AI Signals a New Era for Teaching and Learning in Orange County



As an eighth-grader, Ibrahim Memon from Tustin's Legacy Magnet Academy began working on an AI-powered app designed to allow rideshare drivers to keep 100 percent of their fares.

Today, Ibrahim is a high school junior. And his app? It's operational in Seattle. Ibrahim's story highlights the

extraordinary potential of Orange County's young innovators, especially when supported

with cutting-edge educational tools like artificial intelligence. And his success is a prime example of the outcomes we hope to encourage and nurture at the Orange County Department of Education through our own AI initiative.

We already know that AI in schools is about more than just the adoption of a new technology. It signals a transformative shift in how we educate our students, and there's no choice but to embrace it.

Indeed, to quote the Borg from Star Trek, "Resistance is futile" — but I don't mean that in a menacing way. The fact is this wave of technology is already here, and now it's up to us to harness it responsibly and strategically to enhance educational outcomes for all learners.

So far, the feedback we've seen from introducing AI in classroom settings has been highly encouraging. These emerging technologies not only make learning more interactive but also tailor instructional experiences to individual needs, making education more effective and engaging. Survey data shows a 90 percent satisfaction rate among students participating in AI-driven activities.

That said, the foundation of our strategy must be to support educators. That's why OCDE will be advancing AI fluency programs and comprehensive professional development opportunities to help make teachers' work more efficient and to maximize the impact of their instruction. Additionally, we will be promoting collaborative environments where students and teachers can explore the potential of AI together, fostering inclusive and innovative educational spaces.

Our Vision and Goals

At the Orange County Board of Education meeting on Sept. 4, our staff outlined a new strategic vision for the integration of artificial intelligence and the empowerment of students and staff. This wasn't about mandating a new direction, but rather supporting our districts and scaling up the innovative work many are already doing.

As we stated at that meeting, we envision a future where AI revolutionizes education, unlocking unprecedented

opportunities, and we are committed to harnessing its transformative power responsibly to enhance learning, inspire innovation and prepare every student for success in college, careers and beyond. By embedding ethical principles into our AI initiatives, we strive to create an educational environment where technology uplifts humanity, fosters creativity and builds a brighter future for all.

That's the overarching vision, but clear, measurable goals will be essential to ensure that OCDE's AI initiative achieves its intended objectives and enhances educational outcomes.

By 2025, for example, our target is for 90 percent of local districts to adopt ethical AI guidelines that promote responsible use across all educational settings. We also commit to holding regular meetings throughout the year to review progress and adjust strategies to make sure our efforts remain aligned with our broader educational objectives. Additionally, we want to work closely with district leaders to guarantee that all students have access to advanced technologies.

The Road Ahead

Wes Kriesel and Kunal Dalal, who joined OCDE in late 2023 as administrators of AI and innovation, are already providing direct support to our 28 school districts, and they're working in collaboration with Dr. Sabba Quidwai of Designing Schools. Last year, Dr. Quidwai led numerous sessions under the OC AI Forward banner, which brought together local superintendents and other educational leaders to drive this important conversation.

We are also partnering with OC Workforce Solutions and the Orange County Business Council to align our efforts with workforce demands so that students are on track for fulfilling, in-demand careers, and we are actively seeking support from local colleges and universities. Notably, 71 percent of industry leaders already say they prefer candidates with strong AI skills.

As county superintendent, one of my top priorities is to ensure the responsible integration of AI technologies within our educational framework, because we know that those who are adept at harnessing its potential will find themselves at a distinct advantage.

But this initiative isn't merely about adapting to the needs of the future — it's about actively shaping it. Through our collective efforts with our districts and other educational partners, we can and will continue to position Orange County as a leader in educational innovation, one that is actively preparing our students for success in an increasingly AI-driven world.

Brookhaven students benefit from the PBIS program by ensuring students have clear expectations at school that are explicitly taught, frequently modeled, and practiced throughout the year. Our students have the opportunity to attend "Lunch Bunch," skills groups, or receive a check-in/ check-out throughout the day.

Principal Laura Fisher expressed pride in the school's efforts, stating, "I am so proud of the work our school has done to support our students utilizing the PBIS model."

College and Career Readiness

El Camino Real High School has had an outstanding start to the school year. One area of focus for our staff this year is college and career readiness. This summer, 70% of our teachers and our entire administrative team were trained in AVID at the AVID Summer Institute in San Diego, CA. Teachers focused on AVID

instructional strategies in their content area while administrators learned about schoolwide college and career readiness initiatives. Teachers are enthusiastic about integrating more AVID practices into their instruction.

In addition, all students are taking a course called EDGE in order to earn elective credits. This course focuses on academic intervention and college and career readiness. One element of the course involves using a program called Find Your Grind. In this college and career readiness program, students participate in interactive lessons focusing on exploring career pathways, creating a career plan and portfolio and working through units aligned to the Future Ready Framework. Ultimately, students will have an exit plan upon graduation.

Finally, in November, El Camino students will participate in a schoolwide field trip to Sofi Stadium where they will tour the facility through an academic lens, focusing on the elements that go into building a state-of-the-art venue, their sustainability commitment and the steps taken to limit their carbon footprint, their vast technology systems that operate the stadium, the architectural and engineering side of the build, and much more. After lunch and some activity time on the field, students will participate in a career panel with employees from all facets of operations in order to learn about their pathways to their respective careers. In addition, to this field trip opportunity a Career Day, job fair and several college and career focused field trips and guest speakers are being planned based on the specific goals and interests of our students.



How Fast Do I Read?

When I was first taught to read, the instruction was to point to each word with my finger and say each word out loud. Later, I was told to stop using my finger. Finally, I was told to stop saying the words out loud. At that time, I was considered a good reader.

In reality, I was a slow reader. I continued to pronounce each word mentally, which slowed my rate of reading down. Teachers would assign reading based on an average reading speed for that grade level. If the grade level considered 150 words per minute the average and I read at 75 words per minute, the assigned reading took me twice as long as for others in the class. My reading speed was never considered a factor. The only evaluation was simply that I could read.

To improve your reading speed, consider that when you look around a room, you do not mentally say each item you see. Your mind processes that information. When reading, you need to break the habit of saying each word mentally and instead let your mind automatically process the information. This procedure will help you improve your fluency:

Begin by determining the number of words you read per minute. This can be done by reading for one minute and then counting the words you read. An average fourth-grader should read 150 words per minute (wpm), and a high school student should read 250 wpm. After establishing a basis, go back to the beginning.

Use a bookmark or a ruler to guide your eyes on a line. Then, quickly read for five minutes without saying each word. This will help you to break the habit of saying each word as you read. You may want to repeat the same sentence or paragraph several times.

Do this exercise for five to 10 minutes each day, and you will increase your wpm in 30 days. The better one reads, the better they will do in life. Most books are written for people who can read 200 wpm. Slow readers get bored! Students that read fast cut down on homework time, which allows for other studies or leisure.

- 6-7 years old: 53-111 wpm
- 7-8 years old: 89-149 wpm
- 8–9 years old: 107–162 wpm
- 10-11 years old: 139-194 wpm
- 11 to 14 years old: 150-204 wpm
- 14 to 18 years old: 200-300 wpm
- 18–23 years old: 250–350 wpm
- Adults: 220–350 wpm

Presidents' Day

Why do we celebrate the third Monday in February as Presidents' Day? On that day, we celebrate all the United States presidents. We often associate Presidents' Day with the first president, George Washington, born Feb. 22, 1732, and the 16th president, Abraham Lincoln, born Feb. 12, 1809.


Washington was the American version of Cincinnatus, who gave up the dictatorship in Early Rome. When King George III heard that, it was reported that he said, "Washington would be the greatest man in the world." It was during Washington's presidency that the framework of the structure of the United States government and economic system were established. The two-party system was taking shape, with Federalist as one party and Anti-Federalist, under Thomas Jefferson's opposition to the federalist, as the other.

By 1824, the two parties emerged in a contest election between John Q. Adams and Andrew Jackson. Then in 1828, Jackson won the presidency and expanded the electorate to the common man, and the two parties drifted further apart over the issue of the expansion of slavery.

The election of 1860 was won by Abraham Lincoln, and the Southern slave states tried to withdraw from the Union and sparked the Civil War. It was during this war that Lincoln gave his Gettysburg Address on Nov. 19, 1863, pointing out that the American experience began in 1776 with the Declaration of Independence. "Conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal"—these simple words changed America from "are independent states" to "is a unified nation."

During the short speech, Lincoln did not refer to the elite but to those who "gave the last full measure of devotion." By 1860, the nations had won independence from monarchies and returned to monarchist governments. America was the last hope "that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

One president gave us an America of the people, and the other made a course correction that is still in the process of carrying on the experiment in democracy.

Lessons of POWERFUL Communication

At no time has the ability to communicate effectively been more important. There is no question that the political atmosphere of recent years has degraded us and demoralized us. "If you can't say something nice, don't say anything at all" seems to be an archaic ideal as we watch grown adults spew pointless negativity on a regular basis.

If we want to stop the degradation of society, one of the most important changes we can affect, is to upgrade our standards of interaction. Children desperately need models of good behavior, and constructive communication, more than ever.

Following are 5 skills that every child and adult must learn in order to be powerful communicators:

Listen: Even if you do not agree, hear people out, gain an understanding of a person's values as they speak. Never talk over people. Don't interrupt. Affirm that you have heard their thoughts, and then you can share your view with the expectation of the same courtesy. People react more calmly, and are more inclined to listen, when they feel they have been heard.

Ask: Don't claim to have the answers. Get a depth of clarification on their views that contradict your own. Accept that people have different value systems. You will never change a person's mind by imposing your values

on them; this only creates defense and negativity. If you want to share an opposing view, do so respectfully, acknowledging that you understand and accept that your partner in the conversation might feel differently.

Avoid Negative Energy: Proper communication is neither negative nor dramatic. A productive conversation stays respectful at all costs. An agreement to proceed productively, is core to powerful communication. Respectfully end a conversation that seems to be turning negative, and agree to reconvene when the atmosphere is calmer.

Maintain Integrity: Don't falsify or exaggerate. If you stray from truth, your communication will be weak, and your informational value will be lost. Even one incident of falsification can destroy a person's credibility.

Develop Mastery: Commit to communicating powerfully until it is habitual. Master communicators listen, ask questions, operate with respect, maintain integrity and avoid negativity and drama. Like the mastery of any important skill, it takes practice.

We can make an enormous difference by committing to these simple standards.
