WSD Partners with City of Westminster for School Safety!

Westminster School District (WSD) and the City of Westminster partnered to kick-off the Safe Routes to School Program. The initiative is spearheaded by the City of Westminster, after they received a grant from the Caltrans Sustainable Communities Planning Grant Program. The goal is focus on providing safe routes for students to walk and bike to and from school. The City of Westminster is working with Alta Planning

+ Design, Inc. to survey infrastructure and roads around schools in Westminster over the next few weeks and months. It's imperative that we continue to prioritize our student's safety.

This ongoing collaboration between the City and WSD will ensure that our students and families have a peace of mind when heading to school and going home. The City and the consultant firm will work closely with the district to coordinate dates and times when they conduct walk-audits in the neighborhoods around the schools. The teams will be walking the routes that students use to travel to school and acknowledge any issues on the roads. The hands-on approach by the City and the district demonstrates their promise and commitment to the safety of the WSD Community. We are excited to be a part of this program that the City of Westminster has partnered with Westminster School District.

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Bilingualism is a Superpower!

Westminster School District (WSD) in California is celebrating its 150th anniversary during the 2022-2023 school year and it has plenty to be proud of. The district was the first in the US to be desegregated, thanks to the landmark Mendez v. Westminster case in 1947. This set the stage for the Brown v. Board of Education decision that desegregated schools across the nation. Today, WSD is celebrating its commitment to multicultural diversity and specifically biliteracy as a superpower.

This month, students at Willmore Elementary in Westminster gathered to celebrate the school's Biliteracy Seal of Excellence award, presented by the California Association for Bilingual Education (CABE). The award recognizes outstanding dual language immersion (DLI) programs that promote bilingual education and cultural understanding among students. Willmore Elementary, which offers a full immersion program in Spanish and English along with coding too; was one of only five schools in California to receive the prestigious award this year. This is an impressive feat, as most applicants receive recommendations for improvements over multiple years before winning the Seal of Excellence.

Principal, Tieumi "Domi" Ellis and Superintendent, Gunn Marie Hansen accepted the award on behalf of the school. Next month, WSD will celebrate this milestone again, but at DeMille Elementary, which won the same award for

Vietnamese/English dual language immersion. DeMille was the first Vietnamese DLI program in the state of California.

Dr. Ryna G. Garcia Ramos, a CABE regional representative, praised the students at the ceremony, saying, "Biliteracy is your superpower! You have a superpower! We have come a long way since the days when students of color had to attend a different school because of your language and heritage. This school district was the first to desegregate with the help of the brave Mendez family, and today we celebrate multicultural differences and biliteracy!"

The success of WSD's DLI programs is a testament to the district's long history of promoting desegregation and equal education. The Seal of Excellence awards highlight the impact of diversity, inclusion, and equity, valuing all students and their uniqueness. Board President David M. Johnson stated that "Students who study in two languages do so in history, math, science, and more, which develops their brains in arts and science so that they outperform others in both English and math. It is a super power."

In recent years, WSD dedicated their district offices, the Boardroom, and a gymnasium to honor the Mendez family. The timing of WSD's 150th anniversary and the dual language immersion awards highlights the power of education to promote diversity as an important part of education in modern communities. The dedication of leadership is a shining example of the district's vision to create tomorrow's leaders today.

Mental Health in Children

Mental health issues like anxiety, depression, and self-harm among children have risen in recent years, and can have long-lasting effects on a child's physical, emotional, and social development.

Factors that can affect a child's mental health include genetics, environment, and life experiences. Common mental health disorders in children include anxiety disorders, depression, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), and behavior disorders. These conditions can impact a child's ability to learn in school, interact with others, and develop healthy relationships.

Parents and teachers play a crucial role in promoting positive mental health among children. Some strategies for support include providing a safe and supportive environment, encouraging open communication, promoting healthy habits like exercise and good nutrition, and seeking help when needed.

Recognizing the warning signs of mental health issues in

children is important. These may include changes in behavior, mood, sleep, or appetite. Additionally, a child may express feelings of sadness, worry, or fear, have difficulty concentrating or completing tasks, or exhibit physical symptoms such as headaches or stomachaches. They may also isolate more than before.

It's important not to minimize their feelings. Children need to feel safe coming to parents with their issues, and as parents it's important to ask them how they feel if there is a change in behavior.

Early intervention and treatment can significantly improve a child's mental health outcome. Treatment options may include therapy, medication, lifestyle changes or a combination tailored to each child's needs. By supporting their mental health, we can help children develop into healthy, resilient adults.



Safe Routes to School

Last month, the City of Westminster kicked off the Safe Routes to School program, which promotes walking and bicycling safely to and from schools. The City received a \$500,000 grant that will be used to evaluate and study routes to and from all public schools within Westminster's boundaries to determine if infrastructure improvements, additional enforcement, safety education, and other tools are needed to ensure the

safety of students and their families. This study will also enable the city to qualify for and obtain funding for recommended improvements, as well as develop the first-ever Safe Routes to School Plan in Westminster. Parents, students, teachers, and all who are impacted by pedestrian safety are invited to participate in future walk audits and community workshops. 
Special Olympics

Esports at the elementary level may



Our students' powerful display in the STEM fields is a direct result of participating in the Mentor Match program with Westminster High School MERIT students. Each Warner OCSEF project group was matched with multiple junior/senior mentors to guide, motivate, and engage through the OCSEF journey from project selection to project completion.

Having a mentor as a project coach helped our students by building equity and access for all students

no matter the parents' language ability, economic status or education levels. This was a for-student-by-student approach that enabled their success. Another bright moment at the OCSEF awards ceremony was when Travis Garwick, a science teacher at Warner Middle school, was named OCSEF Teacher of the Year in recognition of his dedication and commitment to student achievement.

Furthermore, Warner Middle School increased its student participation in the ExploraVision STEM competition by the National Science Teacher Association and a multinational electronics corporation. Warner Middle School had five students participating, with two projects submitted. The student project by Donna Huynh and Maryan Nguyen won for our region. Donna and Maryan are currently competing for the national competition against the other five regional winners for \$10,000 in scholarships.

As our students gain the competitive edge in STEM, they also gain power in achieving Westminster School District's mission statement: "Building Tomorrow's Leaders, Today."





OCDE's Continuous Commitment to Strengthening School Safety

Our children deserve to learn and grow in safe and secure environments, where they can thrive academically and emotionally. And parents should be confident that when they send their children to school, they will return home just as healthy and happy as when they left.

Yet in too many instances,

we have seen this social contract ripped apart by the devastating reality of school violence, leading to the familiar cycle of shock, grief and anger.

I wish I could say I had answers sufficient to prevent this country's next mass shooting. I do not. I can only extend my most heartfelt condolences to anyone impacted by senseless violence, and I can reaffirm here the sustained commitment of the Orange County Department of Education and leaders throughout our region to proactively protect our students and staff.

To give you some background, California schools are required by law to update their Comprehensive Safe School Plans each year. These plans outline each campus's planned responses to various crises, and they are routinely reinforced through site-level drills, including evacuations and shelter-in-place exercises.

Of course the strategies for promoting safety will vary by campus and are ultimately up to each district's locally elected school board and leadership teams, in partnership with teachers, families, staff, students and communities. But our department eagerly supports this work with trainings and workshops throughout the year, covering such topics as safe school plans, behavioral threat assessments, earthquake preparedness, resilience strategies and active-shooter behavioral indicators.

Meanwhile, OCDE works closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department and other local law enforcement agencies to study everything from cyberbullying to how to best secure school facilities. One key partnership worth noting is with the Orange County Intelligence Assessment Center, or OCIAC, which leverages the reach and resources of the Sheriff's Department, the FBI and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to detect, investigate and prevent criminal and terrorist activity.

OCDE and the Sheriff's Department also team up every summer to host the Safe Schools Conference with the California Department of Education. This three-day event brings together more than 500 educators and law enforcement personnel from throughout the state to discuss issues and trends related to campus violence, bullying, social media, human trafficking, gangs and substance abuse.

In the case of critical incidents impacting schools, OCDE's Crisis Response Network deploys psychologists, nurses, social workers and other personnel to support students and staff during and after emergencies. This team also conducts trainings for schools, youth service providers, parents and students.

Finally, OCDE champions positive school climates and anti-bullying through initiatives such as the Multi-Tiered System of Support framework, Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports, or PBIS, and our One Billion Acts of Kindness campaign, which kicked off in 2016 to promote character and amplify civility in our communities.

In Orange County, we view the pursuit of safer schools as a race with no finish line, and that means our commitment must be equally unwavering and enduring. New threats will continue to emerge, but so too will new technologies, strategies and best practices for protecting students and schools. Above all, we vow to stay vigilant and informed, work closely with our law enforcement partners, and adapt our approaches accordingly.

We owe our children and families nothing less.
