GGUSD Staff and Students are Goal-Getters

We kicked off the 2023-2024 school year with a renewed commitment to our district's three goals of equipping all students with the academic skills (Goal 1) and the personal skills (Goal 2) for lifelong success (Goal 3). Those goals inspire and impact the work we do on a daily basis, and are evident in our accomplishments.

Goal 1: Our amazing teachers and instructional staff do an exceptional job providing rigorous curriculum and instruction that leads to academic growth. Our preliminary SBAC scores show that GGUSD students made gains over last year in both ELA and Math and we're confident that GGUSD scores will continue to exceed the state and county average! Our English Learner scores also reflect similar gains. We continue to invest into classroom support, doubling our number of classroom aides over the last two years and our schools are offering more before and after school extended learning programs than ever before!

Goal 2: In GGUSD, we believe in supporting the whole child, investing resources into students' well-being and ensuring they feel safe and welcome while at school. Last year, we implemented STOPit, an anonymous reporting platform that has allowed us to intervene and help

students who are struggling with personal challenges and mental health concerns. We also provided students in fifth through 12th grade with the opportunity to use Seity Health, a platform that provides daily wellness support. We've also greatly expanded school-based mental health counseling and our schools are implementing important No Place for Hate initiatives.

Goal 3: Finally, each year we celebrate when our high school graduates leave us ready for success in their college and career pathways! We are proud that the Class of 2023 graduated with more than 6,800 college credits earned through dual enrollment opportunities and that over 60% of GGUSD students meet rigorous a-g college entrance requirements for UC/CSU schools. Our robust Career and Technical Education program also prepares students for high-paying 21st century careers by equipping students with workplace skills while they are in high school. Students can choose from exciting Career Pathways like Automotive Technology, Engineering and Product Design, Medical, Hospitality, and more.

GGUSD staff and students are goal-getters and we know that our GGUSD goals are making a profound positive impact in the lives of our students. But we can't do it alone. GGUSD also values the partnership of our families and we work alongside parents to ensure they have the tools to help their child on their own unique path to lifelong success. That's the Garden Grove Way.

Los Alumnos v el Personal del GGUSD **Logran sus Metas**

Iniciamos el año escolar 2023-2024 con un compromiso renovado a las tres metas de nuestro Distrito de preparar a todos los alumnos con las habilidades académicas (Meta 1) y las habilidades personales (Meta 2) para el éxito de por vida (Meta 3). Esas metas inspiran e impactan el trabajo que hacemos diariamente, y son evidentes en nuestros logros.

Meta 1: Nuestros maravillosos maestros y el personal de instrucción hacen un trabajo excepcional al proporcionar un currículo riguroso que conduce al crecimiento académico. ¡Nuestros puntajes preliminares en las Evaluaciones del Consorcio Smarter Balanced (SBAC) muestran que el año pasado los alumnos del GGUSD han progresado tanto en las Artes de Lenguaje en Inglés (ELA) como en Matemáticas y estamos seguros de que los puntajes del GGUSD continuarán superando el promedio del estado y del condado! Los puntajes de nuestros Estudiantes de Inglés también reflejan progresos similares. ¡Continuamos invirtiendo en el apoyo para los salones de clases, duplicando nuestro número de asistentes de maestros en los últimos dos años y nuestras escuelas están ofreciendo como nunca antes, más programas de aprendizaje extendido antes y después del horario regular de clases!

Meta 2: En el GGUSD, creemos en apoyar al niño en su totalidad, invirtiendo recursos para el bienestar de los alumnos y asegurando que ellos se sientan seguros y bienvenidos mientras están en la escuela. El año pasado, implementamos STOPit, una plataforma de informes anónimos que nos ha permitido intervenir y ayudar a los alumnos que están teniendo dificultades con desafíos personales y problemas de salud mental. También les brindamos a los alumnos del 5.º al 12.º grado la oportunidad de utilizar Seity Health, una plataforma que proporciona apoyo de bienestar a diario. También hemos ampliado considerablemente los servicios de consejería de salud mental basada en la escuela y nuestras escuelas están implementando importantes iniciativas de No Hay Lugar para el Odio.



Meta 3: Finalmente, ¡cada año celebramos cuando nuestros graduados de la escuela secundaria nos dejan, listos para el éxito en sus trayectorias universitarias y profesionales! Estamos orgullosos de que la Clase del 2023 se haya graduado con más de 6,800 créditos universitarios que obtuvieron por medio de las oportunidades de cursos de doble inscripción, y que más del 60% de los alumnos del GGUSD cumplen con los rigurosos requisitos a-g para la admisión a los planteles de la Universidad de California (UC) y la Universidad Estatal de California (CSU). Nuestro sólido programa de Educación de Carreras Técnicas también prepara a los alumnos para las carreras profesionales altamente renumeradas del siglo XXI al equiparlos con las habilidades de trabajo mientras están en la escuela secundaria. Los alumnos pueden elegir emocionantes trayectorias profesionales como la tecnología automotriz, ingeniería y diseño de productos, medicina, industria hotelera y más.

Los alumnos y el personal del GGUSD logran sus metas y sabemos que las metas de nuestro GGUSD están causando un impacto positivo y profundo en las vidas de nuestros alumnos. Pero no podemos lograrlo solos. Toàn Thể Nhân Viên Và Học Sinh GGUSD Hướng Đến Mục Tiêu Chung

Khởi đ`âu niên học 2023-2024, chúng ta tiếp tục tái lập ba muc tiêu của học khu với cam kết trang bị cho tất cả học sinh năng lực học tập (Mục Tiêu 1) và năng lực cá nhân (Mục Tiêu 2) để thành công trên đường đời (Muc Tiêu 3). Những muc tiêu này truy ên cảm hứng, tạo động lực trong công việc hằng ngày và thể hiện rõ qua những thành tích chúng ta đat được.

Muc Tiêu 1: Đôi ngũ giáo viên và nhân viên giảng day tân tuy đảm nhân nhiệm vu mỹ mãn truy en đạt học trình cam go nhằm thúc đẩy các em tiến bô. Điểm SBAC sơ khởi cho thấy học sinh của GGUSD đạt tiến bộ nhi ều hơn năm trước về cả hai môn Anh Văn (ELA) và Toán. Chúng tôi tin chắc rằng GGUSD sẽ tiếp tục vượt mức điểm trung bình của các trường trong tiểu bang và quân hat! Điểm của Học Sinh Trau Gi ồi Anh Ngữ cũng thể hiện sự thăng tiến tương tự. Chúng tôi tiếp tục đầu tư vào việc hỗ trơ lớp học, gia tăng gấp đôi số nhân viên trợ giáo trong hai năm qua, đ'ông thời cung cấp nhi ều chương trình học thêm vào trước và sau giờ học tại các trường hơn bao giờ hết!

Muc Tiêu 2: Tai GGUSD, chúng tôi tin tưởng vào việc giúp trẻ em phát triển toàn diện, tìm kiếm các phương thức hỗ trợ sự an vui của học sinh, đ'ồng thời bảo đảm cho các em cảm thấy an toàn và được tiếp đón khi đến trường. Năm trước chúng tôi đã thực hiện STOPit, n'ên mang báo cáo ẩn danh tạo đi ều kiên cho chúng ta can thiệp và giúp đỡ những em có hoàn cảnh khó

khăn, gặp trở ngại v'è sức khoẻ tâm th'àn. Chúng tôi cũng tạo cơ hội cho học sinh từ lớp 5 đến lớp 12 sử dụng Seity Health, một n'ên mang hỗ trơ sư an vui hằng ngày. Chúng tôi cũng đã mở thêm nhi ều dịch vụ tư vấn sức khỏe tâm th'ân tại trường học, đồng thời thực thi các sáng kiến quan trọng Không Dung Túng cho Sự Thù Ghét.

Mục tiêu 3: Cuối cùng, mỗi năm, học khu chúc mừng các em hc sinh tốt nghiệp trung học, sẵn sàng gặt hái thành công trên bước đường đại học và ngh ềnghiệp của mình! Chúng tôi tự hào vềnhững học sinh tốt nghiệp Khoá 2023 đã đạt trên 6,800 tín chỉ đại học qua các lớp song trình và hơn 60% học sinh GGUSD đáp ứng đi ều kiện v ềcác lớp a-g cam go để được tuyển nhận vào hệ thống đại học UC/ CSU. Chương Trình Giáo Duc Kỹ Thuật Và Hướng Nghiệp đa dang của chúng tôi cũng chuẩn bị cho học sinh ngay khi còn ở bậc trung học với những kỹ năng chuyên môn c'ân thiết cho các ngh'êđược trả lương cao trong thế kỷ 21. Chương Trình Hướng Nghiệp có các lớp dạy ngh'êhữu dụng như Sửa Xe Ô Tô, Kỹ Thuật Công Trình và Hoạ Kiểu Sản Phẩm, Y Tế, Tiếp Tân và nhi ều hơn nữa.

Toàn thể nhân viên và học sinh GGUSD cùng nỗ lực đạt mục tiêu và chúng tôi tin chắc rằng những mục tiêu này đang mang lại hiệu quả lớn lao cho đời sống của học sinh. 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Investing in Athletic Facilities

The Board of Education is proud of our awardwinning athletic programs and has made significant financial investments to modernize and upgrade athletic facilities across our seven comprehensive high schools to benefit GGUSD athletes now and for generations to come.

In 2017, GGUSD opened the Michael A. Monsoor Memorial Athletic Stadium and in 2019, a second stateof-the-art athletic stadium was opened at Bolsa Grande High School. Both stadiums have hosted countless GGUSD victories and were funded by Measure P which received 76.3% approval from voters in 2016.

In addition to our wonderful stadiums which are used by all high schools, GGUSD installed permanent field lighting, LED scoreboards, and new baseball and softball dugouts at all schools. Tennis courts were resurfaced and fields were irrigated for optimal play.

As part of the seismic campus renovations at La Quinta and Pacifica High School, those campuses received brand new classroom buildings, cafeterias performing arts centers, as well as gymnasiums and CIF regulation swimming pools.

Finally, we begin the 2023-2024 school year with 3 new state-of-the-art all-weather synthetic turf track and fields at Los Amigos, Rancho Alamitos and Santiago High Schools. Over the summer, we invited local leaders, students, staff and families to ribbon cutting ceremonies to celebrate their new track and fields and the start of an exciting athletic season.

In GGUSD, we know that our athletic programs have a positive impact on students, shaping character skills like leadership, teamwork, time management and goalsetting. Our modernized athletic facilities enhance our campuses and have a positive impact on our entire school communities!

Invirtiendo en las Instalaciones Deportivas

La Mesa Directiva de Educación está orgullosa de nuestros galardonados programas deportivos y ha llevado a cabo importantes inversiones financieras para modernizar y mejorar las instalaciones deportivas en nuestras siete escuelas secundarias integrales para beneficiar actualmente a los deportistas del GGUSD y a las futuras generaciones por venir.

En el año 2017, el GGUSD inauguró el Estadio Deportivo Conmemorativo Michael A. Monsoor y en el 2019, inauguró un segundo estadio deportivo moderno en la Escuela Secundaria Bolsa Grande. Ambos estadios han sido sede de innumerables victorias del GGUSD y fueron financiados por la Medida P, la cual recibió la aprobación del 76.3% de los votantes en el año 2016.

Además de nuestros maravillosos estadios los cuales son utilizado por todas las escuelas secundarias, el GGUSD instaló iluminación permanente en los campos de juego, marcadores LED y banquillos para béisbol y sóftbol en todas las escuelas. Las canchas de tenis fueron revestidas con pavimento y los campos de juego fueron irrigados para brindar un juego óptimo.

Como parte de las renovaciones antisísmicas en las escuelas secundarias La Quinta y Pacífica, esos planteles escolares recibieron nuevos edificios con salones de clases, cafeterías, centros de artes visuales y escénicas, así como gimnasios y piscinas reguladas por la Federación Interescolar de California (CIF).

Finalmente, comenzamos el año escolar 2023-2024 con 3 nuevas y modernas pistas sintéticas y campos de juego con césped artificial para todos los climas, en las escuelas secundarias Los Amigos, Rancho Alamitos y Santiago. Durante el verano, invitamos a líderes locales, alumnos, personal y familias a las ceremonias de corte de listón para celebrar sus nuevas pistas y campos de juego y el comienzo de una emocionante temporada deportiva.

En el GGUSD, sabemos que nuestros programas deportivos tienen un impacto positivo en los alumnos, dándole forma a las habilidades de carácter como el liderazgo, trabajo en equipo, administración del tiempo y establecimiento de metas. ¡Nuestras instalaciones deportivas modernizadas mejoran nuestros planteles escolares y tienen un impacto en todas nuestras comunidades escolares!

Đầu Tư Vào Các Cơ Sở Thể Thao

Hôi Đ'ông Giáo Duc rất hãnh diên v'ệcác chương trình thể thao đạt nhi ều giải thưởng của chúng ta và đã đầu tư khoản tài chính đáng kể để tân trang và nâng cấp các cơ sở thể thao cho bảy trường trung học phổ thông nhằm mang lại lợi ích cho các vận động viên GGUSD hiện nay và cho các thế hệ mai sau.

Vào năm 2017, GGUSD đã khai trương Sân Vân Đông Thể Thao Tưởng Niệm Michael A. Monsoor và vào năm 2019, sân vận động thể thao hiện đại thứ hai đã được khai trương tại Trường Trung Học Cấp II Bolsa Grande. Cả hai sân vận động được tân trang nhờ vào sự tài trợ của Dự Luật P với 76.3% cử tri bầu thuận vào năm 2016 và là nơi đã diễn ra vô số chiến thắng cho GGUSD.

Ngoài các sân vận động tân tiến cho tất cả các trường trung học cấp II sử dụng, GGUSD còn lắp đặt các trụ đèn chiếu sáng, bảng điểm LED, dãy ghế mới cho đội bóng chày và bóng m'êm tại tất cả các trường trung học, tráng lại b'êmặt sân qu'ân vợt và gắn hệ thống tưới hiệu quả cho sân thể thao.

Trong phần dự án trùng tu hệ thống phòng bị địa chấn, Trường Trung Học Cấp II La Quinta và Pacifica đã có được các phòng học hoàn toàn mới, phòng ăn, sân khấu trình diễn, cũng như phòng thể dục và h'ôbơi theo quy định CIF.

Cuối cùng, chúng ta khởi đầu niên học 2023-2024 với 3 sân cỏ nhân tạo mới, hiện đại và phù hợp với mọi thời tiết tại Trường Trung Học Cấp II Los Amigos, Rancho Alamitos và Santiago. Vào mùa hè qua, chúng tôi đã mời các viên chức địa phương, học sinh, nhân viên và gia đình đến dự lễ cắt băng khánh thành sân đi ền kinh mới và mừng sự khởi đ`âu của một mùa thể thao đ`ây hào hứng.

Halloween Safety Tips

As Halloween approaches, it's soon to be one of the most magical times of the year. Children eagerly anticipate indulging in sugary treats while parents grapple with managing the candy frenzy. Fortunately, a few helpful tips and tricks can ensure a stress-free Halloween for both kids and parents.

Before heading out to trick-or-treat, eat a light meal or snack rather than going out on an empty stomach to prevent snacking on the candy during door-to-door visits. In addition, it's important to remind kids that they shouldn't eat any candy until their loot can be inspected later.

Inspect wrapped treats for any signs of tampering such as unusual appearance, discoloration, holes, or tears, and throw out anything that looks suspicious. If you have a food allergy, be sure to check labels on all treats, and do not consume any home-baked goods.

Eating large amounts of candy in one day won't harm one's health, but consuming sugar daily can lead to weight gain, high blood pressure, diabetes, or cardiovascular disease. According to the 2020-25 Dietary Guidelines for Americans, children ages 3-17 should have no more than 10% added sugars in their total diet.

After Halloween night, kids may find themselves with a treasure trove of candy. Parents can use this as an opportunity to teach portion control by limiting candy consumption following Halloween. Leftover sweets can be donated to local charities and soldiers overseas through donation drives.

It's important to remember that young children can choke on gum, peanuts, and hard candies so be sure to remove any from goodie bags.

Apart from the food, many children traveling in the dark pose safety concerns. Costumes should be light-colored and easy to see at night. Using flashlights and adding reflective or glow-in-the-dark tape to costumes and treat bags makes kids more visible at night.

Keep electronic devices tucked away. Walk, don't run, and make eye contact with drivers before crossing the street. Also, keep electronic devices put away when crossing the streets, make eye contact with drivers, and avoid staying out too late.

Times and technologies may change, but ensuring students feel a sense of connection at school is just as crucial as ever. Arguably, it's never been more important.


I'm talking specifically about being involved with clubs, sports, music and other activities that not only enhance personal growth but have also been shown to improve students' academic


Now, let me introduce you to two OCDE programs that have a history of engaging students across Orange County: the Academic Decathlon and Pentathlon.


A Helicopter Parent





The Academic Decathlon was established in 1968 as the brainchild of former Orange County Superintendent Dr. Robert Peterson. Students take on 10 challenges, giving speeches, doing interviews, writing essays and answering questions in such subjects as art, economics, literature, math, music and social science. Think of this as a mental Olympics, culminating

with the Super Quiz Relay, an exciting live competition.

For middle school students in grades six, seven and eight, OCDE offers the Academic Pentathlon. This is a five-event competition that focuses on fine arts, literature, math, science and social science, building up to its own Super Quiz Relay.

Both events bring students from different achievement levels together to compete, but it's not just about winning and losing. These are months-long endeavors that are equally about learning, growing and making the kinds of lasting friendships that emerge when students tackle challenges together. This year's decathlon theme is "Technology and Humanity," reflecting one of the most important issues of our time.

Scholarly competitions like the decathlon and pentathlon aren't the only options available. Public school students in Orange County can also connect through campus clubs, sports teams, career exploration programs, student government, community service projects, the performing arts, cultural clubs, peer mentoring, service learning projects and much more. Ultimately, it's about understanding the aptitudes and interests of each student and finding the activities that will most engage and inspire them.

So here's my call to action: As parents and educators, let's envision education beyond the classroom walls. Let's introduce each learner to activities that will help them truly belong to their school. Let's consistently inspire the next generation of leaders, thinkers and achievers to engage in transformative experiences that will enrich their lives and potentially impact their communities.

The connections they forge today will not only shape their current academic achievements but will also lay the foundation for more resilient, fulfilled and empowered individuals in the future.


