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PYLUSD Offers Students College and Career Opportunities Galore



The Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD) is committed to offering an extensive list of college and career readiness opportunities to benefit students' success now and in the future.

The district's secondary career technical education (CTE) programs, known as CareerLink Academies and Pathways, allow PYLUSD high school students to see the real-world relevance and applicability of their curriculum, gain new industry-specific skills, network with professionals in their area of

interest, engage in internships and job training in their fields, and earn credits and certifications that facilitate their transition into collegiate programs of study or the workforce.

In total, the district boasts six CTE academies and a wide variety of CTE pathways for the 2022-2023 school year. CareerLink Academies include Digital Media Arts (DMAA) and ED LAW at El Dorado High School, Aztec Engineering and Manufacturing and Medical Sciences at Esperanza High School, Val Tech at Valencia High School, and Mustang Business at Yorba Linda High School. Across the district, CareerLink Pathways provide courses focused on an array of industry sectors such as patient care, food service and hospitality, construction, education, and more.

For instance, it is the mission of Esperanza's Aztec Engineering and Manufacturing Academy to teach students about applicable careers through industry software and technology, certification, field trips, internships, and job shadowing. Academy instructors equip students with the academic and technical skills, knowledge, and training to succeed in future careers. Whether students choose to pursue engineering or manufacturing courses, or both, they are trained in safety and introduced to basic concepts and skills before working on real-life projects around Esperanza's campus and the community.

Students in Aztec Engineering and Manufacturing Academy live their motto "from concept to product," which was recently put on full display as students shared a proposal for a gate improvement project on campus with my Superintendent's Cabinet in April. With guidance from their teachers, students identified the need for the extended gate, conceptualized and designed a solution, and planned for its production complete with a parts list, cost breakdown, and timeline for the project. Their presentation left me and the others in attendance in awe of the knowledge and skills of our students, and with a deep sense of appreciation for our continued investment in career technical education across the district.

Esperanza's efforts in this area offer just one example of how PYLUSD prepares students for higher education and the high-demand jobs of the future through a multitude of college and career readiness opportunities.



Over 500 PYLUSD Students Participate in Reflections Art Program

From the District

The National Parent Teacher Association (PTA) has a longstanding commitment to arts education, similar to that of the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD). The National PTA Reflections Program encourages students to explore their own thoughts, feelings, and ideas, develop artistic literacy, increase confidence, and find a love for learning that will help them become more successful in school and in life.

The theme for this year's Reflections Program was "Show Your Voice!" The contest encouraged students to produce works of art that showcased their individuality. This year, PYLUSD had 582 student artists from 22 schools participate in Reflections, which is organized by the Placentia Yorba Linda Unified Council.

Twenty-six entries advanced to the Fourth District, which represents Orange County PTA members and members in a small portion of Los Angeles County. Fifteen of the 26 entries received 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place awards, and five awardees then had their art forwarded to the state-level competition. Notably, three of five entries received recognition at the state level and two were forwarded to the national level of competition.

The district's five state/national participants include Kaiden Surti, a 7th grader at Kraemer Middle School, for his music composition piece titled "Hear Me;" Fernando Nunez, a 9th grader at El Dorado High School for his entry in film production titled "Venture Academy;" Kendra Livergood, a 10th grader at El Dorado High School, for her entry in film production titled "Last 3 Years;" Emma Schroeder, a 6th grader at Woodsboro Elementary School, for her photograph "I Heart Books;" and Daisy Bagga, 5th grader at John O. Tynes Elementary, for her acrylic painting titled, "Mixed Actions."

Kaiden's and Fernando's art entries were submitted to the national competition and will undergo two rounds of review by esteemed arts professionals across the country. The national awards are to be announced at the beginning of May and the virtual National PTA Convention will be held in June.

PYLUSD Superintendent Dr. Michael Matthews commented, "I'm so grateful to PYLUC for giving our students the opportunity to demonstrate their amazing artistic talents. Nearly 600 of our students responded to this opportunity. I am proud of all of them for their efforts, and I congratulate all who have received local, state, and national recognition."

The Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District is proud of these students, and we are grateful to all of our teachers who foster creativity and offer art instruction in classrooms. The district looks forward to participating in the 2023-2024 Reflections Program with the theme of "I Am Hopeful Because."






