Congratulations to 16 Awardees Selected as “Los Angeles County’s Teachers of the Year.”

In September, the Los Angeles County Office of Education honored dozens of educators during the 42nd Annual Teachers of the Year Awards banquet, held at the Universal City Hilton. Sixteen of them were selected as LA County’s Teachers of the Year.

I was excited to be at the event, to thank our teachers for the tremendous job that they do every day, and for the way they support and make sure that our students have access to a quality education.

“The work that you guys do is often thankless, but I know that it’s incredibly rewarding, to see the impact that you have on your students, to watch them grow and learn and to know that you played a role in shaping their lives is truly something special... and so is the People’s Choice Awards for Best Comedy”, said actor Adam Shapiro, who added humor as he addressed the teachers.

“It feels amazing, it’s such an honor to be with colleagues from all around LA County and I’m so thrilled that my principal, my partner teachers and my family could be here to experience this moment with me”, shared Kimberly Min, a teacher at LAUSD who was selected for the prestigious honor.

LACOE’s Teachers of the Year Program is the largest local competition in the state and nation. It is part of the oldest and most prestigious honors contest in the U.S. for public school teachers. The 16 Los Angeles County educators will advance with other county winners from around the state to the California Teachers of the Year competition this fall.

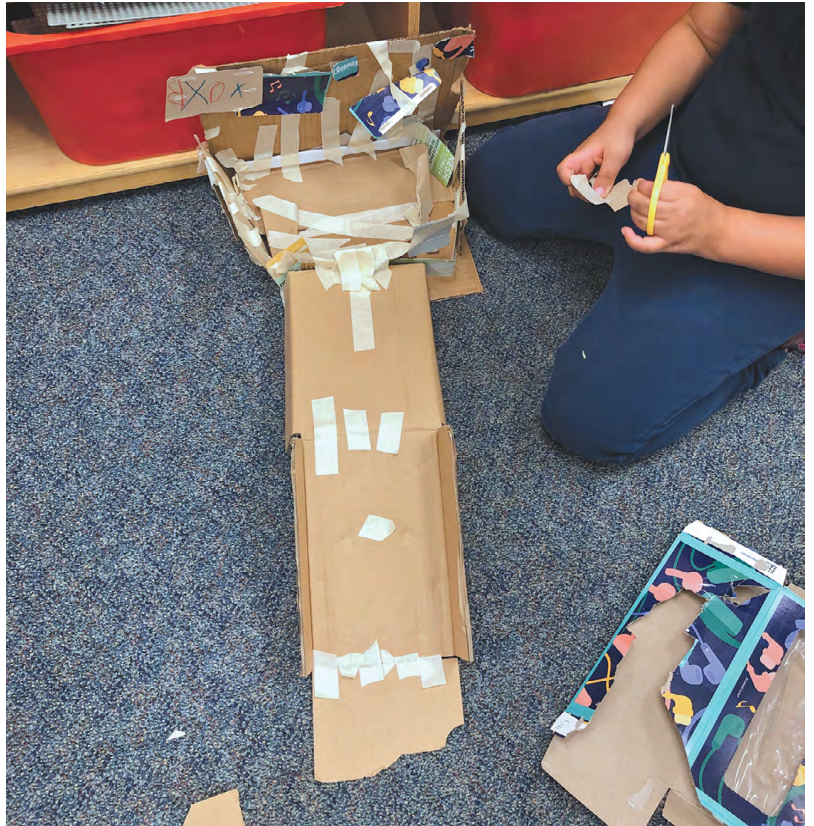
Pumpkin Stoppers

During the month of October, all grades are focusing on the Next Generation Science Standards with creative, hands-on lessons all about pumpkins. Students will have discussed the gravitational force of a pumpkin drop, and questioned if mass is a factor in the speed of something

falling. For example, after reading *The Roll Away Pumpkin* by Julia Wonders, Mrs. Sherman's first grade class designed and tested their own pumpkin stoppers to determine what works best to stop a pumpkin from rolling away. In a culminating event, grade levels will test their hypothesis as our own Monrovia Fire Department firefighters assist with the annual pumpkin drop from their ladder truck.

In early November, Bobcats will once again have the opportunity to participate in November Night Sky with Mr. Traeger. Astronomers and telescopes will be brought in for our young astronomers to view planets and constellations.

Keeping Informed

The Canyon Oaks High School and Mountain Park School's 2023-2024 academic year is well underway!

Our recent Back-to-School night was a huge success, with the high school students and their parents learning about the variety of college and career options that exist for students after they graduate. Canyon Oaks and Mountain Park students

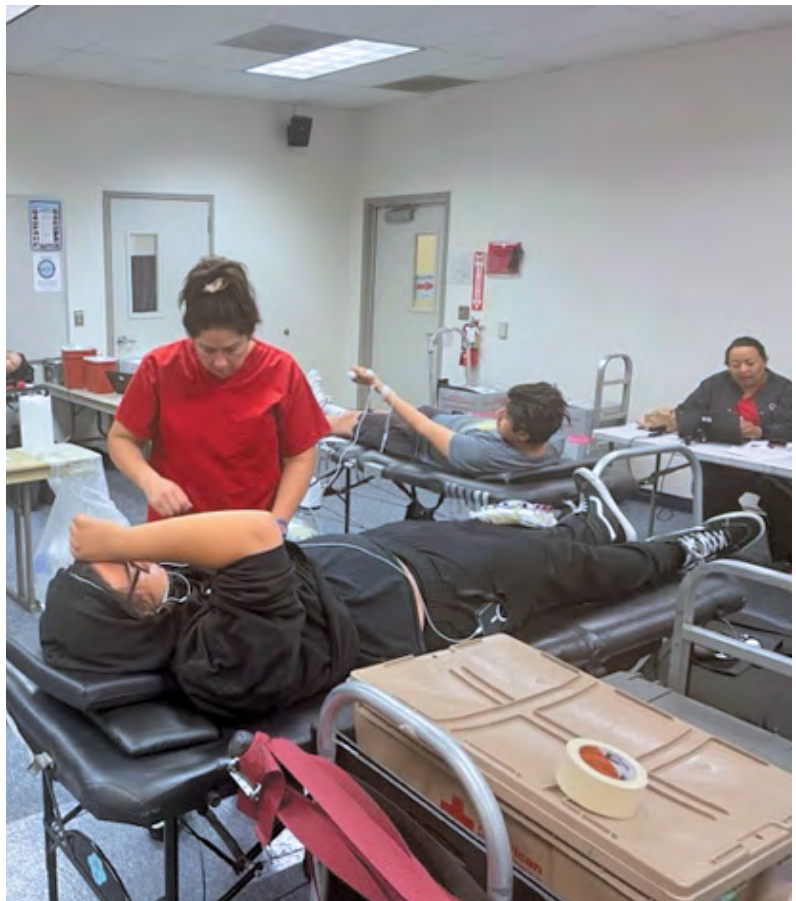
have been accepted into numerous four-year-universities, such as UCLA, UC Berkeley, UC Santa Cruz, USC, Columbia University, NYU, Reed College, Grinnell College, and almost every Cal State.

Additionally, our students and parents have also learned about the many career-training options that exist at Monrovia Community Adult School. This includes nurse assistant, medical assistant, pharmacy technician, and Medi-Cal peer support specialist, just to name a few. Our Canyon and Mountain faculty and staff members are committed to making sure that all of our students are college- and career-ready when they graduate.

Writing is a critical instructional focus for both schools, and our students recently completed the Common Writing Assessment (CWA) to gauge how prepared they are for the standards-based state testing. Our faculty use the Smarter Balance Assessment System rubric to grade the CWA, and then analyze the results to focus on areas of student growth. Also, as both schools are on a block schedule, the first semester ended on Friday, October 20th with the students successfully earning their semester credits, especially those who were credit deficient.

Canyon and Mountain started the second semester of Term 1 on October 23rd. New Mountain students completed their Master Agreement, and new and returning Canyon students participated in Success Day to learn about the dress code, use of personal electronics, attendance, and many other important policies to guarantee student success. Our faculty and staff have high expectations for the students this second semester.

On October 10th, the Red Cross conducted a blood drive on the Monrovia Community Adult School campus, and many Canyon and Mountain students were of service and donated blood. The drive netted nearly 30 units. A big reason for the success was our Canyon and Mountain students' willingness to participate.

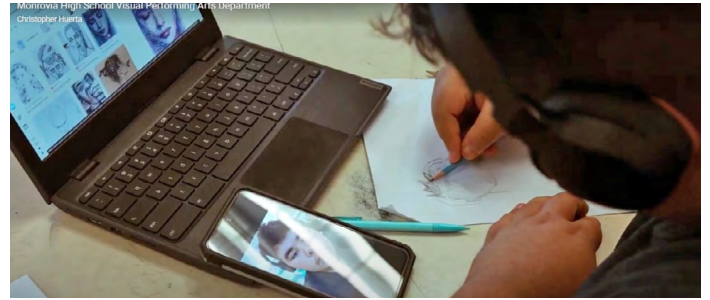
Your Hub for the Arts!
