact a child's ability to learn in school, interact with others, and develop healthy relationships.

Parents and teachers play a crucial role in promoting positive mental health among children. Some strategies for support include providing a safe and supportive environment, encouraging open communication, promoting healthy habits like exercise and good nutrition, and seeking help when needed.

Recognizing the warning signs of mental health issues in

children is important. These may include changes in behavior, mood, sleep, or appetite. Additionally, a child may express feelings of sadness, worry, or fear, have difficulty concentrating or completing tasks, or exhibit physical symptoms such as headaches or stomachaches. They may also isolate more than before.

It's important not to minimize their feelings. Children need to feel safe coming to parents with their issues, and as parents it's important to ask them how they feel if there is a change in behavior.

Early intervention and treatment can significantly improve a child's mental health outcome. Treatment options may include therapy, medication, lifestyle changes or a combination tailored to each child's needs. By supporting their mental health, we can help children develop into healthy, resilient adults.

It's a wizard, it's a druid, it's a...dragon? Fulton Middle School recently completed its inaugural season of the Dungeon & Dragons Game Club. Inspired by two eighthgrade students, Cassidy Stone and Ella Lamsus, and sponsored by teachers

Jennifer Rehling and Adam Elmi, Dungeons & Dragons is one of the most popular clubs on campus.

For those unfamiliar, D&D is a collaborative tabletop game. It requires inventive storytelling and role-playing that is limited only by the imaginations of the Dungeon Masters and the players involved in "The Quest." Each group has a designated "Dungeon Master" who devises the quest, and the players invent their own characters. Adventures can encompass a single day, or they can carry on indefinitely depending upon the character direction regarding any obstacles, puzzles, riddles, and, of course, the rolls of the polyhedral dice.

The response from our students and parents to the club is overwhelmingly positive. Seventh-grade Dungeon Master Rylan Gattis describes his responsibilities as, "The role of the DM is to run the game, and make sure everyone is having fun. To be a good DM you need to be creative, and read the room for unexpected twists when the story drifts from the original plan. If players struggle to solve a puzzle, I'm there to help."

A newer player, seventh-grader Carter Tran, said, "What I love most about D&D Club is having fun with friends and exciting experiences. I definitely recommend it." Rehling and Elmi note that the game intellectually challenges the players' imaginations in a safe, fun, and welcoming environment. Students embrace new friendships, have elevated self-confidence, and develop a true sense of connection to Fulton.

As this year's players become next year's Dungeon Masters in Season Two of the Fulton D&D Club, they look forward to inviting new peers to join in the adventure.
