Project Zero Waste

Mrs. Conton's and Ms. Connally's classes led a zero waste project to learn about food waste. During the first week of this project, the students weighed their lunchtime trash to discover that the two classes alone produced 26 pounds of trash.

The students wanted to find a way to reduce lunchtime waste in order to help the earth. Here are some ways they started packing waste-free lunches with their families:

- Sandwiches and other main dishes, fresh fruits, veggies, and treats were packed in reusable containers instead of plastic baggies.
- Cloth napkins were used instead of disposable napkins.
- 3. Reusable forks and spoons were used instead of plastic utensils.
- 4. Reusable drink containers were used instead of plastic bottles.
- 5. Reusable lunch boxes were used instead of paper or plastic bags.



The students who got school lunches brought their own reusable lunch boxes, reusable napkins and reusable utensils so they did not have to take the disposable ones provided by the school.

Students made decisions about what to recycle, what to put in the compost, and what to throw away. After three weeks, the students reduced their waste from 26 pounds to 4 pounds!

The classes wanted to share their findings with other students at Golden View to encourage others to take action through civic engagement opportunities. To do this, they decided to make posters about ways to pack a waste free lunch, and shared these ideas with their other classes at Golden View.


Shop Strong at Mesa!

This year we also added a year-long advanced industrial technology course for our seventh- and eighth-grade students. Projects have included cutting boards and experimenting with epoxy fills, mini bats, rings, pens, a mirror, and more! The students are learning valuable life







We are also playing around this year with a CNC machine, one of two that we will have next year at our newly modernized Mesa View site. In addition, with three lathes, our students are now

able to explore creative wood-working projects as well. It's quite amazing the detail and skill-level that these students have developed in such a short period of time, and how well they have been able to explain all that they have learned.

This year, teacher Brett Hardy has revamped our "woodshop" into a 21st-century career and technical

introduction for our middle school students, with web design, 3-D printing, and a variety of woodworking and carpentry skills. He has also hosted two shop Open House Nights where parents and families can come and use the tools alongside our students to showcase what they have learned. Magic Beans

"Once upon a time, there were magic beans thrown away onto the dusty ground" begins the poem in Magic Beans' liner notes. That's the spirit of this collection by songwriter/musician Eric Herman and his spunky backup band, the Puppy Dogs, aka Dave Pettey and Ben Macy.

The songs are a riotous take on being a young person or the parent of one, especially an opinionated, annoying, know-it-all and downright likeable youngster with a fertile imagination and a knack for getting into trouble. He puts "Google Eyes" on everything from European landmarks to dad's laptop—"I mean, it said Google, right?" Did you unfailingly trust your older sibling no matter how much trouble it got you into? "My Brother" will hit a chord. "Stinker," which this child certainly is, tosses out contradictory statements about behavior: he won't be afraid of the dark if you put on the light, he'll be patient if he doesn't have to wait.



The songs aren't all about shenanigans. "Merry-Go-Round" is a metaphor for life and the planet, both of which go round and round and up and down. "Remember" tells how the same child helps his beloved grandma go through dementia. "Go" tells where your imagination can take you if you're in a bad mood or a rut, which is the point of the collection.

The melodies are catchy and as imaginative as are the lyrics, which you can find, along with videos and other goodies, <u>right here</u>.

Remember, there's no ground too dusty for planting and growing our Magic Beans!

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The Yo-Yo

Some believe the yo-yo originated in China. However, the first mention of the yo-yo is in Greece around 500 B.C. It is also found in pictographs in Egyptian-temple wall art. Philippine hunters used a rock with a 20-foot string to hit their prey in trees in the 16th century. Wherever the yo-yo originated, it has become a global fascination.

The yo-yo is said to be the second-oldest toy in the world, next to the doll. It is a toy that has a calming effect on the user. The French court played with the yo-yo (joujou de Normandie). Marquis de Lafayette toyed with the yo-yo. Napoleon and his troops played with it before the battle of Waterloo as well, as it was a favorite of the Duke of Wellington. There is a National Yo-Yo Museum in Chico, and wooden parts can be found online.

This country saw its first patent in 1866 by an Ohio company, but the toy remained obscure until 1916 in an article in Scientific American titled "Filipino Toys." When Pedro Flores, an immigrant from the Philippines working at a hotel in Santa Monica as a bellhop, played with his yo-yo during his lunch break, a crowd would gather around and watch. He started making yo-yos and had two factories by 1929.

A businessman named Donald F. Duncan on a trip from Ohio to California saw the yo-yo and bought Pedro's company in 1929. Then in 1932, Duncan was given the trade name yo-yo, forcing competitors to use other names for the toy. It was Duncan who introduced the slip-string that allowed the yo-yo to "sleep." He set out on an advertising campaign with the Hearst newspaper company that increased paper circulation and sales of yo-yos.

Then in the 1960, with television and mass advertising, the yo-yo had a resurgence in sales and interest. However, the Duncan family lost a trademark case in 1965 and sold the company. Yet between 1960 and the 1990s, the yo-yo saw many innovations with the new technology that saw another resurgence in the 1990s. On April 12, 1985, the yo-yo went to space on the Discovery Shuttle. The toy needs gravity to work—you can guess the result!

Today, the yo-yo is providing more than entertainment for young enthusiasts. It is also a way for our troops to relax and take their mind off the stress of the job they have been sent to do. In 2008, Senator John McCain asked for people to send yo-yos and stress balls to the troops. There are several organizations that send yo-yos to the troops. As we get older and can no longer do what we used to do, there is still something that we can do that will make a difference.

Here's a common question we hear:
Why are you called the Orange County
Department of
Education when other county offices of education across
California are known as, well, county offices of education?

The answer takes us back to a decision

made under the leadership of Dr. Robert Peterson, who served as county superintendent from 1966 through 1991. Early in his tenure, Dr. Peterson proposed changing the name of the then-Orange County Schools Office to the Orange County Department of Education, saying it was more in line with other county departments.

It was also reflective of the organization's expanding role. Our office had evolved into an agency that coordinated academic programs and provided technical and special services to all school districts, according to a resolution. The change was approved in March 1969.

This spirit of evolution and adaptation has been the hallmark of the Orange County Department of Education since its inception almost exactly 135 years ago.

On March 11, 1889, California Gov. Robert Waterman signed a bill that led to the formation of Orange County — and the office that would become OCDE. An annual report from 1890 documented a combined enrollment of 3,426 students, served by a total of 34 districts — though some operated less than six months out of the year. Total annual expenditures for the entire county were less than \$65,000.

Fast forward to today. Under the leadership of current County Superintendent Dr. Al Mijares, our department now supports nearly half a million students and approximately 600 schools as a cornerstone of Orange County's educational community.

Our role is multifaceted, yet it can be understood through two primary functions:

First, we provide direct instruction to our county's most vulnerable student populations through our Alternative Education and Special Education divisions, the latter of which includes our newly rebranded "Connections" schools.

Second, OCDE offers a comprehensive suite of services to local school districts. These range from meaningful training opportunities and high-speed internet access to legal and fiscal guidance, payroll systems, Local Control and Accountability Plan assistance and approval, student enrichment and much more.

When districts face hurdles in meeting specific performance goals on the California School Dashboard, OCDE and other county offices of education are also called upon to provide targeted support. This process, known as differentiated assistance, complements districts' own efforts to ensure that students' needs are met.

As we continue to grow and adapt, it's important to underscore that OCDE's core principles have remained unchanged. Driven by a commitment to empower all learners, we approach our roles not merely as administrators of the Orange County Department of Education but as stewards of a legacy of service and continuous improvement that dates back over a century.

Change is more than a chapter in our history. It is the very essence of our DNA. And it will be the engine that propels us forward, fueling our journey toward a brighter, more innovative and prosperous Orange County.
