

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Knowledge Saves Lives – School Safety Training



The Magnolia School District has implemented comprehensive security measures at all schools and facilities. All sites have security fencing and all entrances and exits are locked. All schools have a single

point of entry and visitors must be buzzed in through the use of an intercom system. All visitors are given a background check through the Raptor system. Security cameras are located along the perimeter of all sites as well as exterior security lighting. With preventative measures in place, we have now

begun addressing reactive measures in the case of an intruder. Magnolia School District recently provided the opportunity for all staff members to participate in a school safety training by "Knowledge Saves Lives." The training was offered on four different Saturdays and was open to



teachers, office staff, and support staff, The training covers how to respond to campus intruders and school shootings and includes situational awareness, emergency step-by-step safety actions, and a heightened awareness to make better safety decisions. During the training participants go through a live drill and lockdown and then discuss what they learned. The training instructors also demonstrate how local law enforcement responds following the report of an active threat. The feedback

from our staff was overwhelmingly positive. One of our Board members said that we all want our employees and students to be safe and this training is not only thoughtprovoking but also prepares you should an emergency arise. We will be offering one more day of training in the spring.

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



Soaring to Scientific Success!

Salk School is having an amazing time diving into our new science curriculum, TWIG.

First grade is working on their first module, Museum of Leafology. They are spending time understanding, demonstrating, and applying knowledge of plant life and leaf dispersion. As part of the exploration process, students worked

together in small learning committees to create a way to design a seed and identify the dispersal method. In addition to amazing learning opportunities in the classroom, they also get to experience and enjoy what it is like to plant seeds and help foster and monitor their growth.

Additionally, sixth grade gets to start things off by immersing themselves in the body systems and functions. Their first module combines human body systems and technology. These students created diagrams of major organs and identified the importance of them. That is merely a springboard to delve into how technology can replace or enhance bodily functions. As the module progresses, they will even get to help design how a prosthetic hand can grip and pick up a water bottle.

This program provides a framework for students' learning and exploration. We're bound to encourage more than a few students to find the spark for science and lifelong learning. Salk Seahawks are doing great things!

An Exciting New Science Curriculum





Times and technologies may change, but ensuring students feel a sense of connection at school is just as crucial as ever. Arguably, it's never been more important.

I'm talking specifically about being involved with

clubs, sports, music and other activities that not only enhance personal growth but have also been shown to improve students' academic performance and their well-being.

Research from the National Institutes of Health tells us that when students feel connected to their school, they are less likely to feel anxious, sad or have thoughts of harming themselves. The American Academy of Pediatrics suggests these benefits are long term, leading to improved health outcomes into adulthood.

Now, let me introduce you to two OCDE programs that have a history of engaging students across Orange County: the Academic Decathlon and Pentathlon.

The Academic Decathlon was established in 1968 as the brainchild of former Orange County Superintendent Dr. Robert Peterson. Students take on 10 challenges, giving speeches, doing interviews, writing essays and answering questions in such subjects as art, economics, literature, math, music and social science. Think of this as a mental Olympics, culminating with the Super Quiz Relay, an exciting live competition.

For middle school students in grades six, seven and eight, OCDE offers the Academic Pentathlon. This is a five-event competition that focuses on fine arts, literature, math, science and social science, building up to its own Super Quiz Relay.

Both events bring students from different achievement levels together to compete, but it's not just about winning and losing. These are months-long endeavors that are equally about learning, growing and making the kinds of lasting friendships that emerge when students tackle challenges together. This year's decathlon theme is "Technology and Humanity," reflecting one of the most important issues of our time.

Scholarly competitions like the decathlon and pentathlon aren't the only options available. Public school students in Orange County can also connect through campus clubs, sports teams, career exploration programs, student government, community service projects, the performing arts, cultural clubs, peer mentoring, service learning projects and much more. Ultimately, it's about understanding the aptitudes and interests of each student and finding the activities that will most engage and inspire them.

So here's my call to action: As parents and educators, let's envision education beyond the classroom walls. Let's introduce each learner to activities that will help them truly belong to their school. Let's consistently inspire the next generation of leaders, thinkers and achievers to engage in transformative experiences that will enrich their lives and potentially impact their communities.

The connections they forge today will not only shape their current academic achievements but will also lay the foundation for more resilient, fulfilled and empowered individuals in the future.
