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Reflecting on 2023-2024 Accomplishments

With the 2023-2024 school year ending, it is a perfect time to reflect on the accomplishments of the past year. Academically the Little Lake City School District scored above state and county averages in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science on the 2023 SBAC test. We are proud that once again Lakeside Middle School was recertified for the fourth time as a state and national “School to Watch,” indicating a school

that optimizes social, emotional, and academic growth for all middle-grade students. Six of our schools received Platinum, Gold, and Silver recognition for their adherence to the national Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS) framework. Our schools utilize PBIS strategies to create safe, respectful, and optimal learning environments for our students.

As we look to the 2024-2025 school year, we are excited about a new program that we will be offering to the Little Lake City community. Our dual immersion program will be

offered at William Orr Elementary School next year. In our first year of dual immersion implementation, Transitional Kindergarten students will have the opportunity to learn both English and Spanish. Dual Immersion’s goal is to have each student become bilingual and biliterate in English and Spanish by fifth grade. We are excited to be offering this program to our students, and the staff and administration have been preparing all year to ensure a successful first year of implementation.

Lastly, we are excited to be continuing with our facilities upgrades at each of our schools. This summer we will be installing new shade structures at each of our school sites that will allow one hundred students to be seated under the structures. Not only will students be able to do homework and play games during lunch, but the structures will be highly beneficial for our afterschool programs to utilize with their outdoor activities. Through the development of our instructional programs and facility upgrades, we are finding new ways to ensure Little Lake City School District students are positively engaged in their learning.

The Lake Center Butterfly Garden

Several years ago I had the privilege of sharing the news about the revival of our campus Science Club under the leadership of Ms. Motamed, and the beginning of our campus butterfly garden. But who knew back then that this little student garden by the Administration Building would eventually become the jewel of our campus?

Those early years were definitely challenging ones as our students and the landscaping crew had to transition through a few big paradigm shifts. Sadly, the garden was damaged more than once. Its mulch was repeatedly blown away with leaf blowers, and an Apricot Mallow shrub was once accidentally removed by the use of a trimmer.

As time passed our students eventually became accustomed to the garden. But ongoing communication finally established that it needed a different type of care, and most importantly, that our garden should be under the

care of students. Now, elderberry, sage, and yarrow thrive together while making many invertebrates very happy!

Some time later the garden was expanded to include Palmer's Mallow shrubs. Last year a compost bin was added where the students could throw cafeteria food waste, yard waste, and water, and with a good weekly mixing by Ms. Motamed. The garden currently grows even more lushly now that we practice regenerative practices as well.

This year, student-designed garden interpretive signage has been installed. Our garden is truly complete now, and it plays host to a variety of wildlife visitors and residents like grasshoppers, praying mantises, and Monarch, Red Admiral, and Painted Lady butterflies. There are also bees, hummingbirds, Western Bluebirds, lizards, etc., and a soil that is chock full of grubs and worms. It has been quite a treat this year returning from spring break to see our campus literally crawling with Red Admiral caterpillars!

What a remarkable and joyful journey this has been, and it all started with a group of excited middle school students saying, "We want to plant a butterfly garden!"

Exploring and Creating

Lakeview's GATE program has always been a fun and engaging experience for our gifted students. This year we were able to expand our program. In addition to the traditional sessions designed and coordinated by GATE Coordinator Ms. Cobian, the Lakeview Drama Club: Take Two was also formed.

Taught by Ms. Cobian and Mrs. Bonilla, our GATE students meet twice a week to participate in enrichment classes. Sessions this year include robotics and basic programming, Geodes and Gemstones, the STEM Academy, Learning to Play the Recorder, and Create Your Own Graphic Novel. Our students have been talking excitedly about each session throughout the day, and it has been so much fun to see them create and explore!

All of the classes begin with a mini-lesson followed by a hands-on self-exploration of the activity. The students are having an amazing time engaging their creativity and developing their knowledge in art, writing, and engineering.

Under the direction and guidance of Mrs. Dominguez and Mrs. Marshak, the Take Two Drama Club is practicing their rendition of Peter Pan! Right now the club meets weekly for rehearsals, and will soon begin meeting twice a week as performance day nears. The student-performers were selected through an audition process. Those who are second language learners were also encouraged to join to support their language development.

Learning about Robotics

William Orr's fourth- and fifth-grade GATE program students were able to participate in an eight week after-school robotics class run by Ms. Spence with the help of Miss Sherri. Using STEM experiment kits that were purchased with the school's LCAP funds, the students were able to build and program their own robots.

During the first session, our students learned about robotics and the kits they would use. They formed groups, learned safety components, and separated the parts into bags. During the following four weeks the students used the diagrams in the kit's booklet to assemble their bipedal Android robot. This process included learning about the motors, ultrasonic sensors, and the Bluetooth box.

This 13-step assembly process was challenging, and included many small parts that had to be connected to assemble the robot's arms, legs, and gears. Students

evaluated their work numerous times by comparing their assembly to the diagram and the sample robot. They had to be very mindful of attending to precision with each step, and when mistakes were made, they had to re-engineer.

The final step was to see if their robot actually worked! When the robot was connected to the downloaded app it would work occasionally, but more times than not more re-engineering needed to take place. When their robot finally functioned properly the students were so excited to have persevered and achieve their goal!

The robot was able to spin in both directions, walk forward and backwards, and make sounds. To the students, this robot was real. With all their hard work and perseverance the students grew extremely attached to their robots, and they actually named them Bubble, Jamal, Robi, and Duolingo!

This is surely an experience that our students will never forget. Thanks to Ms. Spence and Miss Sherri, we are hopeful to have sparked the interest of some future engineers!
