The much-anticipated California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress (CAASPP) scores were released. Fountain Valley School District (FVSD), like all school districts, provides a report to the board, school site administrators and teachers, various parent groups and the public-at-large on the results of the yearly testing of 3rd through 8th and 11th grade students. Doing so highlights mastery of standards-based content, progress which was made year over year and areas needing improvement.

FVSD students are a product of parents/guardians

who value education, taught by excellent teachers, and supported by trained support staff. As a result, they outscored state-wide and countywide achievement averages and landed #1 in English Language Arts and #1 in math as compared to the other 12 elementary school districts in Orange County.

How was this accomplished and how have we sustained high rankings over the years?

FVSD has a clearly articulated mission where "the main thing is the main thing," a focus where everyone is "rowing in the same direction," people understand the role they play and their responsibilities, employees are acknowledged for the difference they make as they work in safe and nurturing environments, and success is celebrated. Our staff continue to provide differentiated instruction and a tiered system of support to address the needs of the whole child, and that makes all the difference.



Our FVSD staff members embrace what one of my administrator friend calls "the love language of leadership culture and systems." A positive, purposeful, and rich culture abounds and systems are in place in FVSD. We are grateful to all for keeping the focus on students and we are most proud of their achievements.






