



Healthy Study HabitsBy Alexis Briggeman, 12th Grade Student

As the end of the school year approaches, CdMHS students juggle end of the year activities, AP exams, and finals. Many students experience high levels of stress, as they worry about their grades and test scores.

However, there are countless methods on how to manage time when juggling all these activities that can lower stress and increase relaxation.

Technology can make it difficult to focus, as texts and notifications may distract students. It is tempting for students to grab their phones and scroll through social media instead of doing their homework or studying for a test. Freshman Caroline Steffans struggles with staying off her phone when studying but still shares a solution, "Sometimes I just have to put my phone away and I feel like if I put it far away from where I am studying I won't feel like

getting up to check my phone." Sophomore Kris Villaluz also struggles with focus, and shares that she "often [gets] distracted easily and can get tired of school work quickly." For Villaluz, "The library has been the best study spot." Villaluz also suggests using an app called Forest. This app helps students study by blocking and disabling all distractions, such as notifications and phone calls. Students may also use the Pomodoro Technique, a technique characterized by 25 minutes of concentrated work and then a five-minute break. It is designed to increase focus and ensure that students study deliberately to give the best results.

It is also important that students effectively schedule their time, ensuring that they have time to study for all their classes while still participating in all of their extracurriculars. Freshman Achintya Pandey shares that she "tries to plan ahead and [she] sets limits on social media so [she] won't overdo [herself]." She also recommends using open periods to study and do work. It is important that students utilize their time wisely to prevent cramming for tests, which can result in loss of information and exhaustion.

Excelling at Energy Invitational

Engineering design students at Estancia High School recently competed in the Vital Link Energy Invitational, a competition where students build vehicles from the ground up or by modifying existing vehicles using a combination of energy sources.

Two teams of engineering students--Team Aguila and Team Titan--spent the past five months preparing for the

competition to build and race a single-driver electric vehicle. With the support of the engineering design teacher and two industry professional mentors from an electric-aerial-mobility company, students prepared an extensive design presentation that included information about the budget for the build, design of the frame and body, the battery, safety and calculations regarding drag, impact, braking force, static frictional forces, kinetic frictional forces and theoretical top speed.

The students used their design to modify a go-kart into an electric vehicle, ensuring that it met all of the competition specifications. The students then competed in a timed trial against nine other schools measuring their vehicles' energy consumption at Saddleback College.

A Fun STEM Event

At Harbor View Elementary's recent annual STEM Night, our school's MPR was full of families excitedly participating in the various activities available in the fields of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

In one event, students tested their different design ideas to

build the tallest tower made of index cards. One student's tower was over four feet high! Families also transformed tissue paper, cardboard, and tape into devices meant to insulate plastic eggs (filled with candy) as they were dropped from the Newport Beach Fire Department's ladder truck.



Dental Screenings

The school nurses in Newport Mesa Unified School District are dedicated to the overall health of our students and enjoy working in collaboration with local agencies to bring access to quality care to children. The district was pleased to partner with the Assistance League's Cheri Harris Dental Center to provide dental screenings to some first-grade students at several Costa Mesa elementary schools. This partnership

provided students with a complete dental screening and potential referrals for families to access community based, low-cost dental care. School nurses and health assistants shared with parents who received a referral from the screening the importance of dental treatment for their child as untreated tooth decay can cause pain and lead to malnutrition, poor performance in school, childhood speech problems and serious infections. In California, more than 60% of students have experienced tooth decay by third grade, and 1 in 5 kids have untreated tooth decay.

OCDE's Continuous Commitment to Strengthening School Safety

Our children deserve to learn and grow in safe and secure environments, where they can thrive academically and emotionally. And parents should be confident that when they send their children to school, they will return home just as healthy and happy as when they left.

Yet in too many instances, we have seen this social contract ripped apart by the devastating reality of school violence, leading to the familiar cycle of shock, grief and anger.

I wish I could say I had answers sufficient to prevent this country's next mass shooting. I do not. I can only extend my most heartfelt condolences to anyone impacted by senseless violence, and I can reaffirm here the sustained commitment of the Orange County Department of Education and leaders throughout our region to proactively protect our students and staff.

To give you some background, California schools are required by law to update their Comprehensive Safe School Plans each year. These plans outline each campus's planned responses to various crises, and they are routinely reinforced through site-level drills, including evacuations and shelter-in-place exercises.

Of course the strategies for promoting safety will vary by campus and are ultimately up to each district's locally elected school board and leadership teams, in partnership with teachers, families, staff, students and communities. But our department eagerly supports this work with trainings and workshops throughout the year, covering such topics as safe school plans, behavioral threat assessments, earthquake preparedness, resilience strategies and active-shooter behavioral indicators.

Meanwhile, OCDE works closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department and other

local law enforcement agencies to study everything from cyberbullying to how to best secure school facilities. One key partnership worth noting is with the Orange County Intelligence Assessment Center, or OCIAC, which leverages the reach and resources of the Sheriff's Department, the FBI and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to detect, investigate and prevent criminal and terrorist activity.

OCDE and the Sheriff's Department also team up every summer to host the Safe Schools Conference with the California Department of Education. This three-day event brings together more than 500 educators and law enforcement personnel from throughout the state to discuss issues and trends related to campus violence, bullying, social media, human trafficking, gangs and substance abuse.

In the case of critical incidents impacting schools, OCDE's Crisis Response Network deploys psychologists, nurses, social workers and other personnel to support students and staff during and after emergencies. This team also conducts trainings for schools, youth service providers, parents and students.

Finally, OCDE champions positive school climates and anti-bullying through initiatives such as the Multi-Tiered System of Support framework, Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports, or PBIS, and our One Billion Acts of Kindness campaign, which kicked off in 2016 to promote character and amplify civility in our communities.

In Orange County, we view the pursuit of safer schools as a race with no finish line, and that means our commitment must be equally unwavering and enduring. New threats will continue to emerge, but so too will new technologies, strategies and best practices for protecting students and schools. Above all, we vow to stay vigilant and informed, work closely with our law enforcement partners, and adapt our approaches accordingly.

We owe our children and families nothing less.
