

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### **Preventing Disconnection**

In the Anaheim Union High School District, we understand the urgent need to prepare students to navigate successfully the new world fraught with uncertainty and ambiguity.

We are meeting this challenge through our Career Preparedness Systems Framework, a comprehensive workforce development strategy rooted in cultivating workforce pathways through whole child instruction and student agency. Behind this work are

the school district's strategic partnerships with businesses and community colleges and the integration of the 5 Cs framework to support holistic student development.

In addition, we have aligned our human resources practices as they relate to administrators, teachers and staff.

#### **Priority Partnerships**

Our 28,000-student district understands the importance of forging partnerships with businesses and non-profit organizations to provide students with real-world experiences and opportunities. Collaborating with industry leaders, such as Google, allows AUHSD to expose students to cutting-edge technology, earn industry-aligned certificates and gain practical skills that are in high demand in the job market.

These partnerships also provide students with mentorship and internship opportunities, enabling them to develop networks and receive guidance from professionals. By partnering with businesses and non-profit community groups, the district bridges the gap between classroom learning and the realities of the workforce, empowering students to make informed career choices and thrive over time in their chosen fields.

The district also recognizes the value of providing students with the chance to earn college credit while in high school. Through partnerships with community colleges, AUHSD offers dual-credit programs that allow students to explore career pathways in cutting-edge areas, such as cybersecurity, biotechnology and agroscience. By partnering with community colleges, we enable students to transition seamlessly into post-secondary education and enter the workforce with a competitive advantage.

#### **Life Skills Training**

Developing the whole child is important for success beyond academics. To achieve this, our district has integrated what we call a 5Cs framework into instructional practices: Critical thinking, communication, collaboration, creativity and compassion. These skills and qualities are woven into the curriculum as students develop essential life skills.

Critical thinking allows students to analyze and solve problems effectively. Communication skills are honed to express ideas clearly and collaborate with peers. Creativity is nurtured to encourage innovative thinking. Compassion fosters empathy, respect and understanding of diverse perspectives.

By prioritizing the development of these competencies, AUHSD prepares students to excel in the workforce and become well-rounded citizens.

#### **Personnel Alignment**

To create a transformative educational environment, AUHSD focuses on aligning HR practices with its vision and goals. The alignment of personnel ensures recruitment and professional development strategies attract and retain high-quality educators who are passionate about our mission. By providing ongoing professional development, the district supports educators in integrating the 5Cs framework into their teaching practices effectively.

Aligning HR practices also facilitates the creation of a positive and inclusive school culture, where educators feel valued and empowered to drive student success. By investing in the growth and development of its educators, AUHSD ensures a collaborative and inspiring learning environment for students.

In the Star Wars universe. whenever a spacecraft makes the jump to light speed, the stars outside the cockpit stretch out into luminous streaks. It's a mesmerizing visual of acceleration that brings to mind the dizzying advancement of technology here on planet Earth and the urgent need for educational systems to keep pace.

With artificial intelligence poised to reshape workplaces and society at large, the Orange County Department of Education is moving ahead with an ambitious initiative that will evaluate and determine the best approaches for integrating AI into teaching and learning. This could include more personalized learning, real-time feedback for students and teachers, or the automation of routine tasks, allowing educators to focus more on matters that demand human insight, judgment and creative thinking.

While the outcomes have yet to be determined, we do know this won't be a solitary endeavor. Led by our Educational Services division, OCDE is taking the first steps of a collaborative journey that will involve school district leaders, industry partners, educators, parents and students. And we envision it taking place in three distinct phases.

The first phase will seek to elevate AI literacy and leadership, establishing a common understanding and terminology in Orange County. The second phase will develop strategies and an implementation plan in collaboration with leaders of the county's 28 independent school districts. Finally, a third phase will evaluate our efforts, gather data and plan for the future. OCDE's


commitment to continuous improvement and community engagement ensures that the feedback loop will remain open, fostering a culture of learning and adaptability.

OCDE has long sought to stay ahead of the curve when it comes to emerging technologies, but AI represents something we haven't quite seen before. These newer tools simulate human intelligence, enabling computers to perform tasks that typically require human cognitive abilities. As such, they have the potential to impact just about every aspect of our work and lives, from teaching and learning to health care, transportation, media, energy, finance and customer service.

While ChatGPT and other publicly available services aren't perfect, remember that they are programmed to learn from us, which means they can and will evolve exponentially. In other words, the examples we see today are the worst versions we're going to encounter moving forward.

Preparing students for an AI-driven future isn't just about passing along technical skills. It's about teaching adaptability, critical thinking and ethical decision-making. By integrating AI literacy across educational settings, OCDE and our partners will be able to equip students with the capacity to navigate an increasingly complex world without losing those traits that make us uniquely human, like kindness, character and artistic expression. And through community engagement, we can pursue a shared vision for AI that aligns with our local values and needs.

The need for education to remain in stride with technology is undeniable, and the Orange County Department of Education has long been a leader in this arena. But collaboration is the key to what lies ahead. That's how we'll ensure that the next generation isn't just ready to embrace the challenges of an AI-driven world, but that they're poised to drive innovation, forge new paths and contribute meaningfully to a future that's constantly in motion.

#### **Re-Engaging At-Promise Students**

Gilbert High School is excited to be starting the Gilbert Deeper Learning Lab this year! The Gilbert Deeper Learning lab is built on the philosophy of doing whatever it takes to help our students be successful. All students in the Deeper Learning Lab will receive a personalized academic program that includes both social emotional and academic goals. These goals will be given in

a SMART goal format and co-developed with students and families. Part of the Deeper Learning Lab's goal is to help students find their voice and purpose.





Weekly social emotional lessons and workshops will be conducted with students and facilitated by teachers, social workers, and outside partners. We will utilize restorative justice circles, SEL lessons, and Mindfulness practices with each student. The students will also participate in and be invited to take full advantage of the AUHSD College and Career Readiness Framework.

Each student in this program will learn the importance and value of their own language, and their community's language and cultural heritage. The students will also take introduction to Spanish as an elective class, and be encouraged to complete the seal of biliteracy, especially if they have a strong home language.

#### **Workforce Preparedness Standard**

In anticipation of the 2023–24 school year, the AIME Program Team has been busy behind the scenes preparing for a very active year of career mentoring and internship experiences for AUHSD students. In fact, our team has been so busy that we are excited to announce that we have added a new member, Julieanne Reall, our career readiness and work-based learning coordinator. Ms. Reall

joins the AIME Team with 20 years of experience as a career technical education (CTE) teacher at Anaheim High School, where she aligned classroom learning to the needs of the workforce and life preparedness. She is joining our team straight from the classroom with real-time student engagement, and with her vast CTE industry knowledge and connections, our team cannot wait for the impact she'll have in directly supporting the AIME Program.

With a full team, AIME event's calendar for fall 2023 is quickly filling with a variety of career-mentoring experiences for students. We have Anaheim Public Utilities providing their annual career-mentoring series focused on exploring careers in engineering, sustainability and utilities conservation. This year, we'll have 40 students from Katella and Magnolia high schools coming together to participate in a four-session series led by Anaheim Public Utilities professionals. A highlight of this event series is

always the student presentations, where students deliver an overview of their experience and its impact on their college and career aspirations post-high school.

A few other exciting highlights from AIME's fall lineup included a three-part career-mentoring event series with long-standing AIME partner, Kaiser Permanente, where Kaiser Permanente professionals from a variety of medicalrelated careers will mentor 75 students from our Patient Care and Public Health Career Pathways at Magnolia, Savanna and Western high schools. We also have JPMorgan Chase returning for a second year to provide a three-part career mentoring event series for all our high schools at their Anaheim Chase Bank branch. During the mentoring sessions, financial-services professionals will guide participating students through the banking and finance industry from both the consumer and industry professional perspective.

This snapshot of the AIME calendar is a sneak peek into the direct impact AIME is having in the lives of AUHSD students. Through career exploration and purposeful engagements with industry professionals, students are better prepared to make decisions about college and careers, and they demonstrate greater confidence in entering the world of work.

In the AUHSD, we believe Arts Education, which includes music, theater, dance, and visual and media arts, is an essential part of a comprehensive education for all students to prepare them for college, career, and life. Sequential, standards-based arts learning promotes critical thinking and problemsolving skills, supports overall academic achievement, and nurtures skills that help all students succeed in school and in life.

Currently, more than 13,000 of our

27,000 AUHSD students participate in arts education and are served by 93 arts teachers at our 20 campuses. Our students and teachers have been recognized across Orange County and the state of California for their outstanding work. Some recent highlights include:

- Anaheim HS Performing Arts Conservatory (APAC), taught by Sharon King, received 20 county awards and two scholarships for their 2022 musical theater production of "Once On This Island."
- The Savanna HS marching band made their 20th consecutive appearance in the Southern California

- School Band & Orchestra Association (SCSBOA) Field Championships in 2022.
- Choir students from both Anaheim HS and Magnolia HS were selected for the 2022 Southern California Vocal Association (SCVA) Honor Choir.
- Band students from both Kennedy HS and Anaheim HS performed in the 2023 Rose Parade as members of the Tournament of Roses Honor Band.
- The Loara HS band became one of the first high school bands to perform onstage at Henry and Renee Segerstrom Concert Hall in the Spring of 2023.
- 2 students from Oxford Academy and Sycamore JHS were selected to the 2023 All-Southern California Junior High School Band and Orchestra and one of them, Robert Gordon, was selected for the 2023 All-State Junior High Honor Band on trombone.
- · Lexington JHS art teacher Eve Sullivan was named the 2023 Outstanding Orange County Secondary Visual Art Educator.
- Katella HS Photography teacher Angela Stecher received the Exemplary Programs award from the California Art Educators Association.

#### **Finding Voice and Purpose**

"What do you want to be when you grow up?" In AUHSD, we provide several tools to help students figure out their next steps after graduation. Our work is guided by the Career Preparedness Systems Framework, focused on three pillars: Youth Voice and Purpose, 21st Century Skills and Technical Skills. This framework helps our students develop college and career plans driven by a sense of purpose as well as the skills to achieve their dreams.

So, how do students find their voice and purpose? One of the best ways is by participating in the AIME program, which provides career-exploration opportunities exclusively for AUHSD students. Students can participate in one-day field trips to businesses, multiday mentoring series and internships. To learn more about the AIME program, visit anaheimmentoring.org.

In addition, AUHSD provides online career-exploration resources. For example, all students complete a strengths assessment on the Thrively platform, which provides insight into their unique strengths and which can inform career choices. The platform includes additional career resources, including day-in-the-life videos from professionals. Our customized Roadtrip Nation Community hub provides career guidance as well, found at roadtripnation.com/community/auhsd.

Students can also explore potential careers through their classroom work, including participating in CTE pathways and considering the projects they include in their capstone portfolios. These projects can provide students with clues to professions they may want to explore and can help determine whether they enjoy leading others, writing, design work, presenting or other aspects of their projects.

We hope each student graduates with a strong sense of voice and purpose to guide their college and career journeys. We cannot wait to see what the future holds for our graduates and the positive difference they will make in the world!

#### Seal of Biliteracy and **Pathways to Biliteracy 2023**

The advantages of biliteracy and plurilingualism are many: 1) more competitive for college admission, scholarships and career opportunities, 2) greater financial-earning power, 3) ease to communicate when traveling, 4) keeps generations of families connected and 5) greater cognitive ability and neuroplasticity.

In May 2023 Anaheim Union High School District recognized 1,183 scholars for earning Seal of Biliteracy medals in sixteen languages and 1,312 junior high school scholars for earning the District Pathways to Biliteracy Award (medals) and the new California Department of Education Pathways to Biliteracy Award (certificates). Thanks to our scholars, staff and families' diligent work, Seal of Biliteracy awards were earned in the following languages: Arabic, American Sign Language, Farsi, French, Gujarati, Hindi, Japanese, Korean, Malayaman, Mandarin, Portuguese, Sinhala, Spanish, Tagalog, Tamil, and Vietnamese. One hundred students earned triliteracy awards, earning the Seal of Biliteracy/Triliteracy in three languages.

#### The Link Crew Program is Back!

Katella High School has re-established and upgraded their Link Crew Program. Link Crew is a high school transition program that works to increase attendance, decrease discipline referrals, and improve academic performance in schools. The program's purpose is to make schools a safe and connected place for our children to learn. The Boomerang Project established a Link

Crew program at Lawndale High School in 2013. Today, Link Crew operates at 3,705 schools in 47 U.S. states.

At Katella, with the help of veteran staff members, our incoming juniors and seniors were interviewed to become "Link Leaders" at the end of last school year. These leaders have since attended over 10 hours of training. The goals of the program include empowering juniors and seniors as role models, teaching leadership and initiative, exposing students to a variety of positive influences on campus, and increasing academic success campus-wide.

On August 4, 2023, Katella's Link Crew hosted a Freshman Orientation event on campus for all of the incoming freshmen. Here the students were able to meet and build connections with their own classmates, as well as learn who their Link Crew leaders would be for the duration of their freshman year.

One current Link Crew leader, Daisy Silva, described her experience by noting that "the incoming ninth-graders were nervous at first, but they got more comfortable as they went through the various activities. The best part was that they started to get to know each other."

Katella's Link Crew program will be led this year by English teacher and ASB Assistant Director Michelle Duncan, alongside science teacher and ASB Director Scott Wilmoth. Mrs. Duncan's vision for the program is to ensure that all of our freshmen can find connection and success at Katella. Duncan noted, "This program gives us the structure and foundation to create and maintain a positive school culture, and I look forward to being part of this program's comeback."




about a sprite fairy appearance, he and his bodyguard, Butler,travel to find *The Fairy*
