PYLUSD Students Excel on AP, IB, and Cambridge Exams

in the 2023 Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), and Cambridge Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) Program exams. These programs have not only brought accolades to our district but also opened doors to higher Superintendent education opportunities and admission to prestigious universities across the nation.

In our district, we offer a robust array of AP courses courtesy of the College Board at our comprehensive high schools-El Dorado, Esperanza, Valencia, and Yorba Linda. These courses cover a diverse range of subjects, including arts, English, history and social science, math and computer science, the sciences, and world languages and culture. Valencia is the proud home of the district's IB and Cambridge AICE diploma programs. The IB Program provides a challenging two-year pre-university curriculum, leading to the prestigious IB Diploma. Meanwhile, the Cambridge AICE Program empowers students to tailor their studies to their unique interests, abilities, and future plans within an international curriculum framework. I will now highlight the remarkable achievements of our students following the 2023 exams in each of these programs.

The number of AP exams taken by PYLUSD students increased by 6.67%, with a 2% increase in the pass rate compared to 2022, totaling 4,494 exams administered. Students not only increased the number of chemistry, computer science principles, and literature AP exams taken but also maintained the previous year's pass rate. An uptick in the number of environmental science, statistics, and United States History exams taken was accompanied by an increase in the pass rate. Each of our comprehensive high schools, El Dorado, Esperanza, Valencia, and Yorba Linda, demonstrated exceptional results, with pass rates ranging from 83% to 88%.

Valencia's Class of 2023 boasted 63 IB Diploma winners, the highest in Orange County. Remarkably, our students outperformed the world average on 13 IB exams, including economics, computer science, psychology, biology, and history, with score increases ranging from 18% to 75%. The school saw a substantial increase in the number of 10th to 12th-grade students taking Cambridge exams, with a 122% increase in the total number of exams given and a 9% boost in the overall pass rate.

We congratulate our students for their achievements on these exams and a share heartfelt thank you to our educators and parents for their continuous support and encouragement. Together, we are shaping a brighter future for our school district community.





PYLUSD High Schools have Success Inaugural Season of Girls Flag Football

From the District

Following the unanimous vote to officially sanction girls flag football as a California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) sport, this fall marked the inaugural season of the sport at Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD) high schools. All four of the district's comprehensive high schools—El Dorado, Esperanza, Valencia, and Yorba Linda–participated with teams of their own.

CIF is the governing body for all high school sports in the state of California. The decision was made amidst the sport's growing popularity across the state. Flag football offers players action-packed competition without the fullbody contact involved in tackle football.

After the CIF decision was announced, all four PYLUSD comprehensive high schools worked to create teams for competition with the support of the district. In addition to attracting first-time athletes, each school found that students who play softball, basketball, water polo, soccer, lacrosse, and track as their primary sport signed on to play flag football.

"The players already possess extreme athletic skills," Esperanza High School Athletic Director Keri Walters shared. "They really picked up flag football quickly and the rest is history." Esperanza High's flag football team played strong all season with an undefeated record in preseason and league. By October, the team was ranked 3rd in the nation on the MaxPreps flag football rankings.

At Valencia High, interest in the sport was immediately apparent. "The girls proved to be hard-working, dedicated, athletic, coachable, and excited for the opportunity to make history as Valencia High School's very first flag football team," wrote Coach Bilhartz.

At El Dorado High, over 30 athletes participated in the sport across the junior varsity and varsity teams. Ray Elliott, the Athletic Director at El Dorado, was encouraged by the team's fantastic performance during the season. Enthusiasm for the sport spread throughout the community as parents, teachers, and fellow students attended the matches in large numbers.

"The games have been fun to watch and truly showcase the players' dedication and the joy they bring to the field," Yorba Linda High Principal Dr. Richard Dinh noted. "The future of women's flag football is bright at Yorba Linda High School."

The growing excitement surrounding the addition of flag football is a testament to the importance of including girls in athletics. The district is proud to support its high schools as they work to further girls' involvement in excellent athletics programs.


Girls Flag Football


Esperanza Girls' Flag Football




is Amara, and when she was 2 or 3, they started to fight and argue all the time. Later, their mother had another baby named Will. A major event from

Dr. Ramon Miramontes Deputy Superintendent of Instructional Programs Times and technologies may change, but ensuring students feel a sense of connection at school is just as crucial as ever. Arguably, it's never been more important. I'm talking

specifically about being involved with

clubs, sports, music and other activities that not only enhance personal growth but have also been shown to improve students' academic performance and their well-being.

Research from the National Institutes of Health tells us that when students feel connected to their school, they are less likely to feel anxious, sad or have thoughts of harming themselves. TheAmerican Academy of Pediatrics suggests these benefits are long term, leading to improved health outcomes into adulthood.

Now, let me introduce you to two OCDE programs that have a history of engaging students across Orange County: the Academic Decathlon and Pentathlon.

The Academic Decathlon was established in 1968 as the brainchild of former Orange County Superintendent Dr. Robert Peterson. Students take on 10 challenges, giving speeches, doing interviews, writing essays and answering questions in such subjects as art, economics, literature, math, music and social science. Think of this as a mental Olympics, culminating with the Super Quiz Relay, an exciting live competition.

For middle school students in grades six, seven and eight, OCDE offers the Academic Pentathlon. This is a five-event competition that focuses on fine arts, literature, math, science and social science, building up to its own Super Quiz Relay. Both events bring students from different achievement levels together to compete, but it's not just about winning and losing. These are months-long endeavors that are equally about learning, growing and making the kinds of lasting friendships that emerge when students tackle challenges together. This year's decathlon theme is "Technology and Humanity," reflecting one of the most important issues of our time.

Scholarly competitions like the decathlon and pentathlon aren't the only options available. Public school students in Orange County can also connect through campus clubs, sports teams, career exploration programs, student government, community service projects, the performing arts, cultural clubs, peer mentoring, service learning projects and much more. Ultimately, it's about understanding the aptitudes and interests of each student and finding the activities that will most engage and inspire them.

So here's my call to action: As parents and educators, let's envision education beyond the classroom walls. Let's introduce each learner to activities that will help them truly belong to their school. Let's consistently inspire the next generation of leaders, thinkers and achievers to engage in transformative experiences that will enrich their lives and potentially impact their communities.

The connections they forge today will not only shape their current academic achievements but will also lay the foundation for more resilient, fulfilled and empowered individuals in the future.
