

Mental Health is Health

Mental health is one of Beach Cities Health District's (BCHD) four health priorities. This is fueled by the fact that while our Beach Cities community has a healthy presentation on the outside, there continues to be concerning rates of reported stress, bullying and substance use. Suicidal ideation and feelings of chronic sadness/hopelessness are high for our 11th graders. Adult suicide rates are greater than

Los Angeles County and our level of stress remains equal to post-Katrina New Orleans, while our anger is on par with urban populations such as Detroit, Michigan. Focusing on mental health across the lifespan presents an

opportunity for dramatic improvement in well-being.

BCHD is kicking off the month of May with our community-wide campaign "Mental Health is Health" with partners including the Redondo Beach Unified School District. The campaign's message aims to decrease stigma, increase help seeking behaviors, increase awareness of and access to resources for mental health, and build community capacity to support individuals who need mental health resources. BCHD looks forward to collaborating with the school district to spread the word on mental health at the Parras Middle School Mindfulness Summit (May 6), Adams Middle School PTSA Health and Wellness Festival (May 13) and the Redondo Union High School Mental Health Fair (May 17). Mental Health in Children

Mental health issues like anxiety, depression, and self-harm among children have risen in recent years, and can have long-lasting effects on a child's physical, emotional, and social development.

Factors that can affect a child's mental health include genetics, environment, and life experiences. Common mental health disorders in children include anxiety disorders, depression, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), and behavior disorders. These conditions can impact a child's ability to learn in school, interact with others, and develop healthy relationships.

Parents and teachers play a crucial role in promoting positive mental health among children. Some strategies for support include providing a safe and supportive environment, encouraging open communication, promoting healthy habits like exercise and good nutrition, and seeking help when needed.

Recognizing the warning signs of mental health issues in

children is important. These may include changes in behavior, mood, sleep, or appetite. Additionally, a child may express feelings of sadness, worry, or fear, have difficulty concentrating or completing tasks, or exhibit physical symptoms such as headaches or stomachaches. They may also isolate more than before.

It's important not to minimize their feelings. Children need to feel safe coming to parents with their issues, and as parents it's important to ask them how they feel if there is a change in behavior.

Early intervention and treatment can significantly improve a child's mental health outcome. Treatment options may include therapy, medication, lifestyle changes or a combination tailored to each child's needs. By supporting their mental health, we can help children develop into healthy, resilient adults.

Summer Learning

Summer break is typically a time for children to relax, indulge in some extra screen time, play outside, and enjoy the unstructured hours. However, too much free time can lead to a "summer slide" or regression in academic proficiency. The good news is that there are a number of ways to keep your children engaged in reading and math over the summer.

For starters, give your children access to a wide variety of the kind of books that they enjoy reading or listening to, and are fully able to comprehend. Locally, the Redondo Beach Public Library offers a Summer Reading Program that provides multiple opportunities for both students and their families to read. Additionally, Alta Vista also has reading lists for independent summer reading posted on our website.

Games and puzzles are another great way for students to keep up with their foundational skills and promote

pro-social play. Another novelty that stimulates the brain and promotes learning is visiting historical sites, planetariums, museums, and other places. This will help to reinforce in a real-life setting what the children are learning from books.

Children who use their imaginations are also expanding their vocabulary at the same time, and are experimenting with new concepts. So let your children craft, conduct science experiments, cook, act, invent, or build Legos.

Research shows that physically active students tend to have better grades and classroom behavior. Higher physical activity is also associated with improved cognitive performance. For these reasons, try to continue the physical activities that our Wildcats have been taking part in this year, such as the Wildcat Run Club. Summer also gives students a time to run, hike, jog, or walk in different environments like the strand, the Palos Verdes trails, or our local parks.

Have a wonderful summer getting lost in a book, exploring the outdoors, or playing games with family and friends. We will see all of our Wildcats in the Fall!

Prepare for Testing

All of our Lincoln students participate in Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) testing throughout the school year. Our kindergarten students take the MAP test in the winter and spring, and our first-through fifth-grade students take the MAP test in the fall, winter and spring. The MAP test assesses reading and math and gives Lexile (reading) and Quantile (math) scores. It not

only measures achievement but, more importantly, also measures growth.

Our school and district use this data to better understand the impact of what we are teaching and what students are learning. This May, Lincoln third-, fourth- and fifth-grade students will take the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP), also known as state testing. Beyond the CAASPP and MAP assessments, our Lincoln students prepare throughout the school year to become successful, lifelong learners.

Testing tips: To help your children do well on their testing, please make sure they get a good night's sleep. Also, make sure that you provide a light, healthy breakfast, and have your children dress comfortably and arrive at school on time. Most importantly, send your children off to school with confidence-building words of praise and support, like "You'll do great!" "Believe in yourself!" and "I love you!" Suggest that your children breathe deeply to relax before and during the test, and remind them to read directions carefully and be thoughtful when submitting their answers. Please do not schedule trips, dental or medical appointments, or early pickups for testing days. Please make sure their Chromebooks are charged every night!

Most of all, remember that tests are just one indicator of how a child is doing, and communication throughout the year with your children's teachers is always the best way to determine their success. As always at Lincoln, we strive to be the best we can be, and with your help and support, our students will be successful in all that they do.

Summer is a great opportunity to enhance your child's knowledge through real-life experiences as well as reviewing the essential skills from the school year. Studies have shown that students may lose up to 60% of reading and math skills over the summer if not engaged with learning opportunities.

To continue being lifelong learners, children and young adults need ongoing opportunities to

learn and practice essential skills. Here are some ideas for your child to keep their minds sharp and explore new experiences:

- Read at least ONE Raz-Kids book a day. Remember to first listen to the book, read the book aloud to practice fluency, and take the comprehension test.
- Make visiting the library a weekly event. The Redondo Beach Library has some activities.

Encourage your child to get lost in a favorite series, a favorite character, or genre. Plan a book club playdate with friends that focuses on a common book, or that allows each friend to share a book that they would recommend to each other. Remind your child that a book recommendation gives a "teaser" of a summary and why they believe others would like it too!

- For grades K-2, log onto Reading Eggs for 15 minutes daily to complete at least ONE full lesson.
- For grades 3-5, download the Battle of the Books reading list (on our school website) and get a jump start for the 2023-24 battle!
- Visit a museum. Admission to the Science Center is free. There are lots of great hands-on exhibits for kids.
- Go to a concert on the Redondo Beach Pier every Thursday or Saturday night from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. in July and August. Concerts are free and fun for the whole family!
- Purchase or create a special "Summer Journal."
 Find 10-15 minutes daily to write about the events of the day. Encourage your child to read their journal daily to allow them to write for a real audience.
- Have your children help prepare a meal or dish for the family. Before you go to the supermarket, find a recipe, write what you need and how much. At the supermarket, choose the best-priced option.


