#### Transitional Kindergarten Now Open to Children Who Are 4 yrs old by September 1, 2023

Transitional kindergarten (TK) is the first year of a two-year kindergarten program for children who do not yet meet the minimum age criterion for admittance into kindergarten. Transitional kindergarten focuses on the process of learning, which means helping children develop the skills required for effective learning. In order to accommodate more children and families, Ocean View School District has moved up the birth date requirement for TK.

Children are eligible for TK if they turn 4 on or before September 1, 2023.

Students who complete the TK program attend kindergarten the following school year. TK offers several benefits for children as they transition from preschool to formal schooling. Some key benefits of TK include:

School Readiness: TK helps children develop the necessary skills and knowledge to be better prepared for kindergarten and beyond. It focuses on social, emotional, and academic readiness, ensuring a smoother transition into elementary school.

Age-Appropriate Learning: TK provides a developmentally appropriate curriculum tailored to the needs of young learners. It allows children an additional year to grow and learn in an environment that emphasizes play, socialization, and hands-on activities.

Essential Skills Building: TK uses a curriculum based on the California Preschool Learning Foundations, designed to foster a love for learning. The program builds essential skills in: language and literacy, mathematics, physical development, health, visual and performing arts, science, history-social science, English language development, and social emotional learning.

Social and Emotional Development: TK promotes social and emotional growth by offering opportunities for children to develop important skills like cooperation, sharing, communication, and self-regulation. They learn how to navigate a structured classroom setting, interact with peers, and build positive relationships with teachers.

Individualized Attention: With smaller class sizes and lower student-to-teacher ratios, TK teachers can provide more individualized attention to each child. This allows educators to address the specific needs and learning styles of students, fostering a supportive and nurturing learning environment.

Smooth Transition: TK bridges the gap between preschool and kindergarten, making the transition to formal schooling smoother for children. They become familiar with school routines, expectations, and academic demands, which reduces anxiety and increases their confidence as they progress to the next grade level.

Long-Term Benefits: Research suggests that children who attend TK programs demonstrate improved school readiness, higher academic achievement, and increased likelihood of high school graduation. The skills and foundations established in TK can have lasting positive effects on a child's educational journey.

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

# Our Injury Prevention Team Encourages Proper Car Safety to Keep Kids Safe

Car accidents can be devastating but by taking the appropriate precautions, you can help prevent injury and death.

Using the appropriate car seat for your child's age, height, and weight is crucial. California law requires infants to be rear-facing until they are 2 years old or have reached the seat's maximum height and weight limit. At that point, children will transition to a forward-facing car seat. Next, children will transition to a booster seat. Children age 8 or older or 4'9 or taller, may use the vehicle seat belt as long as it fits properly.


Having the car seat properly installed is also critical in maximizing safety. When installing the seat, make sure it is tightly secured and doesn't wobble or move more than an inch in any direction.

Emphasize the importance of seat belts to children as soon as they are old enough to understand. Make it a rule for everyone in the car to buckle up, every time — no exceptions.

Parents can lead by example by making sure you buckle up as well. Seat belts are the most effective way to protect against serious injuries in a car.

The Injury Prevention Program at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach focuses on providing safety education to prevent injury. Dedicated injury prevention coordinators offer bicycle, pedestrian and car seat safety, infant CPR classes, as well as certified bicycle and skateboard helmets for children in need. The Injury Prevention Program team attends community events throughout Los Angeles and Orange Counties regularly, so that they can educate children and their families on how to stay safe and avoid hospitalization.

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





"Ridiculous," is just that — it's like the Beatles at their silliest, except with a Latin beat. As background music for

the <u>video that Lucky Diaz</u> patched together using public-domain video footage that are probably older than your grandparents, it's wonderful, highlighting rapid-motion silent films of elaborate stunts, towering unicycles, a woman and a dog jumping rope, and a very old cartoon. "Elephant" and "Elevator" are energetic. Children can skip wildly to the elephants' rhythm, remembering to periodically hydrate, just as elephants do. "Elevator" plays



on children's glee about being a "glutton for buttons"—just remind them to not play with the elevator in the real world. Other people need to use it, you know.

"Me Gusta" is a bilingual two-parter, with the Spanish and English flowing into each other and out again and then merging into a cha-cha. The song celebrates body awareness and the great things bodies do: "Me gustan mis ojos, they help me see the world. Me gustan los manos, holding hands make me smile. Me gusta ti—you make me

hap-py!" This song may choke you up—it sounds like the best ending credits ever.

Me gusta Los Fabulosos. The collection was a worthy contender for a 2023 GRAMMY award for Best Children's Album—their second GRAMMY nomination for this category. Stream it here on Spotify.

#### **OCDE's Continuous Commitment to Strengthening School Safety**

Our children deserve to learn and grow in safe and secure environments, where they can thrive academically and emotionally. And parents should be confident that when they send their children to school, they will return home just as healthy and happy as when they left.

Yet in too many instances, we have seen this social contract ripped

apart by the devastating reality of school violence, leading to the familiar cycle of shock, grief and anger.

I wish I could say I had answers sufficient to prevent this country's next mass shooting. I do not. I can only extend my most heartfelt condolences to anyone impacted by senseless violence, and I can reaffirm here the sustained commitment of the Orange County Department of Education and leaders throughout our region to proactively protect our students and staff.

To give you some background, California schools are required by law to update their Comprehensive Safe School Plans each year. These plans outline each campus's planned responses to various crises, and they are routinely reinforced through site-level drills, including evacuations and shelter-in-place exercises.

Of course the strategies for promoting safety will vary by campus and are ultimately up to each district's locally elected school board and leadership teams, in partnership with teachers, families, staff, students and communities. But our department eagerly supports this work with trainings and workshops throughout the year, covering such topics as safe school plans, behavioral threat assessments, earthquake preparedness, resilience strategies and active-shooter behavioral indicators.

Meanwhile, OCDE works closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department and other local law enforcement agencies to study everything from cyberbullying to how to best secure school facilities. One key partnership worth noting is with the Orange County Intelligence Assessment Center, or OCIAC, which leverages the reach and resources of the Sheriff's Department, the FBI and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to detect, investigate and prevent criminal and terrorist activity.

OCDE and the Sheriff's Department also team up every summer to host the Safe Schools Conference with the California Department of Education. This three-day event brings together more than 500 educators and law enforcement personnel from throughout the state to discuss issues and trends related to campus violence, bullying, social media, human trafficking, gangs and substance abuse.

In the case of critical incidents impacting schools, OCDE's Crisis Response Network deploys psychologists, nurses, social workers and other personnel to support students and staff during and after emergencies. This team also conducts trainings for schools, youth service providers, parents and students.

Finally, OCDE champions positive school climates and anti-bullying through initiatives such as the Multi-Tiered System of Support framework, Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports, or PBIS, and our One Billion Acts of Kindness campaign, which kicked off in 2016 to promote character and amplify civility in our communities.

In Orange County, we view the pursuit of safer schools as a race with no finish line, and that means our commitment must be equally unwavering and enduring. New threats will continue to emerge, but so too will new technologies, strategies and best practices for protecting students and schools. Above all, we vow to stay vigilant and informed, work closely with our law enforcement partners, and adapt our approaches accordingly.

We owe our children and families nothing less.
