Math Leadership Summit

Saddleback Valley Unified School District's Educational Services department recently hosted a Math Education Leadership

Summit for math educators across southern California. In addition to the math leaders that drove in from other school districts, about 50 of our own principals, instructional coaches, and District administrators came together in

our District Board Room.

Kevin Dykema, the president of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) and co-author of *Productive Math Struggle: A Six-Point Action Plan for Fostering Perseverance*, spoke to the math leaders on how to shift from math focused on memorizing to math focused on students truly understanding. Participants left the math leadership event feeling confident in supporting teachers in provoking productive struggle. They brought back knowledge of how to guide teachers through valuing productive struggle, fostering math identity, building

community, planning for struggle, supporting struggle, and reflecting on productive struggle. This event, sponsored by Hand2Mind, was successful in inspiring the best possible math education for our SVUSD students!

How Valentine's Day Celebrations Impact Children's Emotional Well-being

and the Importance of Nurturing Healthy Relationships from an Early Age

Valentine's Day, often synonymous with romantic love, can have an impact on children's emotional well-being and lays the foundation for nurturing healthy relationships from an early age. Beyond the exchange of age-appropriate romantic settlements, this day can serve as an additional learning moment for guiding children in understanding diverse forms of love, affection, attention, and building meaningful connections.

Children absorb lessons about love and relationships from their surroundings, and Valentine's Day can be a practical form for parents to model healthy behaviors. By engaging in activities that promote kindness such as crafting cards for friends or expressing appreciation, parents show their children the significance of fostering supportive and caring relationships, thinking about others, sharing kind words and meaningful gifts, and generally showing kindness without the need to spend money, necessarily.

Conversations centered on emotions, respect and effective communication become integral on this day as they should any other day. These discussions should be at a child's developmental level and appropriate regarding home and cultural values, emotional expression, healthy boundaries and understanding effective communication.

Early exposure to varied and appropriate forms of love cultivate emotional intelligence and resilience in children. It is essential for parents to ensure inclusivity acknowledging that not all children experience familial or romantic love similarly. Encouraging empathy toward diverse experiences and cultures fosters an environment of acceptance and understanding.

It is important to ensure children understand and value meaningful relationships, fostering compassionate and nurturing consideration for others.

Student Transportation Plan

Saddleback Valley Unified School District is currently soliciting public input on the proposed Student Transportation Plan for the 2024-2025 school year. The Plan is designed to provide safe and consistent transportation services for our families with a specific emphasis on our primary and special needs students. The State provides reimbursement funding for school districts based on the prior year eligible

transportation expenditures and prior year Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) transportation related add-on funding. The plan describes the transportation services for pupils in transitional kindergarten to 6th grade, and pupils who are low income. It's not unusual to find two, three, or more children in the same family playing at a USYVL site while Mom and Dad serve as coach and assistant coach. USYVL can be a total family experience!

What will your child get out of USYVL? While the program teaches children the skills necessary to excel in the sport of volleyball, the focus remains on participation, cooperation, sportsmanship, responsibility and, of course, fun!

Action — Strength, endurance and improved coordination result from the weekly activity of the program. Furthermore, a season of league games is sure to provide plenty of exciting volleyball action.

Skills — Skills are taught using technically correct methods for peak performance and safety.

Teamwork — The USYVL is a family-oriented program where parents, siblings, grandparents, and friends are strongly encouraged to become involved. Parents and volunteers assist with coaching, registration, check-in and equipment set-up.



Here's a common question we hear: Why are you called the Orange County Department of Education when other county offices of education across California are known as, well, county offices of education?

The answer takes us back to a decision

made under the leadership of Dr. Robert Peterson, who served as county superintendent from 1966 through 1991. Early in his tenure, Dr. Peterson proposed changing the name of the then-Orange County Schools Office to the Orange County Department of Education, saying it was more in line with other county departments.

It was also reflective of the organization's expanding role. Our office had evolved into an agency that coordinated academic programs and provided technical and special services to all school districts, according to a resolution. The change was approved in March 1969.

This spirit of evolution and adaptation has been the hallmark of the Orange County Department of Education since its inception almost exactly 135 years ago.

On March 11, 1889, California Gov. Robert Waterman signed a bill that led to the formation of Orange County - and the office that would become OCDE. An annual report from 1890 documented a combined enrollment of 3,426 students, served by a total of 34 districts — though some operated less than six months out of the year. Total annual expenditures for the entire county were less than \$65,000.

Fast forward to today. Under the leadership of current County Superintendent Dr. Al Mijares, our department now supports nearly half a million students and approximately 600 schools as a cornerstone of Orange County's educational community.

Our role is multifaceted, yet it can be understood through two primary functions:

First, we provide direct instruction to our county's most vulnerable student populations through our Alternative Education and Special Education divisions, the latter of which includes our newly rebranded "Connections" schools.

Second, OCDE offers a comprehensive suite of services to local school districts. These range from meaningful training opportunities and high-speed internet access to legal and fiscal guidance, payroll systems, Local Control and Accountability Plan assistance and approval, student enrichment and much more.

When districts face hurdles in meeting specific performance goals on the California School Dashboard, OCDE and other county offices of education are also called upon to provide targeted support. This process, known as differentiated assistance, complements districts' own efforts to ensure that students' needs are met.

As we continue to grow and adapt, it's important to underscore that OCDE's core principles have remained unchanged. Driven by a commitment to empower all learners, we approach our roles not merely as administrators of the Orange County Department of Education but as stewards of a legacy of service and continuous improvement that dates back over a century.

Change is more than a chapter in our history. It is the very essence of our DNA. And it will be the engine that propels us forward, fueling our journey toward a brighter, more innovative and prosperous Orange County.
