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



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


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LLCSD Family Resource Center

The Little Lake City School District is proud to have opened the Family Resource Center (FRC) at the beginning of this school year. The mission of the FRC is to eliminate barriers for all LLCSD students by providing comprehensive services to our most vulnerable populations and advocating for successful transitions, re-engagement, and social emotional awareness with the goal of empowering students to reach their potential and maximize higher educational achievement. The vision of the FRC is to be a support center for students and their families by providing assistance and enhancing the well-being of each individual across the community. The main goals of the FRC are: Remove Barriers, Sustain Stability, Inspire Lifelong Learners.

The FRC offers a variety of no-cost programs, resources, and case management for LLCSD students and families. For McKinney-Vento support, the FRC provides basic needs to students and families living in temporary housing to help remove barriers. For foster youth support, the FRC supports foster youth and caregivers with resources. For case management support, the FRC has bilingual Family Outreach Liaisons that provide case management to families and collaborate with community agencies to provide outside linkages and resources. For mental health support, the FRC meets the socio-emotional needs of students and provide support to families to help their children succeed through a variety of counseling services at LLCSD and referral services.

Additionally, families can pick up clothing, hygiene items, food and other items based on donations. With the collaboration of Giving Children Hope and other community agencies, the FRC provides a weekly food distribution to families that have expressed need. School supplies and backpacks are available on a need basis for students experiencing hardships.

The FRC provides variety of informative, psychoeducational, and interactive workshops throughout the school year to promote parent involvement, family engagement and community awareness. The FRC can also connect parents with career planning and adult education classes such as English as a Second Language, Adult High School Diploma, Career Technical Education, and much more through community colleges.



Welcome Back!

I am excited and proud to start my second year as principal of Cresson Elementary. Prior to joining Cresson, I spent two years at William Orr as a third-grade teacher, seven years at Lake Center as a seventh/eighthgrade science teacher, and five years as the district STEM specialist.

Thanks to Cresson's educational excellence, we earned the California Gold

Ribbon, the Title 1 Academic Achievement Award, the California School Board Golden Bell Award, and just this year, the California PBIS Gold Implementation Award. Cresson earned these awards because of the strong academic and social-emotional support provided to all students. Two Cresson staff members help us provide additional support for students. Our teacher-on-special-assignment, Valerie Velasco, coordinates our academic support. She collaborates with classroom teachers to create instructional groups that provide students with additional

academic support, organizes after-school tutoring, and helps create engaging STEM Saturday School experiences.

Cresson also has a full-time elementary counselor, Martha Robles. Our counselor leads group and individual counseling sessions, facilitates conflict resolution between students, leads our peer-mediator program, and provides SEL instruction to all students. This social-emotional and academic support positively impacts Cresson's state testing scores. In grades three through five, 55% of our students scored, met, or exceeded on the English language arts state assessment. This surpasses both the state average of 46.66% and the county average of 47%. On the state math assessment, 36% of our students scored, met, or exceeded on the state math assessment, which also surpassed the state average of 34.62% and county average of 34.75%.

As the Cresson team continues to provide rigorous academic instruction, intentional academic support, and compassionate social emotional development, we will continue to see students capable of handling social and academic challenges.

Jersey was recognized with the PBIS Silver Award for the third consecutive year. Our PBIS coach, Miss Worcester, has done a fabulous job in leading our PBIS efforts

and encouraging our students to SOAR by showing Safety, Ownership, Achievement, and Respect. We are also fortunate to have our TOSA, Mrs. Godinez, who has led much of the academic and intervention efforts on campus.

Our SBAC scores were recently announced, and I'm proud to share that Jersey was above the county and state averages in ELA and math, with 52 percent for ELA and 39 percent for math. We thank our incredible teachers, interventionists, and instructional assistants for their

hard work in the classroom that has led to this academic success.

Our students' social-emotional well-being is also very important to us. Our school counselor, Mrs. Delgado, has done an amazing job of establishing clubs and programs that encourage our students to become leaders on campus. We had over 40 students apply to be in the Kindness Club, where students help around the campus in various capacities.

I am also proud to share that many of our fourth- and fifth-graders participated in a two-day training with the Whitaker Peace and Development Initiative to become peer mediators to help resolve conflict among students.

We have also voted in our new ASB Cabinet for the 2023-2024 school year, and they have already done a great job of planning student activities. We finally feel that we have a "normal" school year planned, and have many family events scheduled. Many thanks to our PTO.

Welcome back, Leopards! We are excited to kick off another year of learning for all our students. Our great teachers and staff members have spent considerable time in preparing, planning, and creating activities to engage our students in learning. We firmly believe that all students should promote from middle school prepared for the demands of high school and beyond.

The hard work of our students and teachers paid off last year. We are pleased to report that the children did well on the state tests. Our English Learner test results indicate that almost half of them became fluent in English by the time they reached the eighth grade. In addition, our overall English results on the state tests kept pace at the same level as in the past.

Regarding math, this is an area that shows how we need to do something a bit different. While our math scores did increase, we are not satisfied with the results, and have a plan to help our students.

First, we will offer a wide range of after-school tutoring. We also have an additional counselor to further support the emotional needs of our students.

Moreover, our teachers regularly meet with each other to create a plan to address student learning, and they also meet with the principal five times per year to discuss how they support their students. These are a few of the ways in which we provide layers of support at Lake Center Middle School. We are looking forward to a great year!

We have much to celebrate at Orr! First, we were awarded a 2022 CSBA Golden Bell Award

for our exemplary Autism Focus program, which focuses on students' academic, social, and adaptive-living skills. Through its innovation, everyone benefits from our program, not just our Autism Focus students. Having our autism program has positively impacted our entire school culture, allowing us to celebrate diversity and function as one student body with a goal to be successful and caring citizens. We are extremely proud of this recognition, as it validates all the hard work of our teachers and staff to meet the needs of our students.

William Orr also demonstrated success on the 2023 SBAC assessment taken by students in grades three through five. In ELA, 61% of students met or exceeded the standard, which was higher than the district (56%), county (47%), and state (47%). In math, 54% of students met or exceeded the standard, again scoring higher than the district (38%), county (35%), and state (35%). Our English learners also showed success on the state's ELPAC assessment. In grades three through five, 73% of EL students scored in the highest two tiers of English proficiency. Our efforts to provide solid instruction using research-based strategies as well as timely and systematic interventions to those needing additional support are making a difference.

Studebaker has done it again! We have exceeded the state and county with our SBAC

scores. Woo hoo! Our score in ELA was 56%, whereas the state's and county's were 47%. In math, Studebaker scored 46%,

whereas the state's and county's were 35%. Although it's only a third-through-fifth-grade student test, this great achievement is because of all the teachers!

Once we returned to normal after the last three difficult years, all our teachers worked harder than ever to tackle the learning loss. As you can see from our scores, it has been a total success. Studebaker has put in place many interventions that have contributed to our success. Besides our daily RtI intervention, instructional assistants pull out students in order to address any gaps in student learning.



Mrs. Sanchez, our fabulous TOSA, spent her mornings working with fourth- and fifth-grade students for a half-hour daily to provide academic support in math. We also had 13 teachers volunteer for after-school tutoring, which allowed us to provide both ELA and math intervention in all grade levels.

Now—last, but absolutely not least, our students have gone above and beyond to make up for lost time and also push themselves to keep up with new
