Our Potential is Unlimited

It's been said that we are a nation divided, and that many of those same divisions run through Orange County. But spend any time in our communities and it is clear that our interests, values and destinies are very much aligned.

From San Clemente to La Habra, Orange County families want their children to attend high-quality schools that maximize each student's potential. They want the peace of mind that comes with knowing their kids are safe, secure and happy from the first bell to the last. They want clean campuses staffed by caring professionals who are committed to ensuring every child's academic, behavioral and social-emotional needs are met. They want options for college and career preparation, as well as personal enrichment.

It is easy to get caught up in the divergent opinions often associated with politics. It is tempting to want to choose sides. But the fact is, the traits that unite us as a county are far greater than those that divide us, and we are going to need to work together to heal the wounds of a global pandemic and fortify the values that we share and hold sacred.

The job of Orange County superintendent of schools is an elected position, but it's also a nonpartisan one that requires consensus-building. Since taking office as leader of the Orange County Department of Education in 2012, I have strived to unite educators, families, businesses, elected officials, law enforcement representatives, faith-based communities and other stakeholders behind a shared vision of what our schools can be. And we have found success in this model.

We have seen our county's graduation rate rise to nearly 92 percent and our drop-out rates fall accordingly. We have outpaced the state on virtually all measures of academic performance. We have seen our countywide suspension rate fall to 0.2 percent. We have expanded our business partnerships and exponentially increased the number of career pathways and work-based learning opportunities for students.

We have scaled up proven academic, behavioral and social-emotional interventions and supports — and not just across our county, but statewide. We have put a renewed focus on engaging technologies, civic learning and kindness. And we have met the moment of a once-in-a-lifetime public health crisis with communication, collaboration and compassion.

But the job is not done. As we emerge from a drawn-out pandemic, our students need accelerated learning, social-emotional interventions, counseling and access to wrap-around mental health services. Our dedicated school employees need extra support, grace and stability. Our families need resources, expanded learning opportunities, communication and a greater voice in matters of education and health.

As much as we have accomplished, we still have more to do to put our students in a position to lead the nation in college and career readiness and success. Yet we have the resources and resolve in this county to achieve anything. By working together and embracing our shared values, our potential is unlimited to create a healthier, kinder and more prosperous Orange County that can serve as a model for all of California.

The word amazing has described Anaheim Elementary School District over the years and this description is even more fitting for the District this past school year. Despite the continued challenges of the pandemic, our AESD family came together and pulled off an *amazing* 2021-2022 school year.

We opened our 23 campuses in-person fulltime for our 16,000 students. We also offered a 24th campus called the AESD Online Academy to provide online learning for those who succeed in this type of learning environment. Our commitment to social-emotional wellbeing of our students did not waver, offering access to counseling and to free eye exams and glasses with

Vision To Learn. Through state funding, we implemented the Expanded Learning Opportunities program, extending the academic school day to nine hours with a combination of before and after school activities that are free of charge to families to engage the academic, social, emotional, and physical needs of students. In addition, our Dual Language Immersion program with Spanish and Korean thrived to get students ready for our wonderfully diverse growing community. Our Lincoln Elementary School was even awarded the Seal of Excellence School Award by the California Association for Bilingual Education. In the area of the arts, the NAMM Foundation recognized AESD for Best Community for Music Education for the fourth year in a row.

All of these successes would not have been possible without our *amazing* AESD students, families, teachers, administrators and staff. We cannot wait for an even more amazing 2022-2023 school year with our expanding academic and social-emotional resources for our AESD community.

Working Together for Student Success

I'd like to applaud the historic, proposed investment in education by Governor Newsom. I also commend the Governor's focus on improving access, affordability, and equity as a measure of accountability accompanying this funding. The proposal is bold. It calls for the UC system to increase four year graduation rates by almost 4 percentage points, and it requires closing the achievement gaps between students from under-resourced communities and their more affluent peers.

Colleges cannot make this happen alone, though, and they will need the help and partnership from K-12 schools and local leaders. The Anaheim Union High School District has significantly boosted college success rates at UC colleges over the last eight years with the help of The Anaheim Collaborative – a coalition of the City of Anaheim, local community colleges and universities, business, and not for profit organizations. For example, despite coming mostly from underrepresented populations, AUHSD students are persisting and graduating from college at higher rates than their peers at UC Universities and Community Colleges (almost 10% points higher). And Anaheim's college going Hispanic population is graduating college at a higher rate than peers across the state.

Good jobs and careers are a critical social justice issue. They are the foundation for elevating families out of poverty. The Governor's proposed investment in students' college success is a wonderful opportunity for California to advance equity across the state. However, it will take more than money to achieve success. Educators from K-16 institutions, business and community leaders will need to work together to build ecosystems of learning and support for our students, and we will need to discard the narrow educational approaches that have failed students for decades.

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

Celebrating 50 Years of Educational Excellence



Activities Away from Technology

Q. My 10-year-old son only wants to stay indoors, play video games and eat chips and the like. He doesn't like sports. I'm trying to get him outdoors and moving but he complains about the heat. Any ideas on how to get him away from becoming a chubby couch potato and away from the TV?

A. There are plenty of programs that your son might like such as swimming, drawing, painting, camping, making pottery, volunteering at a pet shelter, cooking, graphic design for kids, etc. The whole idea is to get him out of the house, off the couch and into a scheduled activity three to five days a week. Some of them start in the morning and some in the afternoon. Some of the facilities where the activities take place have lunch served to the kids. It's usually a pretty healthy one at that. They should give you a weekly copy of them. If not, ask for one. Some programs allow kids to bring their lunch. This means that he will be eating less of the bad things and more of the good. He might even decide that eating fruit is a good break from chips. If your son can find something he likes and can participate in it with a friend, he'll be more willing to stick with it, especially if there's no pressure to be a super star. This will also give him less time to play video games or to watch TV.

Learning to Communicate

Q. My brother's wife is always making excuses for their kids regarding just about everything. When they start to talk on whatever the topic is, she completes their sentences and basically they have grown to look to her to speak for them. When I take them out by myself, they can barely explain things or answer questions about the topic at hand. How can I help her to realize that they need to learn how to speak for themselves?

A. As parents we want to protect our kids from making poor choices, maybe because we've made a similar one and know what the results could potentially turn out to be. Unfortunately, they need to be able to make mistakes so that they too can learn from them; it's how everyone learns best in building life skills. If we talk for them and make excuses for them, not only will they become dependent on us but they will not be able to communicate well and make wise decisions. If you can talk to your sister-in-law about it without causing friction, do so in a way that helps her understand that her current protection of them is enabling their dependency on her. If you feel it's an impossible task, talk to your brother first. If neither one can see your point, don't push the issue. Just do the best you can with the kids when you have them by encouraging them to think and speak on their own. Sooner or later they'll ask her to stop.

Are You Disconnected?

This is one of the most difficult times there has ever been to be a parent. The extreme use of media and extended challenges of the pandemic have changed our children; thus, the way they need to be parented. And some needs of children never change.

All children need to feel connected. Can you see the difference between, “You’re a good friend!” and “I really needed someone to talk to last night, thanks for being there.” Instead of talking at children, talk to them; look into their eyes, be with them and listen. Since children often require constant attention, it is totally appropriate to say, “I want to hear what you have to say, and (cooking) needs my full attention right now. I’m turning the timer for 15 minutes. When you hear it ring, come and I will listen!”

Read to your children every night. Eat dinner together as a family. Play games together. Go on outings together. Don’t talk on your cell phone in the car, talk to them. This precious time of being the architect of a child’s life is very short. There are no re-runs in the parenting game; connect with your children so they feel valued and appreciated.

Does Excessive Media Harm My Children?

I am doing research on the effects of media on this, the next and the next generation; the outlook is disturbing. Extensive use of the media creates: Non-creative, judgmental, non-intuitive, non-empathetic, anxious, nervous and overwhelmed, and morally deficient kids. Do you want those labels put on yourself or your children? No? What to do?

Strictly regulate their media time. During school hours, one hour; after homework and chores — on the weekend, two hours. (1) Keep all cell phones, tablets, keyboards in a basket and farm them out like a library. (2) Have face-to-face time with your children every day, (3) Be savvy about social media so you can monitor what your child is doing, (4) Talk to them about what they are watching.

Help your children understand that all information via the media isn’t the truth, talk about the dangers of innocently inviting strangers into your life, and talk to them about addiction. Over-anxiousness can lead to suicide; help your children learn about the dangers of too much input, too little down-time, too much competition, too much emphasis on whether you are liked or not. You taught them to talk when they were little, now you need to invite them to use the skill of talking as a way to connect with other people.

The place where children turn to their friends instead of family is getting younger and younger. This is your input time—your time to be sure they have the armor of knowing they are loved.

Lessons of POWERFUL Communication

At no time has the ability to communicate effectively been more important. There is no question that the political atmosphere of recent years has degraded us and demoralized us. "If you can't say something nice, don't say anything at all" seems to be an archaic ideal as we watch grown adults spew pointless negativity on a regular basis.

If we want to stop the degradation of society, one of the most important changes we can affect, is to upgrade our standards of interaction. Children desperately need models of good behavior, and constructive communication, more than ever.

Following are 5 skills that every child and adult must learn in order to be powerful communicators:

Listen: Even if you do not agree, hear people out, gain an understanding of a person's values as they speak. Never talk over people. Don't interrupt. Affirm that you have heard their thoughts, and then you can share your view with the expectation of the same courtesy. People react more calmly, and are more inclined to listen, when they feel they have been heard.

Ask: Don't claim to have the answers. Get a depth of clarification on their views that contradict your own. Accept that people have different value systems. You will never change a person's mind by imposing your values on them; this only creates defense and negativity. If you want to share an opposing view, do so respectfully, acknowledging that you understand and accept that your partner in the conversation might feel differently.

Avoid Negative Energy: Proper communication is neither negative nor dramatic. A productive conversation stays respectful at all costs. An agreement to proceed productively, is core to powerful communication. Respectfully end a conversation that seems to be turning negative, and agree to reconvene when the atmosphere is calmer.


Maintain Integrity: Don't falsify or exaggerate. If you stray from truth, your communication will be weak, and your informational value will be lost. Even one incident of falsification can destroy a person's credibility.

Develop Mastery: Commit to communicating powerfully until it is habitual. Master communicators listen, ask questions, operate with respect, maintain integrity and avoid negativity and drama. Like the mastery of any important skill, it takes practice.


We can make an enormous difference by committing to these simple standards.
