#### Monrovia Schools Off to a Fantastic Start for 2023-24

We were thrilled to welcome our students back to school for the 2023-24 school year on August 16th! Since then, it's been a fantastic start to the year, and I'm excited to share how our students will grow over the coming months. Below are some key updates I thought you would like to know more about for 2023-24.

Our five elementary and two middle schools received recognition from the

California Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) Coalition for implementing PBIS. PBIS is a set of ideas and tools schools use to improve behavior. This recognition exemplifies Monrovia Unified School District's newly developed Strategic Plan at work. Implementing PBIS is just one way our schools address the Supportive, Inclusive, and Student-Centered School Cultures focus area and its goal of ensuring that all students belong to a school community built upon positive, supportive, and caring relationships.

We're excited to share that Monrovia High School has secured a place in the respected *U.S. News & World Report's* 2023-2024 Best High Schools list. MHS ranked 2,757 out of 25,000 high schools, putting the Wildcats in the nation's top 12% of high schools. This outstanding ranking highlights the dedication of our students, families, staff, and the entire Monrovia community. Thank you for your ongoing support for our schools as we prepare our graduates for college, career, and life in Monrovia!

Monrovia Unified has also created partnerships with outstanding local organizations to help provide free medical services to our students. Vision to Learn (VTL) returned to our schools to give 1,266 vision screenings to students across Bradoaks, Wild Rose, and Santa Fe. Based on the screenings, 300 kids got eye exams, and VTL staff estimates that approximately 200 students will get a pair of glasses at no cost in September.

The other partnership is with Western University of Health Sciences. Their dental students visited CELC to conduct free dental exams for our Cubs. Over the coming weeks and months, Western University will provide these free exams to students in grades TK, K, and 3!

These collaborations reinforce our dedication to Engaged Parents, Families, and Community, as outlined in our Strategic Plan, and embody a powerful commitment to our students' well-being.

Finally, we've gone through several back-to-school nights at our school sites! Each site opened up its doors to welcome new and returning families. These community events allow parents to meet their student's teachers and better understand how each class will go. Seeing our classrooms full of families at our schools was a joy.

We look forward to sharing this school year's growth and accomplishments. Thank you for being part of the Monrovia Unified School District community. Here's to a fantastic year!

#### **Variety of Goals**

Monrovia Adult School's 2023–24 school year is off to a great start! We began our program year on July 31 with a full cohort of nursing assistant students studying to provide care to seniors and patients in hospitals and long-term-care facilities.

Since August, our Pharmacy Technician, Medical Assisting and Construction programs have begun. We are proud to

be partnering with Habitat for Humanity to give our construction students hands-on experience while providing much-needed housing to families in our community.

We are very excited about our Medi-Cal Peer Support Specialist Training Program starting at the end of September. This class trains students with real-life experience to work with individuals struggling with mental health, substance abuse and psychological trauma. We are currently the only public adult school in the area to offer this training.

Monrovia Adult School's English as a second language classes are filling quickly, once again approaching our prepandemic numbers. Our ESL program serves a diverse student body representing over 20 countries and speaking

over 16 different languages. In addition to our classes in English and civics, we offer our English-language learners special classes in conversation practice, vocational English and citizenship to assist students as they assimilate into the community and the workplace and become United States citizens.

Through collaboration with the Employment Development Department (EDD), Monrovia Adult School hosts quarterly job fairs for current and former students as well as the public at large. The job fair in July attracted over 100 job seekers and over 20 Monrovia businesses. MCAS is hosting another EDD job fair on Oct. 18 from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

MCAS also facilitates job fairs geared toward those looking for employment specifically in the medical field. Monrovia Adult School works with several community partners to determine workforce needs for local businesses and medical facilities and to provide our program graduates with access to employment opportunities.

Monrovia Community Adult School offers a variety of educational programs that empower students from diverse backgrounds to gain life-sustaining employment, transition to further education, and achieve their personal learning goals. Please come by and see how we can meet your educational goals.

#### **Our Cougar Scholar Assemblies**

When young people feel a strong sense of belonging at school, they are much more likely to show persistence, admit when they are confused and ask for help, and share their creative ideas to others.

Santa Fe's first three days of school were launched with a strong emphasis on community building. Centered around what Santa Fe calls "Cougar Coaching" groups, the

entire school was divided into small groups that focused on team building, spirit competitions, and a deep dive into the Cougar Code of responsibility, respect, and involvement.

To launch the year, our Cougar Coaching teams spent time getting to know each other and building trust. Name games, community circles, and team-building activities broke the ice and helped our children and staff bond early on. With circle norms and get-to-know-you dialogue, our small groups began to build trust and a sense of belonging very quickly.

Each group then spent time unpacking the Cougar Code and discussing its importance, as well as what it looks and sounds like to live by. Respect, for example, a broad and general concept, was broken down into three components: empathy, kindness, and self control.

Each team then illustrated how the Cougar Code should look and sound like in a specific area of campus. The result was a detailed collection of slide decks and posters about how our community should interact throughout the school. During our weekly morning virtual assemblies these illustrations are highlighted as a reminder of our agreements on campus.

The scholars' favorite part of those three days was diving into school spirit. Cougar Coaching groups developed an identity complete with team names, chants, posters, decorated doors, and colors. Every classroom door at the school was proudly dressed up with the name and logo of each group. As a grand finale to the week, gradelevel spirit assemblies showcased the spirit of each team, and one winning team was chosen to take the trophy for the month.

After the fun and energy, our scholars had a chance to look back on their first week of school, take a sense-ofbelonging survey, and share their thoughts. After reflecting on her first few days, eighth-grade scholar Cora shared, "The best thing about school so far is Cougar Coaching with Mrs. Sparks."

Our Santa Fe scholars and team members will lean into the communities they have built to lay a strong foundation for the future. There's powerful learning ahead.
