The school year is underway, and I'm excited to share updates regarding the city's efforts to develop safer options for pedestrian and bicycle safety as our youth continue to walk and bike to school. Earlier this year, we kicked off our "Safe Routes to School" program – a grant-funded initiative to study routes to and from schools in Westminster. Now that school is back in session, staff is resuming education and outreach events, including walk audits where staff and traffic

experts engage with parents and other stakeholders for feedback.

When it comes to our children and families walking to and from school, whether you're a pedestrian or a motorist, safety is the number one priority. That's why this year, on the first day of school for the Westminster School District, our Westminster Police traffic unit and school resource officers teamed up with the cities of Cypress, Seal Beach, and Los Alamitos to conduct traffic education and enforcement at various elementary and middle schools. Officers focused on violations pertaining to the safety of the children and parents walking to school. A total of 49 citations and a nearly equal number of warnings were issued to motorists.

As our kids return to school, this is a reminder to drive safely and be aware of your surroundings during drop-off and pick-up times.

Our Scholars are Writers!

The DeMille Language Academy is an award-winning Vietnamese Dual Language Immersion (VDLI) School. Our students take pride in being able to express themselves in English and Vietnamese. They do this through performances, but more importantly, in the products they create to showcase their learning.

Our teachers strive to empower all students to express themselves in the Vietnamese language

as well as in English. The Vietnamese teacher and English partner-teacher work in tandem with the standards and the curriculum to ensure that their students learn grade-level content in both languages. Teachers use strategies such as bridging, Thinking Maps, and other activities to help support the students in making connections between the two languages.

Students are expected to listen, speak, read, and write in both languages to show their understanding of the language and the grade-level content in all subject areas. In the picture below, students were asked to write, in Vietnamese, an opinion essay about their favorite candy for Halloween, or a response to text from a Vietnamese text, and to show the different states of matter using a model and explanation in Vietnamese. The students also use both languages to show math concepts and how to problem-solve.



Our students are working towards proficiency in both languages, in all subject matters, to earn their pathways to biliteracy awards as they progress through the VDLI program.

Transforming Education: Thinking Maps Rollout

In a groundbreaking move, the Westminster School District has embraced a six-year strategic plan focusing on the promise to revolutionize the way students approach learning. At Eastwood Elementary School, located at the heart

of this transformative initiative, students from grades TK-6 are experiencing the power of Thinking Maps, a dynamic set of graphic organizers designed to guide students from brainstorming to the final written product.

The Thinking Maps rollout at Eastwood Elementary is a district-wide endeavor aimed at enhancing students' critical thinking and writing skills. Over the course of eight weeks the students will be exposed to different types of Thinking Maps, each focusing on a specific aspect of the writing process.

Week one kicked off with the Circle Map, a tool that encourages students to define and brainstorm ideas. Students learned to identify key concepts and generate ideas, providing them with a solid foundation for any writing task. Teachers noted an immediate improvement in students' ability to articulate their thoughts and ideas.

In the second week, students delved into the Bubble Map. This graphic organizer helps students describe objects or concepts with precision and detail. It encourages them to focus on specific attributes, aiding in the development of rich and detailed descriptions. Students

found this tool particularly useful when working on descriptive writing assignments.

Week three brought the Double Bubble Map into the spotlight, teaching students the valuable skill of comparison and contrast. This tool proved instrumental in fostering critical thinking as students analyzed similarities and differences between various subjects. The Double Bubble Map not only honed their writing skills but also promoted a deeper understanding of the content they were exploring.

The most recent addition to the curriculum was the Tree Map in week four. This map guides students in classifying information and organizing their thoughts

systematically. By categorizing information and identifying relationships between concepts, students were better equipped to structure their writing effectively.

The impact of the Thinking Maps rollout has been substantial. Students are not only improving their writing skills but also developing essential critical thinking and organizational abilities. Teachers have reported increased engagement and enthusiasm among students, and parents have praised the initiative for its positive effects on their children's education.

The Westminster School District's Thinking Maps rollout at Eastwood Elementary School is a testament to the district's commitment to providing students with the tools they need to succeed. As students continue to progress through this innovative program, the future of education at Eastwood looks better than ever, with promising outcomes and enhanced writing skills on the horizon.


The journey begins with the computer kits, which contain all the necessary components to build a computer that functions with the gaming system. The

instruction in both English and Spanish, which allows them to become proficient in both languages. In the Dual Immersion program, starting in the seventh grade, the students take a Spanish 3 elective class as well as a core curricular class, social studies, that is taught completely in Spanish. Our program maintains academic rigor and follows the same curriculum and state standards as traditional programs.





The Dual Language program also incorporates cultural elements related to the Spanish language. This includes the study of literature, history, and the traditions of Spanish-speaking cultures. Cultural immersion helps students better understand the people and societies associated with the language.

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
