we've been excited to welcome students back to school!

As we continue our focus on academic excellence for our students, we will enhance our concentration on the implementation of our English Language Arts/English Language Development and Mathematics programs, ensuring the needs of all of our students, and especially our second language learners, are met. Working to ensure students have foundational skills upon which to build is a priority for the 2023-24 school year. A combination of a rich, well-rounded curriculum, highly qualified and caring staff and a long-standing commitment to excellence is ensuring that we prepare our students to meet the demands of an ever-changing global society and help to shape the workforce of tomorrow.

We're excited to move into the second year with our new science curriculum. The launch of our all-new W.I.N.G.S. Program in 2022-23 was a tremendous success, providing an opportunity for nearly 600 students across the District a safe, engaging, and fun environment for extending their learning and participating in activities they may not have otherwise experienced. The level of student engagement was

overwhelming as W.I.N.G.S. staff helped to connect children's in-class learning to after school activities in which they gained new skills, participated in a myriad of sports and relevant activities, completed homework assignments, and built lasting friendships and bonds. We're grateful that we've been approved to provide the supper program to our W.I.N.G.S. students, ensuring their nutritional needs are met. Through these experiences, we are further ensuring our students are prepared with 21st Century skills.

We're thrilled to introduce our all-new Preschool Program that began August 7! The B.R.I.G.H.T. Learners Academy, which stands for Build • Realize • Imagine • Grow • Harvest • Thrive, is structured for two, three, and four-year-old children in both half-day and fullday formats. The program provides children with a balanced early literacy curriculum in which they have an opportunity for independent play, structured learning activities that help build critical thinking skills, selfreliance and confidence and the chance to make new friends while having fun! Research has shown that highquality school readiness programs help support student development and academic achievement by developing pre-academic skills that emphasize literacy and numeracy, while fostering exploration and creativity. The goal of the district is that our youngest children are provided with an introduction to the structure and support a school environment provides while preparing them for success in Transitional Kindergarten and beyond.

Because student and staff safety are paramount, we're continually assessing the safety and security needs of our campuses and are proud of the systems we have in place. We have consistently undertaken measures to ensure the safety of our schools in the past and will continue to do so. Furthering our commitment to student and staff safety, additional cameras were added in a variety of areas throughout the District. While the cameras provide the ability for monitoring on an as-needed basis, there is no audio recording. We will continue with the implementation of programs to provide staff with immediate, real-time access to all the information and tools they need to

help ensure the safety of students and staff in an emergency situation. We're extremely grateful that we've been able to complete much-needed enhancements that will provide students and staff with safe, secure facilities to meet the demands of 21st Century learning. These projects and more will impact our children's education and our community for generations to come.

As important as the physical safety and security of our campuses is, the social-emotional security our students need is critically important. We are continuing with the implementation of our social-emotional curriculum, that was first piloted at our Title I schools and endorsed by teachers for District-wide implementation. Through these lessons, students are learning to cultivate a growth mindset, recognize emotions, develop empathy toward others and practice problem-solving skills. Knowing that when our staff thrive, our students thrive, the Social Emotional Learning Task Force has met over the summer to redesign the implementation of the adult version of the curriculum as we continue to support staff in this essential area. Our partnership with Care Solace will continue to provide an additional layer of care for our staff, students, parents, and community to connect with mental health

care providers
and substance use
treatment centers

Knowing that

children thrive academically when they their social and emotional needs are met, we've partnered with the Orange County Health Care Agency and the Orange County Department of Education to help meet these needs. Each school continues to embrace Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) implementation, ensuring positive behaviors throughout the campus. With the support of the Orange County Health Care Agency, we will offer access to personalized teletherapy where mental health providers will deliver evidence-based, goal-oriented care to students. Realizing the importance of providing health professionals on our school campuses, we have expanded both our nursing and counseling staff on school campuses and in our W.I.N.G.S. program for the 2023-24 school year.

In the Star Wars universe, whenever a spacecraft makes the jump to light speed, the stars outside the cockpit stretch out into luminous streaks. It's a mesmerizing visual of acceleration that brings to mind the dizzying advancement of technology here on planet Earth — and the urgent need for educational systems to keep pace.

With artificial intelligence poised to reshape workplaces and society at large, the Orange County Department of Education is moving ahead with an ambitious initiative that will evaluate and determine the best approaches for integrating AI into teaching and learning. This could include more personalized learning, real-time feedback for students and teachers, or the automation of routine tasks, allowing educators to focus more on matters that demand human insight, judgment and creative thinking.

While the outcomes have yet to be determined, we do know this won't be a solitary endeavor. Led by our Educational Services division, OCDE is taking the first steps of a collaborative journey that will involve school district leaders, industry partners, educators, parents and students. And we envision it taking place in three distinct phases.

The first phase will seek to elevate AI literacy and leadership, establishing a common understanding and terminology in Orange County. The second phase will develop strategies and an implementation plan in collaboration with leaders of the county's 28 independent school districts. Finally, a third phase will evaluate our efforts, gather data and plan for the future. OCDE's commitment to continuous improvement and community engagement ensures that the feedback loop will remain open, fostering a culture of learning and adaptability.

OCDE has long sought to stay ahead of the curve when it comes to emerging technologies, but AI represents something we haven't quite seen before. These newer tools simulate human intelligence, enabling computers to perform tasks that typically require human cognitive abilities. As such, they have the potential to impact just about every aspect of our work and lives, from teaching and learning to health care, transportation, media, energy, finance and customer service.


While ChatGPT and other publicly available services aren't perfect, remember that they are programmed to learn from us, which means they can and will evolve exponentially. In other words, the examples we see today are the worst versions we're going to encounter moving forward.

Preparing students for an AI-driven future isn't just

about passing along technical skills. It's about teaching adaptability, critical thinking and ethical decision-making. By integrating AI literacy across educational settings, OCDE and our partners will be able to equip students with the capacity to navigate an increasingly complex world without losing those traits that make us uniquely human, like kindness, character and artistic expression. And through community engagement, we can pursue a shared vision for AI that aligns with our local values and needs.

The need for education to remain in stride with technology is undeniable, and the Orange County Department of Education has long been a leader in this arena. But collaboration is the key to what lies ahead. That's how we'll ensure that the next generation isn't just ready to embrace the challenges of an AI-driven world, but that they're poised to drive innovation, forge new paths and contribute meaningfully to a future that's constantly in motion.



#### **Building Community Involvement**



## Working Together to Strengthen Our P.B.I.S. Community

At Holder, the staff is working together to revisit and strengthen our existing Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS) practices. The goal being to build on an already strong PBIS foundation to create the best possible learning/working environment for the Holder students and staff.

During the first week of school the PBIS team, with the help and support of teachers and classified staff members on campus, conducted PBIS rotations. As the students rotated from location to location, they were explicitly taught the expectations in each area--whether that be the classroom, the lunch area or the playground. Students had the opportunity to ask questions and clarify any misunderstanding. As a result, every student and staff member can articulate the expectations and how to be successful in any given location.

A part of our PBIS plan is looking for ways in which students can help other students while on campus. A great example of this is having our upper grade students help guide and mentor our Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten students. The upper grade students have the opportunity to demonstrate what it means to be a part of the Holder Community and our younger students have the opportunity to meet new friends on campus and feel a sense of community at their new school.

It is our belief that when staff and students have common expectations and we are all working together to create a safe, healthy environment, it sets the stage for everyone to be successful and ensures that our students are meeting their true Holder Hawk potential.

> as facilitate social-emotional groups that cover different topics. This year our two counselors will be split between primary and upper grade. Mrs. Ham, our primary grade counselor, will also lead topics such as Friendship Skills Groups or Self-Concept groups with primary students. Mrs. Patel, our upper grade counselor, will lead topics such as Social Skills, Developing Friendships and Spreading Kindness with groups of upper grade students.

### BRIGHT Learners Academy Welcomes 2 and 3 Year Old Preschoolers!

It has been an exciting first month at Bright Learners Academy in the Savanna School District! Preschool children have been eager to learn and make new friends. Our early education team has been focusing on establishing nurturing relationships with the children. Teachers are focusing on social emotional skills such as social and self-awareness, relationship building and

learning to share. During small group activities, teachers observe each child to assess children's interests in order to develop curriculum plans that are engaging to all children and build on the skills that children have already mastered.



Early education teachers are also focusing on classroom rules, problem solving and conflict resolution to set a solid foundation for the school year and the children's upcoming primary years. A consistent daily routine creates a safe and predictable environment for young children. Teachers are focusing on children learning the different parts of the daily routine such as handwashing before and after meals, morning circle time, small group activity time, sharing, clean up time and outdoor play.


