There is much to celebrate in the Centralia Elementary School District! We are thrilled to announce that 100% of our schools have received PBIS Awards from the California

PBIS Coalition. Dysinger School has earned a Gold Level Award, and Buena Terra, Centralia, Danbrook, Los Coyotes, Miller, San Marino, and Raymond Temple schools have achieved the Platinum Level Award, the highest honor. These awards signify our commitment to clear behavior expectations and safe, engaging environments for our

students. Congratulations to all eight of our schools! It is incredible and we could not be prouder.

In more exciting news, our District has successfully launched new visual and performing arts programs, led by credentialed teachers. Last year, each of our schools selected a focus area in the arts, either being taught in music or visual arts and dance. Thanks to the support of California voters and our Board of Education, we have invested in top-notch arts programs for pre-K through 6th-grade students. This is just the beginning for us, and we cannot wait to see the creativity that is fostered in our students as they continue their education journey here in the Centralia Elementary School District.

Another pride point for us is our Innovation Program, hosted in our innovation labs, engaging our students in what we call future-ready work. This means our students focus on skills like problem-solving, communication and critical thinking. Every week our students are presented with a problem to solve. And depending on their grade level, students engage with various technological tools to solve real-world problems, sparking interest in

potential careers like mechanical engineering, biomechanics and the sciences. Thanks to our modern innovation labs and dedicated Information Access Coordinators, our students are well-prepared for the future.

Lastly, we encourage parents to prioritize regular school attendance. I am often asked what parents can do to support their children to learn and achieve

at school. The simplest answer is to ensure that your children attend school. Teachers invest time and effort into preparing engaging lessons and consistent attendance ensures students benefit from their instruction. If a student is not in school, they miss that exceptional first instruction delivered by a teacher. There may be a catch up the next day or two, but it is simply not the same. We know from the pandemic that students benefit from having experienced knowledgeable teachers in their classroom. Parents may not be aware that students in California who miss 18 days or more of school are identified as chronically absent by the state. There is a wealth of research to support this. but I prefer to keep things simple. I have 10 fingers. When it comes to addressing absences, I would say to aim for students to miss no more than 10 days. It is crucial to track and monitor this as it ensures that children get the benefit of that first planned instruction from our exceptional teachers. I really appreciate our parents' collaboration with us in this effort. Let us continue to have a wonderful year to look for more success stories in our district. Because together, we can do anything!



A Helicopter Parent



In the Star Wars universe, whenever a spacecraft makes the jump to light speed, the stars outside the cockpit stretch out into luminous streaks. It's a mesmerizing visual of acceleration that brings to mind the dizzying

advancement of technology here on planet Earth — and the urgent need for educational systems to keep pace.

With artificial intelligence poised to reshape workplaces and society at large, the Orange County Department of Education is moving ahead with an ambitious initiative that will evaluate and determine the best approaches for integrating AI into teaching and learning. This could include more personalized learning, realtime feedback for students and teachers, or the automation of routine tasks, allowing educators to focus more on matters that demand human insight, judgment and creative thinking.

While the outcomes have yet to be determined, we do know this won't be a solitary endeavor. Led by our Educational Services division, OCDE is taking the first steps of a collaborative journey that will involve school district leaders, industry partners, educators, parents and students. And we envision it taking place in three distinct phases.

The first phase will seek to elevate AI literacy and leadership, establishing a common understanding and terminology in Orange County. The second phase will develop strategies and an implementation plan in collaboration with leaders of the county's 28 independent school districts. Finally, a third phase will evaluate our efforts, gather data and plan for the future.

OCDE's commitment to continuous improvement and community engagement ensures that the feedback loop will remain open, fostering a culture of learning and adaptability.

OCDE has long sought to stay ahead of the curve when it comes to emerging technologies, but AI represents something we haven't quite seen before. These newer tools simulate human intelligence, enabling computers to perform tasks that typically require human cognitive abilities. As such, they have the potential to impact just about every aspect of our work and lives, from teaching and learning to health care, transportation, media, energy, finance and customer service.

While ChatGPT and other publicly available services aren't perfect, remember that they are programmed to learn from us, which means they can and will evolve exponentially. In other words, the examples we see today are the worst versions we're going to encounter moving forward.

Preparing students for an AI-driven future isn't just about passing along technical skills. It's about teaching adaptability, critical thinking and ethical decision-making. By integrating AI literacy across educational settings, OCDE and our partners will be able to equip students with the capacity to navigate an increasingly complex world without losing those traits that make us uniquely human, like kindness, character and artistic expression. And through community engagement, we can pursue a shared vision for AI that aligns with our local values and needs.

The need for education to remain in stride with technology is undeniable, and the Orange County Department of Education has long been a leader in this arena. But collaboration is the key to what lies ahead. That's how we'll ensure that the next generation isn't just ready to embrace the challenges of an AI-driven world, but that they're poised to drive innovation, forge new paths and contribute meaningfully to a future that's constantly in motion.
